3 "NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** In 2009, the legislature changed the name
4 of the department of community, trade, and economic development to the
5 department of commerce and directed the agency to, among other things,
6 develop a report with recommendations on statutory changes to ensure
7 that the department's efforts: Are organized around a concise core
8 mission and aligned with the state's comprehensive plan for economic
9 development; generate greater local capacity; maximize results through
10 partnerships and the use of intermediaries; and provide transparency
11 and increased accountability. Recommendations for creating or
12 consolidating programs deemed important to meeting the department's
13 core mission and recommendations for terminating or transferring
14 specific programs if they are not consistent with the department's core
15 mission were to be included in the report.

16 In accordance with that legislation, chapter 565, Laws of 2009, in
17 November 2009 the department of commerce submitted a plan that
18 establishes a mission of growing and improving jobs in the state and
19 recognizes the need for an innovation-driven economy. The plan also
20 outlines agency priorities, efficiencies, and program transfers that
21 will help to advance the new mission.

22 The primary purpose of this act is to implement portions of the
23 department of commerce plan by transferring certain programs from the
24 department of commerce to other state agencies whose missions are more
25 closely aligned with the core functions of those programs. This act
26 also directs additional efficiencies in state government and directs
27 development of a statewide clean energy strategy, which will better
28 enable the department of commerce to focus on its new mission.

1 **Sec. 2.** RCW 43.330.005 and 1993 c 280 s 1 are each amended to read
2 as follows:

3 The legislature finds that the long-term economic health of the
4 state and its citizens depends upon the strength and vitality of its
5 communities and businesses. It is the intent of this chapter to create
6 a ~~((merged))~~ department of ~~((community, — trade, — and — economic
7 development))~~ commerce that fosters new partnerships for strong and
8 sustainable communities. ~~((The consolidation of the department of
9 trade — and — economic — development — and — the — department — of — community
10 development into one department will))~~ The mission of the department is
11 to grow and improve jobs in Washington and facilitate innovation. To
12 carry out its mission, the department will bring together focused
13 efforts to: Streamline access to business assistance and economic
14 development services by providing ~~((a simpler point of entry for state
15 programs))~~ them thorough sector-based, cluster-based, and regional
16 partners; provide focused and flexible responses to changing economic
17 conditions; generate greater local capacity to respond to both economic
18 growth and environmental challenges; ~~((and))~~ increase accountability to
19 the public, the executive branch, and the legislature(~~(—~~

20 ~~A new department can bring together a focused effort to:))~~ manage
21 growth and achieve sustainable development; diversify the state's
22 economy and export goods and services; provide greater access to
23 economic opportunity; stimulate private sector investment and
24 entrepreneurship; provide stable family-wage jobs and meet the diverse
25 needs of families; provide affordable housing and housing services; and
26 construct public infrastructure~~((; protect our cultural heritage; and
27 promote the health and safety of the state's citizens))~~.

28 The legislature further finds that as a result of the rapid pace of
29 global social and economic change, the state and local communities will
30 require coordinated and creative responses by every segment of the
31 community. The state can play a role in assisting such local efforts
32 by reorganizing state assistance efforts to promote such partnerships.
33 The department has a primary responsibility to provide financial and
34 technical assistance to the communities of the state, to assist in
35 improving the delivery of federal, state, and local programs, and to
36 provide communities with opportunities for productive and coordinated
37 development beneficial to the well-being of communities and their
38 residents. It is the intent of the legislature in ~~((this~~

1 consolidation)) creating the department to maximize the use of local
2 expertise and resources in the delivery of community and economic
3 development services.

4 **Sec. 3.** RCW 43.330.007 and 2009 c 565 s 1 are each amended to read
5 as follows:

6 (1) The purpose of this chapter is to establish the broad outline
7 of the structure of the department of commerce, leaving specific
8 details of its internal organization and management to those charged
9 with its administration. This chapter identifies the broad functions
10 and responsibilities of the department and is intended to provide
11 flexibility to the director to reorganize these functions to more
12 closely reflect its customers, its mission, and its priorities, and to
13 make recommendations for changes.

