AN ACT Relating to limiting noneconomic damages in actions under chapter 7.70 RCW; amending RCW 4.56.250; and providing a contingent effective date.

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4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

- 5 **Sec. 1.** RCW 4.56.250 and 1986 c 305 s 301 are each amended to read as follows:
- 7 (1) As used in this section, the following terms have the meanings 8 indicated unless the context clearly requires otherwise.
 - (a) "Economic damages" means objectively verifiable monetary losses, including medical expenses, loss of earnings, burial costs, loss of use of property, cost of replacement or repair, cost of obtaining substitute domestic services, loss of employment, and loss of business or employment opportunities.
- 14 (b) "Noneconomic damages" means subjective, nonmonetary losses, 15 including, but not limited to pain, suffering, inconvenience, mental 16 anguish, disability or disfigurement incurred by the injured party, 17 emotional distress, loss of society and companionship, loss of 18 consortium, injury to reputation and humiliation, and destruction of 19 the parent-child relationship.

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1 (((c) "Bodily injury" means physical injury, sickness, or disease,
2 including death.

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- (d) "Average annual wage" means the average annual wage in the state of Washington as determined under RCW 50.04.355.))
- (2) ((In no action seeking damages for personal injury or death may 5 б a claimant recover a judgment for noneconomic damages exceeding an 7 amount determined by multiplying 0.43 by the average annual wage and by 8 the life expectancy of the person incurring noneconomic damages, as the life expectancy is determined by the life expectancy tables adopted by 9 the insurance commissioner. For purposes of determining the maximum 10 11 amount allowable for noneconomic damages, a claimant's life expectancy shall not be less than fifteen years. The limitation contained in this 12 13 subsection applies to all claims for noneconomic damages made by a claimant who incurred bodily injury. Claims for loss of consortium, 14 loss of society and companionship, destruction of the parent-child 15 relationship, and all other derivative claims asserted by persons who 16 did not sustain bodily injury are to be included within the limitation 17 on claims for noneconomic damages arising from the same bodily 18 injury.)) (a) In an action for damages for injury or death occurring 19 as a result of the provision of health care, the amount of noneconomic 20 21 damages awarded to the claimant shall not exceed four hundred thousand dollars. July 1st of each year beginning July 1, 2005, the 22 administrator for the courts shall adjust the amount specified in this 23 24 subsection for inflation in accordance with the method established in RCW 2.12.037. The administrator for the courts shall publish the 25 26 adjusted figure in the Washington state register.
 - (b) The limitation on noneconomic damages in (a) of this subsection does not apply in an action in which the acts or omissions of a defendant were reckless, willful, or wanton.
 - (c) In an action involving more than one defendant where the noneconomic damage award exceeds four hundred thousand dollars as allowed under (b) of this subsection, the responsibility for damages of a defendant whose acts or omissions were not reckless, willful, or wanton shall be determined as though the noneconomic damage award were four hundred thousand dollars.
- 36 (3) If a case is tried to a jury, the jury shall not be informed of 37 the limitation contained in subsection (2) of this section.

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NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. This act takes effect if the proposed amendment to Article I, section 21 of the state Constitution limiting noneconomic damages in actions involving provision of health care is validly submitted to and is approved and ratified by the voters at the next general election. If the proposed amendment is not approved and ratified, this act is void in its entirety.

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
