3 "PART 1

4 CERTIFICATE OF ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

5 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 101.** A new section is added to chapter 28A.655
6 RCW to read as follows:

7 CERTIFICATE REQUIREMENTS. (1) The high school assessment system
8 shall include but need not be limited to the Washington assessment of
9 student learning, opportunities for a student to retake the content
10 areas of the assessment in which the student was not successful, and
11 one or more alternative means for a student to demonstrate achievement
12 of state academic standards. The alternative means for each content
13 area shall be comparable in rigor to the Washington assessment of
14 student learning for each content area.

15 (2) Subject to the conditions in this section, beginning with the
16 graduating class of 2008, successful completion of the reading,
17 writing, and mathematics content areas of the high school Washington
18 assessment of student learning, or of an approved alternative means in
19 those content areas as provided in subsection (10) of this section,
20 shall lead to a certificate of academic achievement. The certificate
21 of academic achievement shall be obtained by most students at about the
22 age of sixteen, and is evidence that the students have successfully met
23 the state standard in the content areas included in the certificate.
24 The certificate of academic achievement is required for graduation from
25 a public high school but is not the only requirement for graduation.

26 (3) Beginning with the graduating class of 2010, successful
27 completion of the reading, writing, mathematics, and science content
28 areas of the high school Washington assessment of student learning, or

1 of an approved alternative means in those content areas, is required
2 for graduation from a public high school in the state of Washington and
3 shall lead to a certificate of academic achievement.

4 (4) The state board of education may not require the acquisition of
5 the certificate of academic achievement for students in home-based
6 instruction under chapter 28A.200 RCW or for students enrolled in
7 private schools under chapter 28A.195 RCW.

8 (5) A student may retain and use the highest result from each
9 successfully completed content area of the high school assessment.

10 (6) Beginning with the graduating class of 2008, the highest level
11 achieved in each content area on the high school Washington assessment
12 of student learning shall be displayed on a student's transcript. In
13 addition, beginning with the graduating class of 2008, each student
14 shall receive a scholar's designation on his or her transcript for each
15 content area in which the student achieves level four.

16 (7) Beginning with the graduating class of 2008, if a student takes
17 the high school assessment but is not successful in one or more content
18 areas required for the certificate of academic achievement, the student
19 may retake the assessment in that content area one or more times at no
20 cost to the student and may choose one or more of the following
21 options:

22 (a) To retake the assessment in that content area at least once in
23 the spring and once in the fall or winter if the student is enrolled in
24 a public school;

25 (b) To retake the assessment in that content area if the student is
26 enrolled in a high school completion program. The superintendent of
27 public instruction and the state board for community and technical
28 colleges shall jointly identify means by which students in these
29 programs can be assessed; or

30 (c) To use an alternative means developed and approved by the
31 superintendent of public instruction to demonstrate achievement of the
32 standards for that content area if the student has retaken the
33 assessment in that content area at least once.

34 (8) Students who achieve the standard in a content area of the high
35 school assessment of student learning but who wish to improve their
36 results shall pay for retaking the assessment, using a uniform cost
37 determined by the superintendent of public instruction.

1 (9) Subject to available funding, the superintendent shall pilot
2 both opportunities for retaking the high school assessment and
3 alternative means beginning in the 2005-06 school year. Beginning no
4 later than September 2006, opportunities to retake the assessment at
5 least once in the fall or winter and once in the spring shall be
6 available in each school district.

7 (10) Beginning no later than spring 2007, subject to formal
8 legislative approval of the alternative means, alternative means shall
9 be in place in each school district to demonstrate achievement of the
10 state standards in a content area in which the student was unsuccessful
11 on the Washington assessment of student learning. Through the omnibus
12 appropriations act, or by statute or concurrent resolution, the
13 legislature shall formally approve the use of any alternative means,
14 including any appeals process, before its implementation as part of the
15 high school assessment system.

16 (11) Beginning no later than September 1, 2006, each school
17 district shall prepare a plan for each eighth grade through twelfth
18 grade student who was not successful in one or more content areas of
19 the Washington assessment of student learning. The plan shall include,
20 but need not be limited to, the courses, competencies, and other steps
21 needed to be taken by the student to meet state academic standards and
22 stay on track for graduation. Progress on the plan shall be reported
23 to the student and the student's parents or guardian. In addition,
24 through a parent conference, schools must notify the parent or guardian
25 of each eighth grade student about the student's results on the
26 assessment of student learning, identify actions the school intends to
27 take to improve the student's skills in any content area in which the
28 student was unsuccessful, and provide the parents or guardian with
29 strategies to help them improve their student's skills in that content
30 area.