14 (2) In order to generate greater local capacity, maximize results
15 through partnerships and the use of intermediaries, and leverage the
16 use of state resources, the department shall, in carrying out its
17 business assistance and economic development functions, provide
18 business and economic development services primarily through sector-
19 based, cluster-based, and regionally based organizations rather than
20 providing assistance directly to individual firms.

21 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 4.** The department shall examine the functions
22 and operations of agricultural commodity commissions in the state and
23 collaborate with industry sector and cluster associations on
24 legislation that would enable industries to develop self-financing
25 systems for addressing industry-identified issues such as workforce
26 training, international marketing, quality improvement, and technology
27 deployment. By December 1, 2010, the department shall report to the
28 governor and the legislature on its findings and proposed legislation.

29 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 5.** (1) The governor may, by executive order,
30 delay the transfer of programs and personnel related to independent
31 youth housing, housing assistance for persons with mental illness,
32 crime victims' advocacy and sexual assault services, community
33 mobilization against substance abuse and violence, and the long-term
34 care ombudsman, and may, by July 15, 2010, direct such personnel and
35 programs to be transferred to an agency or agencies other than the

1 agency or agencies specified in this act. In making any decision to
2 transfer programs and personnel, the governor shall rely on the
3 recommendations made by the department of commerce pursuant to
4 subsection (2) of this section.

5 (2) The department of commerce shall facilitate a stakeholder
6 process to develop recommendations on the transfer of programs and
7 personnel relating to the following: Independent youth housing,
8 housing assistance for persons with mental illness, crime victims'
9 advocacy and sexual assault services, community mobilization against
10 substance abuse and violence, and the long-term care ombudsman. The
11 department of commerce shall convene those parties with a direct
12 interest in such programs and the agencies that may be appropriate
13 recipients of the programs. The recommendations shall be delivered to
14 the governor by July 1, 2010.

16 **DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH--PUBLIC HEALTH**

17 **Sec. 101.** RCW 70.05.125 and 2009 c 479 s 48 are each amended to
18 read as follows:

19 (1) The county public health account is created in the state
20 treasury. Funds deposited in the county public health account shall be
21 distributed by the state treasurer to each local public health
22 jurisdiction based upon amounts certified to it by the department of
23 (~~community, trade, and economic development~~) health in consultation
24 with the Washington state association of counties. The account shall
25 include funds distributed under RCW 82.14.200(8) and such funds as are
26 appropriated to the account from the state general fund, the public
27 health services account under RCW 43.72.902, and such other funds as
28 the legislature may appropriate to it.

29 (2)(a) The (~~director~~) secretary of the department of (~~community,~~
30 ~~trade, and economic development~~) health shall certify the amounts to
31 be distributed to each local public health jurisdiction using 1995 as
32 the base year of actual city contributions to local public health.

33 (b) Only if funds are available and in an amount no greater than
34 available funds under RCW 82.14.200(8), the department of community,
35 trade, and economic development shall adjust the amount certified under
36 (a) of this subsection to compensate for any annexation of an area with

1 fifty thousand residents or more to any city as a result of a petition
2 during calendar year 1996 or 1997, or for any city that became newly
3 incorporated as a result of an election during calendar year 1994 or
4 1995. The amount to be adjusted shall be equal to the amount which
5 otherwise would have been lost to the health jurisdiction due to the
6 annexation or incorporation as calculated using the jurisdiction's 1995
7 funding formula.

8 (c) The county treasurer shall certify the actual 1995 city
9 contribution to the department. Funds in excess of the base shall be
10 distributed proportionately among the health jurisdictions based on
11 incorporated population figures as last determined by the office of
12 financial management.

13 (3) Moneys distributed under this section shall be expended
14 exclusively for local public health purposes.

