1 Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the 2 following:

3 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The joint recommendations from the department of early learning, the superintendent of public instruction, 4 and thrive by five, Washington, to the governor in December 2009, and 5 6 the recommendations from the quality education council to the legislature in January 2010, both supported implementation of a 7 8 voluntary program of early learning within the overall program of basic 9 education. The legislature intends to direct further examination of 10 these recommendations and Attorney General Opinion Number 8 (2009) 11 through the convening of a working group to prepare a comprehensive 12 plan for implementation of a voluntary, universal preschool program.

13 NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. (1) Beginning April 1, 2010, the department collaboration with the office of the 14 of early learning, in 15 superintendent of public instruction, shall convene a working group to develop recommendations for implementing a voluntary, universal 16 preschool program for children ages three and four. Recognizing the 17 program of early learning established in chapter . . ., Laws of 2010 18 19 (Second Substitute House Bill No. 2731), the working group shall 20 proposal for implementing a voluntary universal prepare а prekindergarten program accessible to all three and four year olds in 21 22 Washington. The working group also shall examine the opportunities and 23 barriers of establishing a program of early learning under the program 24 of basic education.

- (2) The working group shall develop recommendations for the phased implementation of a voluntary, universal prekindergarten program, including recommendations relating to the following elements:
 - (a) Criteria for eligible children;

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- 1 (b) Program standards for a developmentally appropriate curriculum 2 to include:
 - (i) Physical well-being, health, and motor development;
 - (ii) Social and emotional development;

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- (iii) Cognition and general knowledge; and
- 6 (iv) Language, literacy, numeracy, and communication;
- 7 (c) Service standards for family support and health-related 8 services to include:
- 9 (i) Working with parents to access appropriate medical, dental, and other health screenings for children;
- 11 (ii) Providing opportunities for parental involvement, education, 12 and leadership development; and
 - (iii) Family contact designed to assist the child's family in:
- 14 (A) Assessing family strengths and needs;
- 15 (B) Setting family goals and reviewing progress;
- 16 (C) Accessing community resources; and
- 17 (D) Coordinating transitions between the program, child care, home, and kindergarten;
 - (d) Criteria for eligible providers;
- 20 (e) Governance responsibilities for the superintendent of public instruction and the department of early learning;
- (f) Funding necessary for implementation, including professional development, facilities, and technical assistance;
 - (g) An implementation timeline;
 - (h) The need for transportation services for the program based on an analysis of the transportation services and arrangements being used in early childhood education and assistance programs and the need to address future transportation services;
- 29 (i) Options for developing socioeconomically diverse classrooms; 30 and
- 31 (j) One or more sliding scale fee structures for possible use in 32 the program of early learning established in chapter . . ., Laws of 33 2010 (Second Substitute House Bill No. 2731), and in the voluntary, 34 universal preschool program for which a comprehensive plan is required 35 under this section.
- 36 (3) While developing the plan, the working group shall review early 37 learning programs in Washington, including the early childhood

- education and assistance program and the federal head start program, as well as voluntary, universal programs in other states.
 - (4) Membership of the working group shall include:

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- 4 (a) One or more representatives from the following: The department 5 of early learning; the office of the superintendent of public 6 instruction; the nongovernmental private-public partnership created in 7 RCW 43.215.070; and the office of the attorney general;
- 8 (b) Two members of the early learning advisory council established 9 in RCW 43.215.090, to be appointed by the council; and
- 10 (c) Additional stakeholders with expertise in early learning to be 11 appointed by the early learning advisory council.
 - (5) The working group shall consult with the achievement gap oversight and accountability committee established in RCW 28A.300.136, and may convene advisory subgroups on specific topics as necessary to assure participation and input from a broad array of diverse stakeholders.
- 17 (6) The working group shall submit a brief progress report by July 1, 2011, and final report with the comprehensive plan by October 1, 2011, to the legislature, the governor, the early learning advisory 20 council, and the quality education council established in RCW 28A.290.010.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. The superintendent of public instruction, the director of the department of early learning, and the director of the office of financial management, or their respective designees, shall report to the appropriate committees of the legislature by January 1, 2012, with recommendations for a budgeting and funding allocation method consistent with the recommendations developed under section 2 of this act.
- 29 **Sec. 4.** RCW 43.215.090 and 2007 c 394 s 3 are each amended to read 30 as follows:
- 31 (1) The early learning advisory council is established to advise 32 the department on statewide early learning ((community needs and 33 progress)) issues that would build a comprehensive system of quality 34 early learning programs and services for Washington's children and 35 families by assessing needs and the availability of services, aligning