31 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 102.** CERTIFICATE REPORTS REQUIRED ON THE
32 APPROPRIATE APPLICATION OF THE CERTIFICATE REQUIREMENT TO SPECIAL
33 EDUCATION AND STUDENTS WITH LIMITED ENGLISH PROFICIENCY, THE CUT SCORES
34 REQUIRED TO ACHIEVE THE CERTIFICATE, ALTERNATIVE MEANS, AND ISSUES
35 RELATED TO VALIDITY AND RELIABILITY. (1) By November 30, 2003, subject
36 to available funding, the office of the superintendent of public

1 instruction shall report recommendations to the governor, the state
2 board of education, and the house of representatives and senate
3 education committees on the appropriate application of the certificate
4 of academic achievement to special education students and limited
5 English proficiency students and recommendations on the best practices
6 that may be used with students who need additional assistance to meet
7 the certificate requirements. In the superintendent's deliberations,
8 the superintendent shall consult with practicing teachers and
9 principals, practicing special education practitioners including
10 educational staff associates, parents, education organizations, and
11 other interested parties.

12 (2) Before the results of the 2004 high school assessment of
13 student learning are reported to school districts, the academic
14 achievement and accountability commission shall review and adjust, if
15 necessary, the performance standards needed to meet the high school
16 standards and obtain a certificate of academic achievement as provided
17 in section 101 of this act. The commission shall include in its review
18 consideration of the use of the standard error of measurement into the
19 decision regarding the award of the certificate of academic
20 achievement. To assist in its deliberations, the commission shall seek
21 advice from a committee that includes parents, practicing classroom
22 teachers and principals, administrators, staff, and other interested
23 parties.

24 (3) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall
25 develop alternative means for students to demonstrate achievement of
26 the state academic standards. The alternative means shall be
27 comparable in rigor to the Washington assessment of student learning
28 and shall include procedures and criteria to help determine whether
29 students who were not successful in one or more of the content areas of
30 the high school assessment can demonstrate that they meet state
31 standards through another objectively evaluated means. In its
32 deliberations, the office of the superintendent of public instruction
33 shall consult with parents, administrators, practicing classroom
34 teachers including teachers in career and technical education,
35 practicing principals, appropriate agencies, professional
36 organizations, assessment experts, and other interested parties.

1 (a) By July 1, 2004, the office of the superintendent of public
2 instruction shall report its recommendations for alternative means,
3 including possible options and a possible appeals process, to the
4 governor, the state board of education, and the house of
5 representatives and senate education committees.

6 (b) By July 1, 2005, subject to available funding, alternative
7 means shall be available for pilot testing by school districts.

8 (c) By December 1, 2006, the superintendent shall report to the
9 governor, the state board of education, and the house of
10 representatives and senate education committees on information obtained
11 through the pilots of the alternative means. The report shall include
12 an analysis of the comparative rigor of the alternative means to the
13 Washington assessment of student learning for that content area.

14 (d) Through the omnibus appropriations act, or by statute or
15 concurrent resolution, the legislature shall formally approve the use
16 of any alternative means, including any appeals process, before its
17 implementation as a part of the high school assessment system.

18 (4) By November 30, 2004, the superintendent of public instruction
19 and the state board of education shall provide to the house of
20 representatives and senate education committees all available pertinent
21 studies, information, and independent third-party analyses on the
22 validity and reliability of the high school assessment system,
23 especially as it pertains to the use of the system for individual
24 student decisions.

25 **Sec. 103.** RCW 28A.230.090 and 1997 c 222 s 2 are each amended to
26 read as follows:

27 CERTIFICATE OF ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT - STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION HIGH
28 SCHOOL GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS, INCLUDING LOCAL DETERMINATION OF
29 INDIVIDUAL STUDENT SUCCESS. (1) The state board of education shall
30 establish high school graduation requirements or equivalencies for
31 students.

32 (a) Any course in Washington state history and government used to
33 fulfill high school graduation requirements is encouraged to include
34 information on the culture, history, and government of the American
35 Indian peoples who were the first inhabitants of the state.

