3 "NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** The definitions in this section apply
4 throughout this chapter unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

5 (1) "Association" means the Washington vaccine association.

6 (2) "Covered lives" means all persons under the age of nineteen in
7 Washington state who are:

8 (a) Covered under an individual or group health benefit plan issued
9 or delivered in Washington state or an individual or group health
10 benefit plan that otherwise provides benefits to Washington residents;
11 or

12 (b) Enrolled in a group health benefit plan administered by a
13 third-party administrator. Persons under the age of nineteen for whom
14 federal funding is used to purchase vaccines or who are enrolled in
15 state purchased health care programs covering low-income children
16 including, but not limited to, apple health for kids under RCW
17 74.09.470 and the basic health plan under chapter 70.47 RCW are not
18 considered "covered lives" under this chapter.

19 (3) "Estimated vaccine cost" means the estimated cost to the state
20 over the course of a state fiscal year for the purchase and
21 distribution of vaccines purchased at the federal discount rate by the
22 department of health.

23 (4) "Health benefit plan" has the same meaning as defined in RCW
24 48.43.005 and also includes health benefit plans administered by a
25 third-party administrator.

26 (5) "Health carrier" has the same meaning as defined in RCW
27 48.43.005.

28 (6) "Secretary" means the secretary of the department of health.

29 (7) "State supplied vaccine" means vaccine purchased by the state

1 department of health for covered lives for whom the state is purchasing
2 vaccine using state funds raised via assessments on health carriers and
3 third-party administrators as provided in this chapter.

4 (8) "Third-party administrator" means any person or entity who, on
5 behalf of a health insurer or health care purchaser, receives or
6 collects charges, contributions, or premiums for, or adjusts or settles
7 claims on or for, residents of Washington state or Washington health
8 care providers and facilities.

9 (9) "Total nonfederal program cost" means the estimated vaccine
10 cost less the amount of federal revenue available to the state for the
11 purchase and distribution of vaccines.

12 (10) "Vaccine" means a preparation of killed or attenuated living
13 microorganisms, or fraction thereof, that upon administration
14 stimulates immunity that protects against disease and is approved by
15 the federal food and drug administration as safe and effective and
16 recommended by the advisory committee on immunization practices of the
17 centers for disease control and prevention for administration to
18 children under the age of nineteen years.

19 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** There is created a nonprofit corporation to
20 be known as the Washington vaccine association. The association is
21 formed for the primary purpose of collecting and remitting adequate
22 funds from health carriers and third-party administrators for the cost
23 of vaccines provided to certain children in Washington state. The
24 association may also undertake other activities in support of a broader
25 private/public initiative to protect Washington's children from the
26 effects of preventable infectious diseases through increasing
27 immunization rates. Costs of activities undertaken in support of a
28 broader initiative to increase immunization rates cannot be financed
29 through assessments under this chapter.

30 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** (1) The association is comprised of all
31 health carriers issuing or renewing health benefit plans in Washington
32 state and all third-party administrators conducting business on behalf
33 of residents of Washington state or Washington health care providers
34 and facilities. Third-party administrators are subject to registration
35 under section 9 of this act.

1 (2) The association is a nonprofit corporation under chapter 24.03
2 RCW and has the powers granted under that chapter.

3 (3) The board of directors includes the following voting members:

4 (a) Four members, selected from health carriers or third-party
5 administrators, excluding health maintenance organizations, that have
6 the most fully insured and self-funded covered lives in Washington
7 state. The count of total covered lives includes enrollment in all
8 companies included in their holding company system. Each health
9 carrier or third-party administrator is entitled to no more than a
10 single position on the board to represent all entities under common
11 ownership or control.

12 (b) One member selected from the health maintenance organization
13 having the most fully insured and self-insured covered lives in
14 Washington state. The count of total lives includes enrollment in all
15 companies included in its holding company system. Each health
16 maintenance organization is entitled to no more than a single position
17 on the board to represent all entities under common ownership or
18 control.

19 (c) One member, representing health carriers not otherwise
20 represented on the board under (a) or (b) of this subsection, who is
21 elected from among the health carrier members not designated under (a)
22 or (b) of this subsection.