resources, developing plans for data collection and professional development of early childhood educators, and establishing key performance measures.

- (2) The council shall work in conjunction with the department to develop a statewide early learning plan that ((crosses systems and sectors to promote)) guides the department in promoting alignment of private and public sector actions, objectives, and resources, and ((to ensure)) ensuring school readiness.
- (3) The council shall include diverse, statewide representation from public, nonprofit, and for-profit entities. Its membership shall reflect regional, racial, and cultural diversity to adequately represent the needs of all children and families in the state.
- (4) Council members shall serve two-year terms. However, to stagger the terms of the council, the initial appointments for twelve of the members shall be for one year. Once the initial one-year to two-year terms expire, all subsequent terms shall be for two years, with the terms expiring on June 30th of the applicable year. The terms shall be staggered in such a way that, where possible, the terms of members representing a specific group do not expire simultaneously.
- (5) The council shall consist of not more than ((twenty-five)) twenty-three members, as follows:
- (a) The governor shall appoint at least one representative from each of the following: The department, the office of financial management, the department of social and health services, the department of health, the higher education coordinating board, and the state board for community and technical colleges;
- (b) One representative from the office of the superintendent of public instruction, to be appointed by the superintendent of public instruction;
- (c) The governor shall appoint ((at least)) seven leaders in early childhood education, with at least one representative with experience or expertise in each of the areas such as the following ((areas)): Children with disabilities, the K-12 system, family day care providers, and child care centers;
- (d) Two members of the house of representatives, one from each caucus, and two members of the senate, one from each caucus, to be appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives and the president of the senate, respectively;

- 1 (e) Two parents, one of whom serves on the department's parent 2 advisory council, to be appointed by the governor;
- 3 (f) ((Two)) One representative((s)) of the private-public 4 partnership created in RCW 43.215.070, to be appointed by the 5 partnership board;
- 6 (g) One representative designated by sovereign tribal governments; and
- 8 (h) One representative from the Washington federation of 9 independent schools.
- 10 (6) The council shall be cochaired by one representative of a state 11 agency and one nongovernmental member, to be elected by the council for 12 two-year terms.

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- (7) The council shall appoint two members and stakeholders with expertise in early learning to serve on the working group created in section 2, chapter . . ., Laws of 2010 (section 2 of this act).
- 16 (8) Each member of the board shall be compensated in accordance 17 with RCW 43.03.240 and reimbursed for travel expenses incurred in 18 carrying out the duties of the board in accordance with RCW 43.03.050 19 and 43.03.060.
- 20 $((\frac{(8)}{)})$ (9) The department shall provide staff support to the 21 council.
- 22 **Sec. 5.** RCW 28A.290.010 and 2009 c 548 s 114 are each amended to 23 read as follows:
- (1) The quality education council is created to recommend and 24 25 inform the ongoing implementation by the legislature of an evolving 26 program of basic education and the financing necessary to support such 27 The council shall develop strategic recommendations on the program of basic education for the common schools. The council shall 28 29 take into consideration the capacity report produced under RCW 28A.300.172 and the availability of data and progress of implementing 30 31 the data systems required under RCW 28A.655.210. Any recommendations 32 for modifications to the program of basic education shall be based on evidence that the programs effectively support student learning. The 33 34 council shall update the statewide strategic recommendations every four 35 years. The recommendations of the council are intended to:
- 36 (a) Inform future educational policy and funding decisions of the legislature and governor;