15 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 102.** (1) All powers, duties, and functions of
16 the department of commerce pertaining to county public health
17 assistance are transferred to the department of health. All references
18 to the director or the department of commerce in the Revised Code of
19 Washington shall be construed to mean the secretary or the department
20 of health when referring to the functions transferred in this section.

21 (2)(a) All reports, documents, surveys, books, records, files,
22 papers, or written material in the possession of the department of
23 commerce pertaining to the powers, functions, and duties transferred
24 shall be delivered to the custody of the department of health. All
25 cabinets, furniture, office equipment, motor vehicles, and other
26 tangible property employed by the department of commerce in carrying
27 out the powers, functions, and duties transferred shall be made
28 available to the department of health. All funds, credits, or other
29 assets held in connection with the powers, functions, and duties
30 transferred shall be assigned to the department of health.

31 (b) Any appropriations made to the department of commerce for
32 carrying out the powers, functions, and duties transferred shall, on
33 the effective date of this section, be transferred and credited to the
34 department of health.

35 (c) Whenever any question arises as to the transfer of any
36 personnel, funds, books, documents, records, papers, files, equipment,
37 or other tangible property used or held in the exercise of the powers

1 and the performance of the duties and functions transferred, the
2 director of financial management shall make a determination as to the
3 proper allocation and certify the same to the state agencies concerned.

4 (3) All employees of the department of commerce engaged in
5 performing the powers, functions, and duties transferred are
6 transferred to the jurisdiction of the department of health. All
7 employees classified under chapter 41.06 RCW, the state civil service
8 law, are assigned to the department of health to perform their usual
9 duties upon the same terms as formerly, without any loss of rights,
10 subject to any action that may be appropriate thereafter in accordance
11 with the laws and rules governing state civil service.

12 (4) All rules and all pending business before the department of
13 commerce pertaining to the powers, functions, and duties transferred
14 shall be continued and acted upon by the department of health. All
15 existing contracts and obligations shall remain in full force and shall
16 be performed by the department of health.

17 (5) The transfer of the powers, duties, functions, and personnel of
18 the department of commerce shall not affect the validity of any act
19 performed before the effective date of this section.

20 (6) If apportionments of budgeted funds are required because of the
21 transfers directed by this section, the director of financial
22 management shall certify the apportionments to the agencies affected,
23 the state auditor, and the state treasurer. Each of these shall make
24 the appropriate transfer and adjustments in funds and appropriation
25 accounts and equipment records in accordance with the certification.

26 (7) All classified employees of the department of commerce assigned
27 to the department of health under this section whose positions are
28 within an existing bargaining unit description at the department of
29 health shall become a part of the existing bargaining unit at the
30 department of health and shall be considered an appropriate inclusion
31 or modification of the existing bargaining unit under the provisions of
32 chapter 41.80 RCW.

33 PART II

34 DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL AND HEALTH SERVICES--SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAMS

35 **Sec. 201.** RCW 43.270.020 and 2001 c 48 s 2 are each amended to
36 read as follows:

1 (1) There is established in the department of (~~community, trade,~~
2 ~~and economic development~~) social and health services a grant program
3 to provide incentive for and support for communities to develop
4 targeted and coordinated strategies to reduce the incidence and impact
5 of alcohol, tobacco, or other drug abuse, or violence. This program is
6 known as the community mobilization program.

7 (2) The department (~~of — community, — trade, — and — economic~~
8 ~~development~~) shall make awards, subject to funds appropriated by the
9 legislature, under the following terms:

10 (a) Starting July 1, 2001, funds will be available to countywide
11 programs through a formula developed by the department (~~of — community,~~
12 ~~trade, — and — economic — development~~) in consultation with program
13 contractors, which will take into consideration county population size.