1 (b) The certificate of academic achievement requirements under
2 section 101 of this act are required for graduation from a public high
3 school but are not the only requirements for graduation.

4 (c) Any decision on whether a student has met the state board's
5 high school graduation requirements for a high school and beyond plan
6 shall remain at the local level.

7 (2) In recognition of the statutory authority of the state board of
8 education to establish and enforce minimum high school graduation
9 requirements, the state board shall periodically reevaluate the
10 graduation requirements and shall report such findings to the
11 legislature in a timely manner as determined by the state board.

12 (3) Pursuant to any requirement for instruction in languages other
13 than English established by the state board of education or a local
14 school district, or both, for purposes of high school graduation,
15 students who receive instruction in American sign language or one or
16 more American Indian languages shall be considered to have satisfied
17 the state or local school district graduation requirement for
18 instruction in one or more languages other than English.

19 (4) If requested by the student and his or her family, a student
20 who has completed high school courses before attending high school
21 shall be given high school credit which shall be applied to fulfilling
22 high school graduation requirements if:

23 (a) The course was taken with high school students, if the academic
24 level of the course exceeds the requirements for seventh and eighth
25 grade classes, and the student has successfully passed by completing
26 the same course requirements and examinations as the high school
27 students enrolled in the class; or

28 (b) The academic level of the course exceeds the requirements for
29 seventh and eighth grade classes and the course would qualify for high
30 school credit, because the course is similar or equivalent to a course
31 offered at a high school in the district as determined by the school
32 district board of directors.

33 (5) Students who have taken and successfully completed high school
34 courses under the circumstances in subsection (4) of this section shall
35 not be required to take an additional competency examination or perform
36 any other additional assignment to receive credit. Subsection (4) of

1 this section shall also apply to students enrolled in high school on
2 April 11, 1990, who took the courses before attending high school.

3 (6) At the college or university level, five quarter or three
4 semester hours equals one high school credit.

5 **Sec. 104.** RCW 28A.195.010 and 1993 c 336 s 1101 are each amended
6 to read as follows:

7 CERTIFICATE OF ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT - PRIVATE SCHOOL STUDENTS
8 EXEMPTED. The legislature hereby recognizes that private schools
9 should be subject only to those minimum state controls necessary to
10 insure the health and safety of all the students in the state and to
11 insure a sufficient basic education to meet usual graduation
12 requirements. The state, any agency or official thereof, shall not
13 restrict or dictate any specific educational or other programs for
14 private schools except as hereinafter in this section provided.

15 Principals of private schools or superintendents of private school
16 districts shall file each year with the state superintendent of public
17 instruction a statement certifying that the minimum requirements
18 hereinafter set forth are being met, noting any deviations. After
19 review of the statement, the state superintendent will notify schools
20 or school districts of those deviations which must be corrected. In
21 case of major deviations, the school or school district may request and
22 the state board of education may grant provisional status for one year
23 in order that the school or school district may take action to meet the
24 requirements. Minimum requirements shall be as follows:

25 (1) The minimum school year for instructional purposes shall
26 consist of no less than one hundred eighty school days or the
27 equivalent in annual minimum program hour offerings as prescribed in
28 RCW 28A.150.220.

29 (2) The school day shall be the same as that required in RCW
30 28A.150.030 and 28A.150.220, except that the percentages of total
31 program hour offerings as prescribed in RCW 28A.150.220 for basic
32 skills, work skills, and optional subjects and activities shall not
33 apply to private schools or private sectarian schools.

34 (3) All classroom teachers shall hold appropriate Washington state
35 certification except as follows:

1 (a) Teachers for religious courses or courses for which no
2 counterpart exists in public schools shall not be required to obtain a
3 state certificate to teach those courses.

4 (b) In exceptional cases, people of unusual competence but without
5 certification may teach students so long as a certified person
6 exercises general supervision. Annual written statements shall be
7 submitted to the office of the superintendent of public instruction
8 reporting and explaining such circumstances.

