- AN ACT Relating to a task force on nurses' work environment and
- 2 patient safety; creating new sections; and providing an expiration
- 3 date.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** Health care research continues to
- demonstrate the direct correlation between nurse staffing and better patient outcomes. Moreover, improvements in safety of staff, job
- 7 patient outcomes. Moreover, improvements in safety of staff, job
- 8 satisfaction, and reduction of workplace injuries have also been
- 9 directly linked to higher registered nurse staffing levels. Therefore,
- 10 to safeguard the public and support registered nurses, the legislature
- 11 finds that a task force to examine the nurses' work environment and
- 12 patient safety is essential to ensure quality patient care in
- 13 Washington state.
- 14 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** The secretary of health shall convene a task
- 15 force on nurses' work environment and patient safety to prepare a
- 16 report to the legislature and propose measures aimed at improving
- 17 patient safety by addressing the features of nurses' current work

- environments that may contribute to commission of preventable adverse patient events.
 - (1) In preparing its report, the task force shall:

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- (a) Consider the Institute of Medicine's 2003 report, Keeping Patients Safe: Transforming the Work Environment of Nurses;
- (b) Address priorities for implementing recommendations of the Institute of Medicine's report in Washington, as well as other means of improving patient safety;
- 9 (c) Examine current nurse staffing patterns in Washington health 10 care facilities; and
- 11 (d) Include, as part of its recommendations, proposals for staffing 12 systems designed to improve patient safety, quality of care, and 13 retention of nursing staff.
- 14 (2) The task force shall consist of fifteen members appointed by 15 the secretary of health. Members shall include:
- 16 (a) Two registered nurses from organizations representing nurses 17 involved in direct patient care;
 - (b) One representative of an organization representing hospitals;
- 19 (c) Four health care professionals involved in direct patient care, 20 to include two registered nurses and one health care professional 21 working in a long-term care setting;
 - (d) Two registered nurses in managerial or executive roles;
- 23 (e) One faculty member of an academic institution preparing 24 registered nurses;
 - (f) One consumer representative;
- 26 (g) One representative of the nursing care quality assurance 27 commission;
 - (h) One quality director of a health care facility;
- 29 (i) One human resources representative of a health care facility; 30 and
 - (j) One representative of the long-term care facilities.
- 32 (3) The task force shall issue its report to the legislature by 33 January 1, 2005.
- 34 (4) Any administrative costs of the department of health shall be 35 borne from nursing license fee revenues from existing fees deposited 36 into the health professions account.