14 (b) In order to be eligible for consideration, applicants must
15 demonstrate, at a minimum:

16 (i) That the community has developed and is committed to carrying
17 out a coordinated strategy of prevention, treatment, and law
18 enforcement activities;

19 (ii) That the community has considered research-based theory when
20 developing its strategy;

21 (iii) That proposals submitted for funding are based on a local
22 assessment of need and address specific objectives contained in a
23 coordinated strategy of prevention, treatment, and law enforcement
24 against alcohol, tobacco, or other drug abuse, or violence;

25 (iv) Evidence of active participation in preparation of the
26 proposal and specific commitments to implementing the community-wide
27 agenda by leadership from education, law enforcement, local government,
28 tribal government, and treatment entities in the community, and the
29 opportunity for meaningful involvement from others such as neighborhood
30 and citizen groups, businesses, human service, health and job training
31 organizations, and other key elements of the community, particularly
32 those whose responsibilities in law enforcement, treatment, prevention,
33 education, or other community efforts provide direct, ongoing contact
34 with substance abusers or those who exhibit violent behavior, or those
35 at risk for alcohol, tobacco, or other drug abuse, or violent behavior;

36 (v) Evidence of additional local resources committed to the
37 applicant's strategy totaling at least twenty-five percent of funds
38 awarded under this section. These resources may consist of public or

1 private funds, donated goods or services, and other measurable
2 commitments, including in-kind contributions such as volunteer
3 services, materials, supplies, physical facilities, or a combination
4 thereof; and

5 (vi) That the funds applied for, if received, will not be used to
6 replace funding for existing activities.

7 (c) At a minimum, grant applications must include the following:

8 (i) A definition of geographic area;

9 (ii) A needs assessment describing the extent and impact of
10 alcohol, tobacco, or other drug abuse, and violence in the community,
11 including an explanation of those who are most severely impacted and
12 those most at risk of substance abuse or violent behavior;

13 (iii) An explanation of the community-wide strategy for prevention,
14 treatment, and law enforcement activities related to alcohol, tobacco,
15 or other drug abuse, or violence, with particular attention to those
16 who are most severely impacted and/or those most at risk of alcohol,
17 tobacco, or other drug abuse, or violent behavior;

18 (iv) An explanation of who was involved in development of the
19 strategy and what specific commitments have been made to carry it out;

20 (v) Identification of existing prevention, education, treatment,
21 and law enforcement resources committed by the applicant, including
22 financial and other support, and an explanation of how the applicant's
23 strategy involves and builds on the efforts of existing organizations
24 or coalitions that have been carrying out community efforts against
25 alcohol, tobacco, or other drug abuse, or violence;

26 (vi) Identification of activities that address specific objectives
27 in the strategy for which additional resources are needed;

28 (vii) Identification of additional local resources, including
29 public or private funds, donated goods or services, and other
30 measurable commitments, that have been committed to the activities
31 identified in (c)(vi) of this subsection;

32 (viii) Identification of activities that address specific
33 objectives in the strategy for which funding is requested;

34 (ix) For each activity for which funding is requested, an
35 explanation in sufficient detail to demonstrate:

36 (A) Feasibility through deliberative design, specific objectives,
37 and a realistic plan for implementation;

1 (B) A rationale for how this activity will achieve measurable
2 results and how it will be evaluated;

3 (C) That funds requested are necessary and appropriate to
4 effectively carry out the activity; and

5 (x) Identification of a contracting agent meeting state
6 requirements for each activity proposed for funding.

7 Each contracting agent must execute a written agreement with its
8 local community mobilization advisory board that reflects the duties
9 and powers of each party.