9 (4) An approved private school may operate an extension program for
10 parents, guardians, or persons having legal custody of a child to teach
11 children in their custody. The extension program shall require at a
12 minimum that:

13 (a) The parent, guardian, or custodian be under the supervision of
14 an employee of the approved private school who is certified under
15 chapter 28A.410 RCW;

16 (b) The planning by the certified person and the parent, guardian,
17 or person having legal custody include objectives consistent with this
18 subsection and subsections (1), (2), (5), (6), and (7) of this section;

19 (c) The certified person spend a minimum average each month of one
20 contact hour per week with each student under his or her supervision
21 who is enrolled in the approved private school extension program;

22 (d) Each student's progress be evaluated by the certified person;
23 and

24 (e) The certified employee shall not supervise more than thirty
25 students enrolled in the approved private school's extension program.

26 (5) Appropriate measures shall be taken to safeguard all permanent
27 records against loss or damage.

28 (6) The physical facilities of the school or district shall be
29 adequate to meet the program offered by the school or district:
30 PROVIDED, That each school building shall meet reasonable health and
31 fire safety requirements. However, the state board shall not require
32 private school students to meet the student learning goals, obtain a
33 certificate of (~~mastery~~) academic achievement to graduate from high
34 school, to master the essential academic learning requirements, or to
35 be assessed pursuant to (~~RCW 28A.630-885~~) section 101 of this act.
36 However, private schools may choose, on a voluntary basis, to have
37 their students master these essential academic learning requirements,

1 take these assessments, and obtain certificates of (~~mastery~~) academic
2 achievement. A residential dwelling of the parent, guardian, or
3 custodian shall be deemed to be an adequate physical facility when a
4 parent, guardian, or person having legal custody is instructing his or
5 her child under subsection (4) of this section.

6 (7) Private school curriculum shall include instruction of the
7 basic skills of occupational education, science, mathematics, language,
8 social studies, history, health, reading, writing, spelling, and the
9 development of appreciation of art and music, all in sufficient units
10 for meeting state board of education graduation requirements.

11 (8) Each school or school district shall be required to maintain
12 up-to-date policy statements related to the administration and
13 operation of the school or school district.

14 All decisions of policy, philosophy, selection of books, teaching
15 material, curriculum, except as in subsection (7) (~~above~~) of this
16 section provided, school rules and administration, or other matters not
17 specifically referred to in this section, shall be the responsibility
18 of the administration and administrators of the particular private
19 school involved.

20 **Sec. 105.** RCW 28A.200.010 and 1995 c 52 s 1 are each amended to
21 read as follows:

22 CERTIFICATE OF ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT - STUDENTS IN HOME-BASED
23 INSTRUCTION EXEMPTED. (1) Each parent whose child is receiving home-
24 based instruction under RCW 28A.225.010(4) shall have the duty to:

25 (~~(1)~~) (a) File annually a signed declaration of intent that he or
26 she is planning to cause his or her child to receive home-based
27 instruction. The statement shall include the name and age of the
28 child, shall specify whether a certificated person will be supervising
29 the instruction, and shall be written in a format prescribed by the
30 superintendent of public instruction. Each parent shall file the
31 statement by September 15th of the school year or within two weeks of
32 the beginning of any public school quarter, trimester, or semester with
33 the superintendent of the public school district within which the
34 parent resides or the district that accepts the transfer, and the
35 student shall be deemed a transfer student of the nonresident district.
36 Parents may apply for transfer under RCW 28A.225.220;

1 THE ARTS, AND HEALTH AND FITNESS. By September 1, 2004, the
2 superintendent of public instruction, after consultation with parents,
3 practicing classroom teachers and principals, education organizations,
4 and other interested parties, shall report to the governor, the state
5 board of education, and the house of representatives and senate
6 education committees with assessment options and other strategies to
7 assure continued support and attention to the essential academic
8 learning requirements in social studies, the arts, and health and
9 fitness in elementary, middle, and high schools. The options shall
10 include a recommended timeline for implementation of those
11 recommendations the legislature adopts. The options may include
12 recommendations on the design, administration, scoring, and reporting
13 of classroom or performance-based assessments for these content areas.
14 The options may also include local and state reporting requirements in
15 these content areas.

