1 AN ACT Relating to enhancement of fish habitat on public lands in
2 Skagit county; adding a new section to chapter 77.85 RCW; and creating
3 a new section.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that there are
6 significant impacts to existing economies and legally protected land
7 uses in Skagit county resulting from the current activities involving
8 the use of a regulatory approach to restore and enhance habitat for
9 anadromous fisheries within the county. The legislature finds that
10 while it has authorized regulatory approaches by state and local
11 governments to protect fish habitat and other critical areas, it has
12 not required nor authorized regulatory approaches to be taken to
13 restore or enhance fish habitat.

14 By contrast, the legislature finds that there are hundreds of acres
15 primarily outside the dikes within the county under public ownership
16 primarily under the management control of the department of natural
17 resources and the department of fish and wildlife that have the
18 potential to provide equal or greater value as fish habitat that have

1 not been examined. The purpose of this act is to require a concerted
2 effort be made to fully use the potential to restore and enhance
3 fishery habitat on these publicly owned lands as the highest priority.

4 Further, it is recognized that this effort needs to involve
5 representatives from a wide spectrum of the public and the involved
6 agencies, and that it be comprised primarily by people who have first-
7 hand knowledge of the area and who understand its history.

8 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 77.85 RCW
9 to read as follows:

10 (1)(a) A program for restoration and enhancement of salmonid
11 habitat on publicly owned lands in Skagit county is created. The
12 program shall be known as the Skagit salmon habitat enhancement
13 initiative. The purpose of the program is to provide for the
14 systematic examination of opportunities to enhance habitat for
15 salmonids on public lands, develop project proposals and priorities,
16 apply for funding for implementation of projects, and manage the
17 projects to completion.

18 (b) The management board created under subsection (2) of this
19 section shall implement the habitat portion of the plan and is
20 empowered to receive and disburse funds for the approved salmonid
21 habitat restoration projects. This management board constitutes the
22 lead entity and the committee established under RCW 77.85.050
23 responsible for fulfilling the requirements and exercising powers under
24 this chapter.

25 (2)(a) A management board consisting of nine voting members is
26 created. The members shall consist of one county commissioner selected
27 by the county legislative authority; one member representing the cities
28 selected by the cities within the county; a member of the Swinomish
29 Tribe appointed by the tribal council; one representative of diking or
30 drainage districts selected by the boards of diking and drainage
31 districts that contain lands within the county; two members of the
32 general public appointed by the Skagit county board of commissioners to
33 include one who represents agricultural interests who resides in the
34 county and one who represents the environmental community who resides
35 in the county; a representative of the department of fish and wildlife
36 appointed by the chair of the state fish and wildlife commission; one
37 representative appointed by the governor; and a representative of the

1 department of natural resources appointed by the commissioner of public
2 lands. The management board may appoint and consult with a technical
3 advisory committee or consultants to perform work for the management
4 board.

5 (b) The chair of the management board shall be elected by the
6 members of the management board. In making appointments under this
7 subsection, the county commissioners shall consider recommendations of
8 interested parties. Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as
9 the original appointments were selected.

10 (c) No action may be brought or maintained against any management
11 board member, the management board, or any of its agents, officers, or
12 employees for any noncontractual acts or omissions in carrying out the
13 purposes of this section.

14 (3)(a) The management board shall participate in the review and
15 development of a restoration and enhancement plan on public lands to
16 implement its responsibilities under (b) of this subsection. The
17 management board shall consider local watershed efforts and activities
18 that pertain to fish habitat enhancement and restoration on public
19 land. This section does not limit the authority of units of local
20 government to enter into interlocal agreements under chapter 39.34 RCW
21 or any other provision of law.

22 (b) The management board is responsible for implementing the plan.
23 The management board may not preempt the authority of cities, counties,
24 or diking and drainage districts. If any plan or project developed by
25 the management board conflicts with a state law or rule, the management
26 board shall provide recommendations to the legislature for ways to
27 address the conflict if the management board believes the project or
28 plan should move forward.

29 (c) The management board shall prioritize and approve projects and
30 programs related to the restoration and enhancement of salmonid
31 habitat, including seeking funding of those projects and programs
32 through the salmon recovery funding board, and coordinate local
33 government efforts as prescribed in the plan. The management board
34 shall establish criteria for funding projects and programs based upon
35 their likely value in salmonid restoration. The management board may
36 consider local economic impact among the criteria.

37 (d) The management board is encouraged to use state and local

1 expertise, volunteer groups, interest groups, and affected units of
2 local government.

3 (4) The management board may hire and fire staff including an
4 executive director, enter into contracts, accept grants and other
5 moneys, disburse funds, pay all necessary expenses, and choose a
6 fiduciary agent. The management board shall report on its progress on
7 a quarterly basis to the county legislative authority and state natural
8 resource-related agencies. The management board shall prepare a final
9 report at the conclusion of the program describing its efforts and
10 successes in implementing the habitat restoration plan associated with
11 restoring and enhancing salmon habitat on publicly owned lands. The
12 final report shall be transmitted to the appropriate committees of the
13 legislature, the legislative body of the participating county, and the
14 state natural resource-related agencies.

15 (5) The definitions in this subsection apply throughout this
16 section.

17 (a) "Enhance" means to increase the quantity or the quality of
18 available fish habitat.

19 (b) "Protect" means to maintain the status, to save from loss, or
20 to prevent further harm to fish habitat. "Protect" includes the no net
21 loss of fish habitat concept as measured from the current condition.

22 (c) "Restore" means to bring back to a former position or
23 condition, to put back or bring back into existence or use, or to bring
24 back to or put back into a former or original state of fish habitat.

25 (6) The program terminates July 1, 2006, unless extended by the
26 legislature.

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