10 (3) Activities that may be funded through this grant program
11 include those that:

12 (a) Prevent alcohol, tobacco, or other drug abuse, or violence
13 through educational efforts, development of positive alternatives,
14 intervention with high-risk groups, and other prevention strategies;

15 (b) Support effective treatment by increasing access to and
16 availability of treatment opportunities, particularly for underserved
17 or highly impacted populations, developing aftercare and support
18 mechanisms, and other strategies to increase the availability and
19 effectiveness of treatment;

20 (c) Provide meaningful consequences for participation in illegal
21 activity and promote safe and healthy communities through support of
22 law enforcement strategies;

23 (d) Create or build on efforts by existing community programs,
24 coordinate their efforts, and develop cooperative efforts or other
25 initiatives to make most effective use of resources to carry out the
26 community's strategy against alcohol, tobacco, or other drug abuse, or
27 violence; and

28 (e) Other activities that demonstrate both feasibility and a
29 rationale for how the activity will achieve measurable results in the
30 strategy against alcohol, tobacco, or other drug abuse, or violence.

31 **Sec. 202.** RCW 43.270.070 and 2001 c 48 s 3 are each amended to
32 read as follows:

33 The department of (~~community, trade, and economic development~~)
34 social and health services shall ask communities for suggestions on
35 state practices, policies, and priorities that would help communities
36 implement their strategies against alcohol, tobacco, or other drug
37 abuse, or violence. The department of (~~community, trade, and economic~~

1 development)) social and health services shall review and respond to
2 those suggestions making necessary changes where feasible, making
3 recommendations to the legislature where appropriate, and providing an
4 explanation as to why suggested changes cannot be accomplished, if the
5 suggestions cannot be acted upon.

6 **Sec. 203.** RCW 43.270.080 and 2001 c 48 s 4 are each amended to
7 read as follows:

8 The department of (~~community, trade, and economic development~~)
9 social and health services may receive such gifts, grants, and
10 endowments from public or private sources as may be made from time to
11 time, in trust or otherwise, for the use and benefit of the purposes of
12 RCW 43.270.010 through 43.270.080 and expend the same or any income
13 therefrom according to the terms of the gifts, grants, or endowments.

14 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 204.** (1) All powers, duties, and functions of
15 the department of commerce pertaining to the community mobilization
16 against substance abuse program are transferred to the department of
17 social and health services. All references to the director or the
18 department of commerce in the Revised Code of Washington shall be
19 construed to mean the secretary or the department of social and health
20 services when referring to the functions transferred in this section.

21 (2)(a) All reports, documents, surveys, books, records, files,
22 papers, or written material in the possession of the department of
23 commerce pertaining to the powers, functions, and duties transferred
24 shall be delivered to the custody of the department of social and
25 health services. All cabinets, furniture, office equipment, motor
26 vehicles, and other tangible property employed by the department of
27 commerce in carrying out the powers, functions, and duties transferred
28 shall be made available to the department of social and health
29 services. All funds, credits, or other assets held in connection with
30 the powers, functions, and duties transferred shall be assigned to the
31 department of social and health services.

32 (b) Any appropriations made to the department of commerce for

15 state civil service.

16 (4) All rules and all pending business before the department of
17 commerce pertaining to the powers, functions, and duties transferred
18 shall be continued and acted upon by the department of social and
19 health services. All existing contracts and obligations shall remain
20 in full force and shall be performed by the department of social and
21 health services.

22 (5) The transfer of the powers, duties, functions, and personnel of
23 the department of commerce shall not affect the validity of any act
24 performed before the effective date of this section.

25 (6) If apportionments of budgeted funds are required because of the
26 transfers directed by this section, the director of financial
27 management shall certify the apportionments to the agencies affected,
28 the state auditor, and the state treasurer. Each of these shall make
29 the appropriate transfer and adjustments in funds and appropriation
30 accounts and equipment records in accordance with the certification.

31 (7) All classified employees of the department of commerce assigned
32 to the department of social and health services under this section
33 whose positions are within an existing bargaining unit description at
34 the department of social and health services shall become a part of the
35 existing bargaining unit at the department of social and health
36 services and shall be considered an appropriate inclusion or
37 modification of the existing bargaining unit under the provisions of
38 chapter 41.80 RCW.