(b) Identify measurable goals and priorities for the educational system in Washington state for a ten-year time period, including the goals of basic education and ongoing strategies for coordinating statewide efforts to eliminate the achievement gap and reduce student dropout rates; and

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- (c) Enable the state of Washington to continue to implement an evolving program of basic education.
- (2) The council may request updates and progress reports from the office of the superintendent of public instruction, the state board of education, the professional educator standards board, and the department of early learning on the work of the agencies as well as educational working groups established by the legislature.
- 13 (3) The chair of the council shall be selected from the 14 councilmembers. The council shall be composed of the following 15 members:
 - (a) Four members of the house of representatives, with two members representing each of the major caucuses and appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives;
 - (b) Four members of the senate, with two members representing each of the major caucuses and appointed by the president of the senate; and
 - (c) One representative each from the office of the governor, office of the superintendent of public instruction, state board of education, professional educator standards board, and department of early learning.
 - (4) In the 2009 fiscal year, the council shall meet as often as necessary as determined by the chair. In subsequent years, the council shall meet no more than four times a year.
 - (5)(a) The council shall submit an initial report to the governor and the legislature by January 1, 2010, detailing its recommendations, including recommendations for resolving issues or decisions requiring legislative action during the 2010 legislative session, and recommendations for any funding necessary to continue development and implementation of chapter 548, Laws of 2009.
 - (b) The initial report shall, at a minimum, include:
- 35 (i) Consideration of how to establish a statewide beginning teacher 36 mentoring and support system;
- 37 (ii) Recommendations for a program of early learning for at-risk 38 children;

- (iii) A recommended schedule for the concurrent phase-in of the changes to the instructional program of basic education and the implementation of the funding formulas and allocations to support the new instructional program of basic education as established under chapter 548, Laws of 2009. The phase-in schedule shall have full implementation completed by September 1, 2018; and
- (iv) A recommended schedule for phased-in implementation of the new distribution formula for allocating state funds to school districts for the transportation of students to and from school, with phase-in beginning no later than September 1, 2013.
- (6) After receiving the comprehensive plan required under section 2, chapter . . ., Laws of 2010 (section 2 of this act), the council shall develop recommendations for incorporating the plan into the strategic recommendations required under subsection (1) of this section and submit a report to the legislature by January 1, 2011.
- (7) The council shall be staffed by the office of the superintendent of public instruction and the office of financial management. Additional staff support shall be provided by the state entities with representatives on the ((committee)) council. Senate committee services and the house of representatives office of program research may provide additional staff support.
- (((7))) (8) Legislative members of the council shall serve without additional compensation but may be reimbursed for travel expenses in accordance with RCW 44.04.120 while attending sessions of the council or on official business authorized by the council. Nonlegislative members of the council may be reimbursed for travel expenses in accordance with RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060."

28 Correct the title.

EFFECT: As compared to the underlying substitute bill as passed the Senate, the striking amendment: (1) Directs the working group to develop a plan and report recommendations for the phase-in of a voluntary, universal preschool program, and to examine opportunities and barriers of including such a program in the program of basic education; (2) adds elements to the list of recommendations to be included in the plan, and requires the plan be developed with recognition of the early learning program established by HB 2731; (3)

changes the date by which the report from the working group is due to October 1, 2011, with a brief update due July 1, 2011, and requires the final report be delivered also to the Legislature and the Governor; (4) replaces the requirement that the Quality Education Council (QEC) oversee and monitor the working group with a requirement that the QEC, after receiving the final report from the working group in October report to the Legislature by January 1, 2012, recommendations for incorporating the plan into the QEC's strategic recommendations on the program of basic education for the common schools; (5) adds a section directing development of recommendations for a budgeting and funding allocation method based on enrolled eligible students consistent with the comprehensive plan prepared by the working group; (6) adds requirements that the working group consult with the Achievement Gap Oversight and Accountability Committee, and directs the group to be convened by the DEL in collaboration with the OSPI;(7) removes the emergency clause; and (8) makes a technical correction to a reference to the QEC.

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
