The report identified needed improvements, including (a) the development of common infrastructure program processes, procedures, and financing mechanisms; and (b) the consolidation of programs to improve coordination and efficiency of the state's investments and to minimize duplication.

12 conversion to maximum Washington grown oilseed must be accomplished as
13 quickly as possible. The political subdivision shall: (a) Develop a
14 plan for outreach to local growers and an estimate of when maximum
15 Washington state oilseed-based production will be reached; (b) develop
16 a goal for the political subdivision to return a portion of the biofuel
17 to local oilseed producers; and (c) report this information to the
18 department of community, trade, and economic development by December 1,

29 subsection (3)(a) and (b) of this section shall be deposited in the
30 youth athletic facility account hereby created in the state treasury.
31 Expenditures from the account may be used only for purposes of grants
32 or loans to cities, counties, and qualified nonprofit organizations for
33 community outdoor athletic facilities. For the 2005-2007 biennium,
moneys in the account may also be used for the recreation level of
service study for local and regional active recreation facilities
identified in section 165 of this act. Only the director of the
36 interagency committee for outdoor recreation or the director's designee
37 may authorize expenditures from the account. The account is subject to
38

1 allotment procedures under chapter 43.88 RCW, but an appropriation is
2 not required for expenditures. The athletic facility grants or loans
3 may be used for acquiring, developing, equipping, maintaining, and
4 improving community outdoor athletic facilities. Funds shall be
5 divided equally between the development of new community outdoor
6 athletic facilities, the improvement of existing community outdoor
7 athletic facilities, and the maintenance of existing community outdoor
8 athletic facilities. Cities, counties, and qualified nonprofit
9 organizations must submit proposals for grants or loans from the
10 account. To the extent that funds are available, cities, counties, and
11 qualified nonprofit organizations must meet eligibility criteria as
12 established by the director of the interagency committee for outdoor
13 recreation. The grants and loans shall be awarded on a competitive
14 application process and the amount of the grant or loan shall be in
15 proportion to the population of the city or county for where the
16 community outdoor athletic facility is located. Grants or loans
17 awarded in any one year need not be distributed in that year. The
18 director of the interagency committee for outdoor recreation may expend
19 up to one and one-half percent of the moneys deposited in the account
20 created in this subsection for administrative purposes.