1 PART III

2 DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH--DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES

3 Sec. 301. RCW 43.330.210 and 2009 c 565 s 11 are each amended to
4 read as follows:

5 The developmental disabilities endowment governing board is
6 established to design and administer the developmental disabilities
7 endowment. To the extent funds are appropriated for this purpose, the
8 director of the department (~~of commerce~~) shall provide staff and
9 administrative support to the governing board.

10 (1) The governing board shall consist of seven members as follows:

11 (a) Three of the members, who shall be appointed by the governor,
12 shall be persons who have demonstrated expertise and leadership in
13 areas such as finance, actuarial science, management, business, or
14 public policy.

15 (b) Three members of the board, who shall be appointed by the
16 governor, shall be persons who have demonstrated expertise and
17 leadership in areas such as business, developmental disabilities
18 service design, management, or public policy, and shall be family
19 members of persons with developmental disabilities.

20 (c) The seventh member of the board, who shall serve as chair of
21 the board, shall be appointed by the remaining six members of the
22 board.

23 (2) Members of the board shall serve terms of four years and may be
24 appointed for successive terms of four years at the discretion of the
25 appointing authority. However, the governor may stagger the terms of
26 the initial six members of the board so that approximately one-fourth
27 of the members' terms expire each year.

28 (3) Members of the board shall be compensated for their service
29 under RCW 43.03.240 and shall be reimbursed for travel expenses as
30 provided in RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.

31 (4) The board shall meet periodically as specified by the call of
32 the chair, or a majority of the board.

33 (5) Members of the governing board and the state investment board
34 shall not be considered an insurer of the funds or assets of the
35 endowment trust fund or the individual trust accounts. Neither of
36 these two boards or their members shall be liable for the action or
37 inaction of the other.

1 (6) Members of the governing board and the state investment board
2 are not liable to the state, to the fund, or to any other person as a
3 result of their activities as members, whether ministerial or
4 discretionary, except for willful dishonesty or intentional violations
5 of law. The department and the state investment board, respectively,
6 may purchase liability insurance for members.

7 **Sec. 302.** RCW 43.330.240 and 2009 c 565 s 12 are each amended to
8 read as follows:

9 The department (~~(of — commerce)~~) shall adopt rules for the
10 implementation of policies established by the governing board in RCW
11 43.330.200 through 43.330.230 (as recodified by this act). Such rules
12 will be consistent with those statutes and chapter 34.05 RCW.

28 of health when referring to the functions transferred in this section.

29 (2)(a) All reports, documents, surveys, books, records, files,

1 support of the public and organizations and institutions that will
2 ultimately be responsible for implementation and execution of the plan;

4 (c) Establishes policies and practices needed to ensure the
5 effective implementation of the strategy.

6 (2) The legislature further finds that energy drives the entire
7 modern economy from petroleum for vehicles to electricity to light
8 homes and power businesses. The legislature further finds that the
9 nation and the world have started the transition to a clean energy
10 economy, with significant improvements in energy efficiency and
11 investments in new clean and renewable energy resources and
12 technologies. The legislature further finds this transition may
13 increase energy costs and it is imperative this increase be mitigated
14 for Washington's energy cost advantage.

15 (3) The legislature finds and declares that it is the continuing
16 purpose of state government, consistent with other essential
17 considerations of state policy, to foster wise and efficient energy use
18 and to promote energy self-sufficiency through the use of indigenous

33 and support to the state for energy efficiency, renewable energy,

EFFECT: Provisions relating to small business assistance, establishing a division for community services and housing, and planning for a new community services and housing agency are removed. Provisions relating to providing business and economic development assistance through sector-based, cluster-based, and regionally-based organizations are added.

Programs related to independent youth housing, housing assistance for persons with mental illness, crime victims' advocacy and sexual assault services, community mobilization against substance abuse and violence, and the long-term care ombudsman are transferred out of the Department of Commerce subject to a decision by the Governor to delay the transfer or transfer to an agency other than the one specified in the bill.

Provisions related to energy planning and the state energy strategy are changed.
