

SENATE BILL REPORT

SB 5563

Title: An act relating to the timing of the inspection of boarding homes.

Brief Description: Requiring the department of social and health services to inspect boarding homes at least every eighteen months.

Sponsors: Senators Deccio, Thibaudeau, Franklin and Shin; by request of Department of Social and Health Services.

Background: There are 526 licensed boarding homes in this state. Under current law, the Department of Social and Health Services is required to inspect every one annually. These inspections are supposed to be unannounced to ensure that the conditions being inspected reflect normal activity. Due to staffing limitations and the number of boarding homes, however, most inspections are conducted on a predictable schedule. The department seeks to extend the required time period between inspections to allow for more time spent on urgent and crisis situations, and increase their ability to conduct unannounced visits.

Summary of Substitute Bill: Boarding homes must be inspected every 24 months.

Substitute Bill Compared to Original Bill: Six more months were added between required inspections.

Appropriation: None.

Fiscal Note: Requested on January 31, 2003.

Effective Date: Ninety days after adjournment of session in which bill is passed.

Testimony For: Allowing the department to conduct routine inspections less frequently will free up inspectors to go after bad homes.
