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## House Bills

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**HB 2804-S** by House Committee on Judiciary  
 (originally sponsored by Representatives Lantz, Rockefeller, Clibborn, Moeller, Kirby, Cody, Morrell, Flannigan, Sommers, Campbell, Lovick, Kagi, Miloscia, O'Brien, Hunt, G. Simpson, Conway, Haigh, Linville, Edwards, Kenney and Chase)

Changing provisions relating to actions against health care providers.

**(DIGEST OF PROPOSED 1ST SUBSTITUTE)**

Finds that the unavailability or unaffordability of malpractice insurance has caused hardship to health care providers.

Finds that this hardship has the potential to result in impaired access to critical health care services, especially in high risk areas of practice, for Washington state citizens.

Finds that factors contributing to increasing malpractice insurance rates and restrictions in coverage are numerous and complex. No single solution can address these multiple factors, but changes in the civil liability system can significantly address some of these factors.

Declares an intent to improve the performance of the civil liability system with respect to the process by which actions alleging negligence by a health care provider are processed and resolved.

Declares that these changes are designed to ensure that the legal system functions as fairly as possible and that it appropriately addresses concerns that a bad outcome is too often considered the equivalent of malpractice.

Establishes a commission on noneconomic damages. The commission shall study the feasibility of developing and implementing an advisory schedule of noneconomic damages in actions for injuries resulting from health care under chapter 7.70 RCW. The commission shall present the results of the feasibility study and an implementation plan, if appropriate, to the relevant policy committees of the legislature by October 31, 2005.

**HB 3169** by Representatives O'Brien and G. Simpson

Regarding purchase of prescription medications by county and municipal government agencies.

Provides that, in negotiating price discounts with prescription drug manufacturers for state purchased health care programs, the health care authority shall also negotiate such discounts for county and municipal government agencies, including jails and public health agencies, that prescribe or dispense medications.

**HB 3170** by Representatives O'Brien and G. Simpson

Regarding refilling prescriptions of inmates released from jails and state correctional facilities.

Declares that, as used in RCW 69.41.190(1), "refill" includes a prescription authorized by a prescriber for an inmate after the inmate is released from a jail or state correctional facility.

**HB 3171** by Representative Woods

Purchasing state services through a brokerage system.

Finds that the department of social and health services' medical assistance administration's brokerage contracting services implemented in 1988 has saved the state and taxpayers millions of dollars.

Declares an intent that all administrative departments in state government participate in the competitive bidding process of the department of social and health services' medical assistance administration's brokerage system. It is intended that this participation will save tax dollars while increasing the services provided to a greater number of persons.

Requires the director of general administration to report to the legislature by December 1, 2004, on services provided by state agencies that should use the brokerage system under RCW 43.19.1905(22).

**SB 6296-S** by Senate Committee on Government Operations & Elections (originally sponsored by Senators Roach, Fairley, Swecker and Berkey)

Making technical changes to county treasurer statutes. Revised for 1st Substitute: Making changes to county treasurer statutes.

**SB 6300-S** by Senate Committee on Judiciary (originally sponsored by Senators Doumit, Roach and Mulliken)

Revising criteria for reimbursement to counties for extraordinary criminal justice costs.

(DIGEST OF PROPOSED 1ST SUBSTITUTE)

Amends RCW 43.330.190 relating to reimbursement to counties for extraordinary criminal justice costs.

**SB 6304-S** by Senate Committee on Economic Development (originally sponsored by Senators Brandland, Parlette, Spanel, Morton, Doumit, T. Sheldon and Rasmussen)

Providing tax relief for aluminum smelters.

(DIGEST OF PROPOSED 1ST SUBSTITUTE)

Provides tax relief for aluminum smelters.

Declares that upon every person who is an aluminum smelter engaging within this state in the business of manufacturing aluminum; as to such persons the amount of tax with respect to such business shall, in the case of manufacturers, be equal to the value of the product manufactured, or in the case of processors for hire, be equal to the gross income of the business, multiplied by the rate of .2904 percent.

Declares that upon every person who is an aluminum smelter engaging within this state in the business of making sales at wholesale of aluminum manufactured by that person,

as to such persons the amount of tax with respect to such business shall be equal to the gross proceeds of sales of the aluminum multiplied by the rate of .2904 percent.

Expires January 1, 2007.

Requires that by December 1, 2005, and by December 1, 2006, the fiscal committees of the house of representatives and the senate, in consultation with the department, shall report to the legislature on the effectiveness of the smelter tax incentives. The report shall measure the effect of the smelter tax incentives on job retention for Washington residents, and other factors as the committees select.

**SB 6344-S** by Senate Committee on Commerce & Trade (originally sponsored by Senators Hewitt, Keiser, Honeyford and Winsley; by request of Liquor Control Board)

Revising provisions relating to acceptable forms of identification for liquor sales.

(DIGEST OF PROPOSED 1ST SUBSTITUTE)

Approves United States armed forces identification cards issued to active duty, reserve, and retired personnel and the personnel's dependents, which may include an imbedded, digital signature in lieu of visible signature.

