AN ACT Relating to the use of dental restorative materials containing mercury in the practice of dentistry; adding new sections to chapter 18.32 RCW; and providing an effective date.

- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** A new section is added to chapter 18.32 RCW 6 to read as follows:
 - (1) A dentist shall obtain a written informed consent from each patient prior to any dental procedure or treatment that includes the use of dental restorative materials that contain mercury. The written informed consent form must be substantially in the following form in at

- 6 NOTICE: The above-identified dental material contains mercury. The
- 7 United States government has published the following facts about
- 8 mercury:
- 9 1. Mercury vapor is released from dental materials containing mercury
- 10 which is the number one source of mercury in the human body. (World
- 11 Health Organization, Document No. 118 (1991).)
- 12 2. The human nervous system is very sensitive to all forms of mercury.
- 3. Metal vapors are more harmful than other forms of mercury, because
- 14 more mercury in this form reaches the brain.
- 15 4. Exposure to mercury can permanently damage the brain, kidneys, and
- 16 developing fetus.
- 17 5. The effects of mercury on brain function may include irritability,
- 18 shyness, tremors, changes in vision or hearing, and memory problems.
- 19 6. Short-term exposure to high levels of metallic mercury vapors may
- 20 cause effects including lung damage, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea,
- 21 increases in blood pressure or heart rate, skin rashes, and eye
- 22 irritation.
- 7. Fetuses and very young children are more sensitive to mercury than
- 24 adults. Mercury in the mother's body passes into the fetus and can
- 25 pass to a nursing infant through breast milk.
- 26 8. The harmful effects of mercury that may be passed from the mother to
- 27 the developing fetus include brain damage, mental retardation,
- 28 incoordination, blindness, seizures, and an inability to speak.
- 29 Children poisoned by mercury may develop problems of their nervous and
- 30 digestive systems and kidney damage.
- 31 The description of the effects of mercury set out in facts 2-8 above is
- 32 excerpted from the United States Agency for Toxic Substances and
- 33 Disease Registry (ATSDR), 1999, Toxicological Profile for Mercury.

- 17 (2) A copy of the signed informed consent form must be provided to 18 the patient. The original signed informed consent form must be placed 19 in the dental chart of the patient for as long as the dentist retains
- 20 the dental chart for the patient.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 18.32 RCW to read as follows:
- 23 Any dentist who removes dental restorative materials containing 24 mercury from a patient's teeth shall disclose the health risks of 25 removal.
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** A new section is added to chapter 18.32 RCW to read as follows:
 - (1) There may be no disciplinary action against a dentist who:
- 29 (a) Gives a dental patient information about the risks or benefits 30 of any dental restorative materials or dental procedures as long as 31 there is a peer-reviewed scientific publication and one other dentist 32 to support the information;
- 33 (b) Removes or places any professionally recognized restorative 34 dental material with the informed consent of the patient; or

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- 1 (c) Fails to conform to policies or codes of private organizations 2 that are inconsistent with state law.
- 3 (2) Nothing in this section may be construed to allow a dentist to defraud a patient.
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** A new section is added to chapter 18.32 RCW 6 to read as follows:

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- (1) Every dental office that uses dental restorative materials containing mercury or removes these materials from the teeth of patients must install mercury separators on any wastewater drain through which mercury containing materials pass. The mercury separator must be certified by its manufacturer utilizing the best available technology.
- (2) Dental materials containing mercury, whether restorative materials removed from patients' teeth or excess material from new restorations, must be placed in a vapor-proof container clearly labeled as containing mercury and must be treated as hazardous waste and disposed of in accordance with federal and state law. The material may not be placed in biohazard bags intended for incineration.
- 19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 5.** A new section is added to chapter 18.32 RCW 20 to read as follows:
- The Washington state dental quality assurance commission shall adopt rules to implement the provisions of this act.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 6. This act takes effect September 1, 2003.

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
