Background: No vehicle or combination of vehicles can operate upon the public highways of the state with a gross load on any single axle in excess of 20,000 pounds or upon any group of axles in excess of the weight that is set forth in statute. Upon two gross weight violations within twelve months, the court may suspend the certificate of license registration of the vehicle for not less than 30 days. Upon three or more gross weight violations within twelve months, the court shall suspend the certificate of license registration of the vehicle for not less than 30 days.

Summary of Bill: Upon three or more out-of-service violations, as defined in the code of federal regulations, the court shall suspend the certificate of license registration for not less than 30 days.

The Washington State Patrol, in consultation with the Administrator of the Courts, Department of Licensing, Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission, and the trucking industry, is directed to develop recommendations regarding the most effective methods for tracking the violations that lead to suspensions of certificates of license registrations and for improving the safe operation of commercial motor vehicles on Washington's highways and roads.