Authorizes the board to adopt such regulations as it deems proper covering the cards of identification listed in this act.

**SB 6345-S** by Senate Committee on Commerce & Trade (originally sponsored by Senators Hewitt, Keiser, Honeyford, Winsley and Oke; by request of Liquor Control Board)

Authorizing inspection of records regarding transportation of cigarettes.

(DIGEST OF PROPOSED 1ST SUBSTITUTE)

Provides that, for the purpose of obtaining information concerning any matter relating to the administration or enforcement of Title 82 RCW, the board, or any of its agents, may inspect the books, documents, or records of any person transporting cigarettes to any person or entity in this state and books, documents, or records containing any information relating to the transportation or possession of cigarettes in the possession of a specific common or contract carrier as defined in RCW 81.80.010 doing business in this state. Failure to allow such inspection may result in forfeiture and seizure of the cigarettes pursuant to RCW 82.24.130.

**SB 6389-S** by Senate Committee on Judiciary (originally sponsored by Senators Brandland, Haugen, Esser, Rasmussen, Kline, Murray and Kohl-Welles)

Prohibiting weapons in restricted access areas of commercial service airports.

(DIGEST OF PROPOSED 1ST SUBSTITUTE)

Prohibits weapons in restricted access areas of commercial service airports.

Pertains to the restricted access areas of a commercial service airport designated in the airport security plan approved by the federal transportation security administration, including passenger screening checkpoints. These areas do not include airport drives, general parking areas and walkways, and shops and areas of the terminal that are outside the screening checkpoints and that are normally open to unscreened passengers or visitors to the airport.

**SB 6391-S** by Senate Committee on Commerce & Trade (originally sponsored by Senators Honeyford and T. Sheldon)

Establishing priorities for the industrial insurance system.

(DIGEST OF PROPOSED 1ST SUBSTITUTE)

Provides that the department must continuously improve in quality, efficiency, and effectiveness to increase public trust in the way the department operates and delivers services so that employers and workers receive maximum value for their premium dollars.

Directs the department to establish priorities for the delivery of its services and annually assess whether the department's programs and activities contribute to the department's priorities. The highest priority programs must be evaluated to determine if they are operating at maximum efficiency, and the lowest priority programs must be assessed to determine their continued viability.

Requires the department to release its annual assessment to the citizens of the state, the governor, and the appropriate legislative committees by January 1st of each year.

Requires the office of financial management to draft a plan for funding the programs and services not directly related to industrial insurance that are currently funded through the medical aid and accident funds. The office of financial management shall convene an advisory panel comprised of representatives of both labor and business to assist it in developing the plan.

Requires the report to be delivered to the appropriate committees of the house of representatives and the senate by November 1, 2004.

**SB 6400-S** by Senate Committee on Government Operations & Elections (originally sponsored by Senators Kastama and Rasmussen)

Authorizing additional sales tax authority for public facilities districts.

(DIGEST OF PROPOSED 1ST SUBSTITUTE)

Provides that the governing body of a public facilities district created after July 1, 2005, but before June 30, 2007, under chapter 35.57 or 36.100 RCW that commences construction of a new regional center to be used for community events, and artistic, musical, theatrical, or other cultural exhibitions, presentations, or performances and having two thousand or fewer permanent seats, or improvement or rehabilitation of an existing regional center to be used for community events, and artistic, musical, theatrical, or other cultural exhibitions, presentations, or performances and having two thousand or fewer permanent seats, before January 1, 2008, may impose a sales and use tax in accordance with the terms of chapter 82.14 RCW.

Provides that the tax is in addition to other taxes authorized by law and shall be collected from those persons who are taxable by the state under chapters 82.08 and 82.12 RCW upon the occurrence of any taxable event within the public facilities district. The rate of tax shall not exceed 0.033 percent of the selling price in the case of a sales tax or value of the article used in the case of a use tax.

Declares that a public facilities district created under chapter 36.100 RCW is not eligible to impose the tax under this act if the legislative authority of the county where the public facilities district is located has imposed a sales and use tax under RCW 82.14.0485 or 82.14.0494.

**SB 6420-S** by Senate Committee on Government Operations & Elections (originally sponsored by Senators Roach, Kastama, Kohl-Welles, Rasmussen, Oke and Winsley; by request of Secretary of State)

Enhancing integrity of voting systems.

(DIGEST OF PROPOSED 1ST SUBSTITUTE)

Provides that before each state primary or general election logic and accuracy testing of precinct-based systems or electronic voting devices must be performed by the county under the observation of the office of the secretary of state during the process of final preparation before system distribution to each pollsite.

Provides that, after all tests are performed and the machine is ready for distribution, the machine must be sealed and the seal number recorded. The procedure

described in this act will serve as the official logic and accuracy test of these devices.

Directs the secretary of state to empanel a task force of elections and computer security experts to be known as the "Washington Voting Systems Board" to study and determine the potential for election fraud.

Provides that all poll-site based electronic voting devices shall produce an individual paper record, at the time of voting, that may be reviewed by the voter before finalizing his or her vote. This record may not be removed from the polling place and must be machine readable for counting purposes. If the device is programmed to display the ballot in multiple languages, the paper record produced must be printed in the language used by each voter.