16 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 202.** ESSENTIAL ACADEMIC LEARNING REQUIREMENTS
17 AND ASSESSMENTS - REPORTS REQUIRED ON THE ESSENTIAL ACADEMIC LEARNING
18 REQUIREMENTS, THE RESULTS OF INDEPENDENT RESEARCH ON ALIGNMENT AND
19 TECHNICAL REVIEW, AND THE FEASIBILITY OF RETURNING ASSESSMENT BEFORE
20 THE END OF THE SCHOOL YEAR. (1) Subject to available funding, the
21 superintendent of public instruction shall report to the governor, the
22 state board of education, and the house of representatives and senate
23 education committees on the results of independent research on the
24 alignment and technical review of the reading, writing, and science
25 content areas of the Washington assessment of student learning for
26 elementary and middle grades and for high school. The review shall be
27 comparable to the research conducted on the mathematics assessments and
28 shall be reported in accordance with the following timelines:

29 (a) In the content areas of reading and writing by November 1,
30 2004; and

31 (b) In the content area of science by November 1, 2006.

32 (2) The superintendent of public instruction shall report to the
33 governor, the state board of education, and the house of
34 representatives and senate education committees on the review,
35 prioritization, and identification of the essential academic learning

1 requirements and grade level content expectations in accordance with
2 the following timelines:

3 (a) In the content areas of reading, writing, math, and science by
4 November 1, 2004;

5 (b) In the content area of social studies by November 1, 2005;

6 (c) In the content area of the arts by November 1, 2006; and

7 (d) In the content area of health and fitness by November 1, 2007.

8 (3) By November 30, 2003, the superintendent of public instruction
9 shall report to the governor, the state board of education, and the
10 house of representatives and senate education committees on the
11 feasibility of returning the results of the Washington assessment of
12 student learning, including individual student performance information,
13 to schools, teachers, and parents in the same school year in which the
14 assessment is administered.

15 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 203.** A new section is added to chapter 28A.230
16 RCW to read as follows:

17 ESSENTIAL ACADEMIC LEARNING REQUIREMENTS AND ASSESSMENTS. By the
18 end of the 2008-09 school year, school districts shall have in place in
19 elementary schools, middle schools, and high schools assessments or
20 other strategies to assure that students have an opportunity to learn
21 the essential academic learning requirements in social studies, the
22 arts, and health and fitness.

23 **Sec. 204.** RCW 28A.655.070 and 1999 c 388 s 501 are each amended to
24 read as follows:

25 ESSENTIAL ACADEMIC LEARNING REQUIREMENTS AND ASSESSMENTS - DUTIES
26 OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION. (1) The superintendent of
27 public instruction shall develop essential academic learning
28 requirements that identify the knowledge and skills all public school
29 students need to know and be able to do based on the student learning
30 goals in RCW 28A.150.210, develop student assessments, and implement
31 the accountability recommendations and requests regarding assistance,
32 rewards, and recognition of the academic achievement and accountability
33 commission.

34 (2) The superintendent of public instruction shall:

1 (a) Periodically revise the essential academic learning
2 requirements, as needed, based on the student learning goals in RCW
3 28A.150.210. Goals one and two shall be considered primary. To the
4 maximum extent possible, the superintendent shall integrate goal four
5 and the knowledge and skill areas in the other goals in the essential
6 academic learning requirements; and

7 (b) Review and prioritize the essential academic learning
8 requirements and identify, with clear and concise descriptions, the
9 grade level content expectations to be assessed on the Washington
10 assessment of student learning and used for state or federal
11 accountability purposes. The review, prioritization, and
12 identification shall result in more focus and targeting with an
13 emphasis on depth over breadth in the number of grade level content
14 expectations assessed at each grade level. Grade level content
15 expectations shall be articulated over the grades as a sequence of
16 expectations and performances that are logical, build with increasing
17 depth after foundational knowledge and skills are acquired, and
18 reflect, where appropriate, the sequential nature of the discipline.
19 The office of the superintendent of public instruction, within seven
20 working days, shall post on its web site any grade level content
21 expectations provided to an assessment vendor for use in constructing
22 the Washington assessment of student learning.

23 (3) In consultation with the academic achievement and
24 accountability commission, the superintendent of public instruction
25 shall maintain and continue to develop and revise a statewide academic
26 assessment system in the content areas of reading, writing,
27 mathematics, and science for use in the elementary, middle, and high
28 school years designed to determine if each student has mastered the
29 essential academic learning requirements identified in subsection (1)
30 of this section. School districts shall administer the assessments
31 under guidelines adopted by the superintendent of public instruction.

32 The academic assessment system shall include a variety of assessment
33 methods, including criterion-referenced and performance-based measures.

34 (4) If the superintendent proposes any modification to the
35 essential academic learning requirements or the statewide assessments,
36 then the superintendent shall, upon request, provide opportunities for

1 the education committees of the house of representatives and the senate
2 to review the assessments and proposed modifications to the essential
3 academic learning requirements before the modifications are adopted.