23 (d) One member, representing Taft Hartley plans, appointed by the
24 secretary from a list of nominees submitted by the Northwest
25 administrators association.

26 (e) One member representing Washington state employers offering
27 self-funded health coverage, appointed by the secretary from a list of
28 nominees submitted by the Puget Sound health alliance.

29 (f) Two physician members appointed by the secretary, including at
30 least one board certified pediatrician.

31 (g) The secretary, or a designee of the secretary with expertise in
32 childhood immunization purchasing and distribution.

33 (4) The directors' terms and appointments must be specified in the
34 plan of operation adopted by the association.

35 (5) The board of directors of the association shall:

36 (a) Prepare and adopt articles of association and bylaws;

37 (b) Prepare and adopt a plan of operation;

38 (c) Submit the plan of operation to the secretary for approval;

1 (d) Conduct all activities in accordance with the approved plan of
2 operation;

3 (e) Enter into contracts as necessary or proper to collect and
4 disburse the assessment;

5 (f) Enter into contracts as necessary or proper to administer the
6 plan of operation;

7 (g) Sue or be sued, including taking any legal action necessary or
8 proper for the recovery of any assessment for, on behalf of, or against
9 members of the association or other participating person;

10 (h) Appoint, from among its directors, committees as necessary to
11 provide technical assistance in the operation of the association,
12 including the hiring of independent consultants as necessary;

13 (i) Obtain such liability and other insurance coverage for the
14 benefit of the association, its directors, officers, employees, and
15 agents as may in the judgment of the board of directors be helpful or
16 necessary for the operation of the association;

17 (j) By May 1, 2010, establish the estimated amount of the
18 assessment needed for the period of May 1, 2010, through December 31,
19 2010, based upon the estimate provided to the association under section
20 4(1) of this act; and notify, in writing, each health carrier and
21 third-party administrator of the health carrier's or third-party
22 administrator's total assessment for this period by May 15, 2010;

23 (k) On an annual basis, beginning no later than November 1, 2010,
24 and by November 1st of each year thereafter, establish the estimated
25 amount of the assessment;

26 (l) Notify, in writing, each health carrier and third-party
27 administrator of the health carrier's or third-party administrator's
28 estimated total assessment by November 15th of each year;

29 (m) Submit a periodic report to the secretary listing those health
30 carriers or third-party administrators that failed to remit their
31 assessments and audit health carrier and third-party administrator
32 books and records for accuracy of assessment payment submission;

33 (n) Allow each health carrier or third-party administrator no more
34 than ninety days after the notification required by (l) of this
35 subsection to remit any amounts in arrears or submit a payment plan,
36 subject to approval by the association and initial payment under an
37 approved payment plan;

1 (o) Deposit annual assessments collected by the association, less
2 the association's administrative costs, with the state treasurer to the
3 credit of the universal vaccine purchase account established in RCW
4 43.70.720;

5 (p) Borrow and repay such working capital, reserve, or other funds
6 as, in the judgment of the board of directors, may be helpful or
7 necessary for the operation of the association; and

8 (q) Perform any other functions as may be necessary or proper to
9 carry out the plan of operation and to affect any or all of the
10 purposes for which the association is organized.

11 (6) The secretary shall convene the initial meeting of the
12 association board of directors.

13 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 4.** (1) The secretary shall estimate the total
14 nonfederal program cost for the upcoming calendar year by October 1,
15 2010, and October 1st of each year thereafter. Additionally, the
16 secretary shall subtract any amounts needed to serve children enrolled
17 in state purchased health care programs covering low-income children
18 for whom federal vaccine funding is not available, and report the final
19 amount to the association. In addition, the secretary shall perform
20 such calculation for the period of May 1st through December 31st, 2010,
21 as soon as feasible but in no event later than April 1, 2010. The
22 estimates shall be timely communicated to the association.

