1 AN ACT Relating to a pilot project for registration of
2 methamphetamine offenders; adding a new section to chapter 9A.44 RCW;
3 and providing an expiration date.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** A new section is added to chapter 9A.44 RCW
6 to read as follows:

7 (1) From the effective date of this act until July 1, 2007, any
8 adult or juvenile residing whether or not the person has a fixed
9 residence, or who is a student, is employed, or carries on a vocation
10 in this state shall register with the county sheriff for the county of
11 the person's residence, or if the person is not a resident of
12 Washington, the county of the person's school, or place of employment
13 or vocation, or as otherwise specified in this section if he or she has
14 been convicted of a felony methamphetamine drug offense under RCW
15 69.50.401(2)(b).

16 (2) Any person required to register under this section shall follow
17 all of the requirements applicable to kidnapping offenders under RCW
18 9A.44.130.

1 (3) Public agencies are authorized to release information to the
2 public regarding methamphetamine offenders when the agency determines
3 that disclosure of the information is relevant and necessary to protect
4 the public and counteract the danger created by the particular
5 offender. The extent of the public disclosure of relevant and
6 necessary information shall be rationally related to: (a) The level of
7 risk posed by the offender to the community; (b) the locations where
8 the offender resides, expects to reside, or is regularly found; and (c)
9 the needs of the affected community members for information to enhance
10 their individual and collective safety.

11 (4) This section applies only to offenders residing in any county
12 with a population of more than six hundred thousand, but less than
13 seven hundred thousand.

14 (5) This section expires July 1, 2007.

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