4 (5)(a) The assessment system shall be designed so that the results
5 under the assessment system are used by educators as tools to evaluate
6 instructional practices, and to initiate appropriate educational
7 support for students who have not mastered the essential academic
8 learning requirements at the appropriate periods in the student's
9 educational development.

10 ~~((+5))~~ (b) Assessments measuring the essential academic learning
11 requirements in the content area of science shall be available for
12 mandatory use in middle schools and high schools by the 2003-04 school
13 year and for mandatory use in elementary schools by the 2004-05 school
14 year unless the legislature takes action to delay or prevent
15 implementation of the assessment.

16 (6) By September 2006, the results for reading and mathematics
17 shall be reported in a format that will allow parents and teachers to
18 determine the academic gain a student has acquired in those content
19 areas from one school year to the next.

20 (7) In order to assist parents and teachers in their efforts to
21 provide educational support to individual students, the superintendent
22 of public instruction shall provide as much individual student
23 performance information as possible within the constraints of the
24 assessment system's item bank. The superintendent shall also provide
25 to school districts information on classroom-based and other
26 assessments that may provide additional achievement information for
27 individual students.

28 (8) To the maximum extent possible, the superintendent shall
29 integrate knowledge and skill areas in development of the assessments.

30 ~~((+6))~~ (9) Assessments for goals three and four of RCW 28A.150.210
31 shall be integrated in the essential academic learning requirements and
32 assessments for goals one and two.

33 ~~((+7))~~ (10) The superintendent shall develop assessments that are
34 directly related to the essential academic learning requirements, and
35 are not biased toward persons with different learning styles, racial or
36 ethnic backgrounds, or on the basis of gender.

1 ((+8)) (11) The superintendent shall consider methods to address
2 the unique needs of special education students when developing the
3 assessments under this section.

4 ((+9)) (12) The superintendent shall consider methods to address
5 the unique needs of highly capable students when developing the
6 assessments under this section.

7 (13) The superintendent shall post on the superintendent's web
8 site, for optional use by schools and school districts, lists of
9 resources and model assessments in social studies, the arts, and health
10 and fitness.

11 **Sec. 205.** RCW 28A.655.030 and 2002 c 37 s 1 are each amended to
12 read as follows:

13 ESSENTIAL ACADEMIC LEARNING REQUIREMENTS AND ASSESSMENTS - DUTIES
14 OF THE ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT AND ACCOUNTABILITY COMMISSION. The powers
15 and duties of the academic achievement and accountability commission
16 shall include, but are not limited to the following:

17 (1) For purposes of statewide accountability, the commission shall:

18 (a) Adopt and revise performance improvement goals in reading,
19 writing, science, and mathematics by subject and grade level as the
20 commission deems appropriate to improve student learning, once
21 assessments in these subjects are required statewide. The goals shall
22 be consistent with student privacy protection provisions of RCW
23 28A.655.090(7) and shall not conflict with requirements contained in
24 Title I of the federal elementary and secondary education act of 1965,
25 as amended. The goals may be established for all students,
26 economically disadvantaged students, limited English proficient
27 students, students with disabilities, and students from
28 disproportionately academically underachieving racial and ethnic
29 backgrounds. The commission may establish school and school district
30 goals addressing high school graduation rates and dropout reduction
31 goals for students in grades seven through twelve. ~~((The goals shall
32 be in addition to any goals adopted in RCW 28A.655.050. The commission
33 may also revise any goal adopted in RCW 28A.655.050.))~~ The commission
34 shall adopt the goals by rule. However, before each goal is
35 implemented, the commission shall present the goal to the education
36 committees of the house of representatives and the senate for the

1 committees' review and comment in a time frame that will permit the
2 legislature to take statutory action on the goal if such action is
3 deemed warranted by the legislature;