23 (2) The board of directors of the association shall determine the
24 method and timing of assessment collection in consultation with the
25 department of health. The board shall use a formula designed by the
26 board to ensure the total anticipated nonfederal program cost, minus
27 costs for other children served through state-purchased health care
28 programs covering low-income children, calculated under subsection (1)
29 of this section, is collected and transmitted to the universal vaccine
30 purchase account created in RCW 43.70.720 in order to ensure adequacy
31 of state funds to order state-supplied vaccine from federal centers for
32 disease control and prevention.

33 (3) Each licensed health carrier and each third-party administrator
34 on behalf of its client health benefit plans, must be assessed and is
35 required to timely remit payment for its share of the total amount
36 needed to fund nonfederal program costs calculated by the department of
37 health. Such an assessment includes additional funds as determined

1 necessary by the board to cover the reasonable costs for the
2 association's administration. The board shall determine the assessment
3 methodology, with the intent of ensuring that the nonfederal costs are
4 based on actual usage of vaccine for a health carrier or third-party
5 administrator's covered lives. State and local governments and school
6 districts must pay their portion of vaccine expense for covered lives
7 under this chapter.

8 (4) The board of the association shall develop a mechanism through
9 which the number and cost of doses of vaccine purchased under this
10 chapter that have been administered to children covered by each health
11 carrier and each third-party administrator's client health benefit
12 plans are attributed to each such health carrier and third-party
13 administrator. Except as otherwise permitted by the board, this
14 mechanism must include at least the following: Date of service;
15 patient name; vaccine received; and health benefit plan eligibility.
16 The data must be collected and maintained in a manner consistent with
17 applicable state and federal health information privacy laws.
18 Beginning November 1, 2011, and each November 1st thereafter, the board
19 shall factor the results of this mechanism for the previous year into
20 the determination of the appropriate assessment amount for each health
21 carrier and third-party administrator for the upcoming year.

22 (5) For any year in which the total calculated cost to be received
23 from association members through assessments is less than the total
24 nonfederal program cost, the association must pay the difference to the
25 state for deposit into the universal vaccine purchase account
26 established in RCW 43.70.720. The board may assess, and the health
27 carrier and third-party administrators are obligated to pay, their
28 proportionate share of such costs and appropriate reserves as
29 determined by the board.

30 (6) The aggregate amount to be raised by the association in any
31 year may be reduced by any surpluses remaining from prior years.

32 (7) In order to generate sufficient start-up funding, the
33 association may accept prepayment from member health carriers and
34 third-party administrators, subject to offset of future amounts
35 otherwise owing or other repayment method as determined by the board.
36 The initial deposit of start-up funding must be deposited into the
37 universal vaccine purchase account on or before April 30, 2010.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 5.** (1) The board of the association shall
2 establish a committee for the purposes of developing recommendations to
3 the board regarding selection of vaccines to be purchased in each
4 upcoming year by the department. The committee must be composed of at
5 least five voting board members, including at least three health
6 carrier or third-party administrator members, one physician, and the
7 secretary or the secretary's designee. The committee must also include
8 a representative of vaccine manufacturers, who is a nonvoting member of
9 the committee. The representative of vaccine manufacturers must be
10 chosen by the secretary from a list of three nominees submitted
11 collectively by vaccine manufacturers on an annual basis.

12 (2) In selecting vaccines to purchase, the following factors should
13 be strongly considered by the committee: Patient safety and clinical
14 efficacy, public health and purchaser value, patient and provider
15 choice, and stability of vaccine supply.

16 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 6.** In addition to the duties and powers
17 enumerated elsewhere in this chapter:

18 (1) The association may, pursuant to either vote of its board of
19 directors or request of the secretary, audit compliance with reporting
20 obligations established under the association's plan of operation.
21 Upon failure of any entity that has been audited to reimburse the costs
22 of such audit as certified by vote of the association's board of
23 directors within forty-five days of notice of such vote, the secretary
24 shall assess a civil penalty of one hundred fifty percent of the amount
25 of such costs.

26 (2) The association may establish an interest charge for late
27 payment of any assessment under this chapter. The secretary shall
28 assess a civil penalty against any health carrier or third-party
29 administrator that fails to pay an assessment within three months of
30 notification under section 3 of this act. The civil penalty under this
31 subsection is one hundred fifty percent of such assessment.