Declares that paper records produced by poll-site based electronic voting devices are subject to all of the requirements of chapter 29A.44 RCW and chapter 29A.60 RCW for ballot handling, preservation, reconciliation, transit to the counting center, and storage. The paper records must be preserved in the same manner and for the same period of time as ballots.

Requires that ballot counting systems must be secured physically and electronically against unauthorized access.

Provides that anyone who removes a paper record produced by a poll-site based electronic voting system from a polling place without authorization is guilty of a class C felony punishable under RCW 9A.20.021.

Declares that nothing in this act prevents the state of Washington, its counties, or its voters from participating in the Secure Electronic Registration and Voting Experiment (SERVE) as authorized by PL 107-107, Title 16, section 1604 and chapter 17, Laws of 2003 1st sp. sess. including system certification, voter registration, and voting.

**SB 6499-S** by Senate Committee on Technology & Communications (originally sponsored by Senators Schmidt, Poulsen, Esser and Eide)

Establishing a local wireless network in the legislative building. Revised for 1st Substitute: Establishing a wireless network in the legislative building.

#### (DIGEST OF PROPOSED 1ST SUBSTITUTE)

Declares an intent to encourage the use of new technology to facilitate and expand access to information by state officers, state employees, and the public.

Directs the joint legislative systems committee, the department of information services, and the department of general administration to deploy a pilot wireless local area network. The network shall initially be established in the legislative building during 2004 as part of the legislative building rehabilitation project with the future objective of expanding coverage to the state capitol campus. The committee and the department shall determine the schedule for future deployment of the network.

Requires the joint legislative systems committee and the department of general administration to present a report to the appropriate technology committees in the house of representatives and the senate on the deployment of the local wireless network by January 10, 2005.

Requires the report to include recommendations and fiscal implications of expanding the wireless network to

additional state capitol campus facilities, the executive officers, their staff, and the public.

**SB 6547-S** by Senate Committee on Commerce & Trade (originally sponsored by Senators Honeyford, Mulliken and Hewitt)

Modifying the composition of the electrical board.

#### (DIGEST OF PROPOSED 1ST SUBSTITUTE)

Increases the number of members from fourteen to eighteen.

Adds to the electrical board one representative of each of the following: Outside journeyman lineman, industrial electricians, owners or managers of appliance repair contractors, and owners or managers of heating, ventilation, and air conditioning contractors.

**SB 6706** by Senators Thibaudeau, Kohl-Welles and McAuliffe

Providing for rules concerning off-campus behavior of higher education students.

Requires each institution of higher education to adopt rules regarding disruptive off-campus conduct of students, including sanctions.

Provides that sanctions may include, but are not limited to, counseling, probation, suspension, or expulsion.

Declares that, as used in this act, "disruptive off-campus conduct" means any conduct that results in a citation or conviction for the violation of laws or ordinances and that: (1) Interferes with the institution of higher education's relationship with the surrounding community;

(2) Harms the reputation of the institution of higher education; or

(3) Violates the institution of higher education's policies.

**SB 6707** by Senators Morton, Winsley, Fraser and Rasmussen

Creating a public lands advisory commission for noxious weed management.

Declares that Washington must establish an early detection and rapid response system for noxious weeds and develop a state agency action plan to strengthen statewide coordination of weed management activities to be carried out at the local level.

Declares that the goal of this act is to encourage state agencies and private landowners to work together to

alleviate the economic and habitat losses that noxious weeds are causing statewide.

**SB 6708** by Senators Thibaudeau, McAuliffe, Eide, Kohl-Welles, Winsley, Benton and Berkey

Providing for defibrillators in schools.

Directs each school district's board of directors to adopt policies for providing a defibrillator on each campus and for training appropriate personnel in the proper use of the defibrillators.

Makes an appropriation in an unspecified amount to carry out the purposes of the act.

**SB 6709** by Senators Roach, Kastama, Fairley, McCaslin, Stevens, Schmidt, Shin, Berkey, Horn, Kline, Jacobsen, Keiser, McAuliffe, Winsley, B. Sheldon and Eide

Promoting voter registration among youth.

Declares that the purposes of this act are to increase youth voter participation through increased voter registration, and to encourage the youth of the state of Washington to take pride in their civic responsibilities.

Requires the department of licensing to, four times a year, furnish to the county auditors a list of holders of intermediate driver's licenses under RCW 46.20.075, together with the addresses and dates of birth of the licensees.

Requires the county auditor to prepare and update information concerning upcoming elections and polling places. The auditor shall, during the month in which the licensee's eighteenth birthday occurs, send that information and a voter registration card to each holder of an intermediate driver's license who resides in the county. The information shall contain a concise statement of who is eligible to vote.

**SB 6711** by Senators Horn, Jacobsen, Swecker, Prentice and Esser

Adjusting regional transportation planning organization board membership.

Requires each regional transportation planning organization to ensure that the unincorporated areas within

its region are appropriately represented on all organization boards, including its executive board. The regional transportation planning organization may determine how the unincorporated areas within its region are to be appropriately represented on its boards.
