5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that students need to know and understand the structure, workings, and roots of our state and 6 7 nation's democratic institutions and traditions. The legislature 8 further finds that studies on the historical and civics knowledge of 9 America's students suggest that too few students are learning those 10 lessons well. The United States department of education's national assessment of education progress shows that fewer than twenty-five 11 12 percent of America's students are proficient in either history or civics. In addition, while most of the states have learning standards 13 in the two subjects, only twelve states have enough depth and breadth 14 15 in the standards to ensure that students will understand their civic 16 responsibilities and opportunities once the students reach adulthood. The legislature intends to make it mandatory that all graduating 17

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NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 28A.655 RCW to read as follows:

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- (1) Beginning with the graduating class of 2010, students must complete at least one course in civics. The superintendent of public instruction shall develop specific guidelines to implement this requirement.
- (2) For the purposes of this section, "civics" means the social science that analyzes our state's and nation's democratic institutions and traditions including the rights and duties of citizens.

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