32 (3) The secretary and the association are authorized to file liens
33 and seek judgment to recover amounts in arrears and civil penalties,
34 and recover reasonable collection costs, including reasonable
35 attorneys' fees and costs. Civil penalties so levied must be deposited
36 in the universal vaccine purchase account created in RCW 43.70.720.

1 (4) The secretary may adopt rules under chapter 34.05 RCW as
2 necessary to carry out the purposes of this section.

3 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7.** The board of directors of the association
4 shall submit to the secretary, no later than one hundred twenty days
5 after the close of the association's fiscal year, a financial report in
6 a form approved by the secretary.

7 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8.** No liability on the part of, and no cause of
8 action of any nature, shall arise against any member of the board of
9 the association, against an employee or agent of the association, or
10 against any health care provider for any lawful action taken by them in
11 the performance of their duties or required activities under this
12 chapter.

13 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 9.** A new section is added to chapter 43.24 RCW
14 to read as follows:

15 (1)(a) Beginning September 1, 2010, a third-party administrator
16 must register with the department of licensing and renew its
17 registration on an annual basis thereafter prior to December 31st of
18 each year, or within ten days after the registrant changes its name,
19 business name, business address, or business telephone number,
20 whichever occurs sooner.

21 (b) The registrant shall pay the registration or renewal fee
22 established by the department of licensing as provided in RCW
23 43.24.086.

24 (c) Any person or entity that is acting as or holding itself out to
25 be a third-party administrator while failing to have registered under
26 this section is subject to a civil penalty of not less than one
27 thousand dollars nor more than ten thousand dollars for each violation.
28 The civil penalty is in addition to any other penalties that may be
29 imposed for violations of other laws of this state.

30 (2) For the purposes of this section, "third-party administrator"
31 has the same meaning as defined in section 1 of this act.

32 (3) The department of licensing may adopt rules under chapter 34.05
33 RCW as necessary to implement this section.

1 **Sec. 10.** RCW 43.70.720 and 2009 c 564 s 934 are each amended to
2 read as follows:

3 The universal vaccine purchase account is created in the custody of
4 the state treasurer. Receipts from public and private sources for the
5 purpose of increasing access to vaccines for children may be deposited
6 into the account. Expenditures from the account must be used
7 exclusively for the purchase of vaccines, at no cost to health care
8 providers in Washington, to administer to children under nineteen years
9 old who are not eligible to receive vaccines at no cost through federal
10 programs. Only the secretary or the secretary's designee may authorize
11 expenditures from the account. The account is subject to allotment
12 procedures under chapter 43.88 RCW, but an appropriation is not
13 required for expenditures.

14 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 11.** Sections 1 through 8 and 12 through 14 of
15 this act constitute a new chapter in Title 70 RCW.

16 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 12.** (1) The association board may, on or after
17 June 30, 2015, vote to recommend termination of the association if it
18 finds that the original intent of its formation and operation, which is
19 to ensure more cost-effective purchase and distribution of vaccine than
20 if provided through uncoordinated purchase by health care providers,
21 has not been achieved. The association board shall provide notice of
22 the recommendation to the relevant policy and fiscal committees of the
23 legislature within thirty days of the vote being taken by the
24 association board. If the legislature has not acted by the last day of
25 the next regular legislative session to reject the board's
26 recommendation, the board may vote to permanently dissolve the
27 association.

28 (2) In the event of a voluntary or involuntary dissolution of the
29 association, funds remaining in the universal purchase vaccine account
30 created in RCW 43.70.720 that were collected under this chapter must be
31 returned to the member health carrier and third-party administrators in
32 proportion to their previous year's contribution, from any balance
33 remaining following the repayment of any prepayments for start-up
34 funding not previously recouped by such member.

1 (2) The conditions of RCW 84.36.805(2) do not apply to property
2 exempt under this section.

3 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 18.** This act is necessary for the immediate
4 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the
5 state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect
6 immediately."