4 (b) Identify the scores students must achieve in order to meet the
5 standard on the Washington assessment of student learning and, for high
6 school students, obtain a certificate of academic achievement. The
7 commission shall also determine student scores that identify levels of
8 student performance below and beyond the standard. The commission
9 shall consider the incorporation of the standard error of measurement
10 into the decision regarding the award of the certificate of academic
11 achievement. The commission shall set such performance standards and
12 levels in consultation with the superintendent of public instruction
13 and after consideration of any recommendations that may be developed by
14 any advisory committees that may be established for this purpose.
15 Beginning in 2004, if the commission makes any adjustment of the
16 student performance standards, then the commission shall present the
17 recommended performance standard to the education committees of the
18 house of representatives and the senate by November 30th of the year
19 before the school year in which the changes will take place in order to
20 permit the legislature to take statutory action before the changes are
21 implemented if such action is deemed warranted by the legislature. Any
22 new or revised performance standard the commission plans to use for
23 2004 assessments shall be presented to the legislature by January 1,
24 2004;

25 (c) Adopt objective, systematic criteria to identify successful
26 schools and school districts and recommend to the superintendent of
27 public instruction schools and districts to be recognized for two types
28 of accomplishments, student achievement and improvements in student
29 achievement. Recognition for improvements in student achievement shall
30 include consideration of one or more of the following accomplishments:

31 (i) An increase in the percent of students meeting standards. The
32 level of achievement required for recognition may be based on the
33 achievement goals established by the legislature (~~under RCW~~
34 ~~28A.655.050~~) and by the commission under (a) of this subsection;

35 (ii) Positive progress on an improvement index that measures
36 improvement in all levels of the assessment; and

1 (iii) Improvements despite challenges such as high levels of
2 mobility, poverty, English as a second language learners, and large
3 numbers of students in special populations as measured by either the
4 percent of students meeting the standard, or the improvement index.

5 When determining the baseline year or years for recognizing
6 individual schools, the commission may use the assessment results from
7 the initial years the assessments were administered, if doing so with
8 individual schools would be appropriate;

9 (d) Adopt objective, systematic criteria to identify schools and
10 school districts in need of assistance and those in which significant
11 numbers of students persistently fail to meet state standards. In its
12 deliberations, the commission shall consider the use of all statewide
13 mandated criterion-referenced and norm-referenced standardized tests;

14 (e) Identify schools and school districts in which state
15 intervention measures will be needed and a range of appropriate
16 intervention strategies, beginning no earlier than June 30, 2001, and
17 after the legislature has authorized a set of intervention strategies.
18 Beginning no earlier than June 30, 2001, and after the legislature has
19 authorized a set of intervention strategies, at the request of the
20 commission, the superintendent shall intervene in the school or school
21 district and take corrective actions. This chapter does not provide
22 additional authority for the commission or the superintendent of public
23 instruction to intervene in a school or school district;

24 (f) Identify performance incentive systems that have improved or
25 have the potential to improve student achievement;

26 (g) Annually review the assessment reporting system to ensure
27 fairness, accuracy, timeliness, and equity of opportunity, especially
28 with regard to schools with special circumstances and unique
29 populations of students, and a recommendation to the superintendent of
30 public instruction of any improvements needed to the system;

31 (h) Annually report by December 1st to the legislature, the
32 governor, the superintendent of public instruction, and the state board
33 of education on the progress, findings, and recommendations of the
34 commission. The report may include recommendations of actions to help
35 improve student achievement;

36 (i) By December 1, 2000, and by December 1st annually thereafter,
37 report to the education committees of the house of representatives and

1 the senate on the progress that has been made in achieving ((the
2 ~~reading goal under RCW 28A.655.050 and any additional~~) goals adopted
3 by the commission;

4 (j) Coordinate its activities with the state board of education and
5 the office of the superintendent of public instruction;

6 (k) Seek advice from the public and all interested educational
7 organizations in the conduct of its work; and

8 (l) Establish advisory committees, which may include persons who
9 are not members of the commission;

10 (2) Holding meetings and public hearings, which may include
11 regional meetings and hearings;

12 (3) Hiring necessary staff and determining the staff's duties and
13 compensation. However, the office of the superintendent of public
14 instruction shall provide staff support to the commission until the
15 commission has hired its own staff, and shall provide most of the
16 technical assistance and logistical support needed by the commission
17 thereafter. The office of the superintendent of public instruction
18 shall be the fiscal agent for the commission. The commission may
19 direct the office of the superintendent of public instruction to enter
20 into subcontracts, within the commission's resources, with school
21 districts, teachers, higher education faculty, state agencies, business
22 organizations, and other individuals and organizations to assist the
23 commission in its deliberations; and

24 (4) Receiving per diem and travel allowances as permitted under RCW
25 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.
