1       AN ACT Relating to voter registration; amending RCW 29A.04.079,  
2 29A.04.109, 29A.04.163, 29A.04.210, 29A.08.010, 29A.08.030, 29A.08.105,  
3 29A.08.107, 29A.08.110, 29A.08.115, 29A.08.125, 29A.08.130, 29A.08.135,  
4 29A.08.140, 29A.08.210, 29A.08.230, 29A.08.260, 29A.08.310, 29A.08.330,  
5 29A.08.350, 29A.08.410, 29A.08.420, 29A.08.430, 29A.08.440, 29A.08.510,  
6 29A.08.520, 29A.08.610, 29A.08.625, 29A.08.630, 29A.08.635, 29A.08.640,  
7 29A.08.720, 29A.08.760, 29A.40.010, 29A.40.020, 29A.40.061, 29A.40.091,  
8 29A.60.235, and 46.20.155; reenacting and amending RCW 29A.04.611,

12 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

13       **Sec. 1.** RCW 29A.04.079 and 2003 c 111 s 114 are each amended to  
14 read as follows:

15       An "infamous crime" is a crime punishable by death in the state  
16 penitentiary or imprisonment in a state correctional facility. Neither  
17 an adjudication in juvenile court pursuant to chapter 13.40 RCW, nor a  
18 conviction for a misdemeanor or gross misdemeanor, is an "infamous  
19 crime."

1           **Sec. 2.** RCW 29A.04.109 and 2003 c 111 s 119 are each amended to  
2 read as follows:

3           "Overseas voter" means any elector of the state of Washington  
4 outside the territorial limits of the United States (~~(or the District~~  
5 ~~of Columbia)~~).

6           **Sec. 3.** RCW 29A.04.163 and 2003 c 111 s 127 are each amended to  
7 read as follows:

8           "Service voter" means any elector of the state of Washington who is  
9 a member of the armed forces under 42 U.S.C. Sec. 1973 ff-6 while in  
10 active service, is a member of a reserve component of the armed forces,  
11 is a student or member of the faculty at a United States military  
12 academy, is a member of the merchant marine of the United States, (~~is~~  
13 ~~a program participant as defined in RCW 40.24.020,~~) or is a member of  
14 a religious group or welfare agency officially attached to and serving  
15 with the armed forces of the United States.

16           **Sec. 4.** RCW 29A.04.210 and 2003 c 111 s 133 are each amended to  
17 read as follows:

18           Except for service and overseas voters, only ((a)) persons  
19 registered ((voter)) to vote shall be permitted to vote:

- 20           (1) At any election held for the purpose of electing persons to  
21 public office;
- 22           (2) At any recall election of a public officer;
- 23           (3) At any election held for the submission of a measure to any  
24 voting constituency;
- 25           (4) At any primary election.

26           This section does not apply to elections where being registered to  
27 vote is not a prerequisite to voting.

28           **Sec. 5.** RCW 29A.04.611 and 2006 c 207 s 1 and 2006 c 206 s 2 are  
29 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

30           The secretary of state as chief election officer shall make  
31 reasonable rules in accordance with chapter 34.05 RCW not inconsistent  
32 with the federal and state election laws to effectuate any provision of  
33 this title and to facilitate the execution of its provisions in an  
34 orderly, timely, and uniform manner relating to any federal, state,

1 county, city, town, and district elections. To that end the secretary  
2 shall assist local election officers by devising uniform forms and  
3 procedures.

4 In addition to the rule-making authority granted otherwise by this  
5 section, the secretary of state shall make rules governing the  
6 following provisions:

7 (1) The maintenance of voter registration records;

8 (2) The preparation, maintenance, distribution, review, and filing  
9 of precinct maps;

10 (3) Standards for the design, layout, and production of ballots;

11 (4) The examination and testing of voting systems for  
12 certification;

13 (5) The source and scope of independent evaluations of voting  
14 systems that may be relied upon in certifying voting systems for use in  
15 this state;

16 (6) Standards and procedures for the acceptance testing of voting  
17 systems by counties;

18 (7) Standards and procedures for testing the programming of vote  
19 tallying software for specific primaries and elections;

20 (8) Standards and procedures for the preparation and use of each  
21 type of certified voting system including procedures for the operation  
22 of counting centers where vote tallying systems are used;

23 (9) Standards and procedures to ensure the accurate tabulation and  
24 canvassing of ballots;

25 (10) Consistency among the counties of the state in the preparation  
26 of ballots, the operation of vote tallying systems, and the canvassing  
27 of primaries and elections;

28 (11) Procedures to ensure the secrecy of a voter's ballot when a  
29 small number of ballots are counted at the polls or at a counting  
30 center;

31 (12) The use of substitute devices or means of voting when a voting  
32 device at the polling place is found to be defective, the counting of  
33 votes cast on the defective device, the counting of votes cast on the  
34 substitute device, and the documentation that must be submitted to the  
35 county auditor regarding such circumstances;

36 (13) Procedures for the transportation of sealed containers of  
37 voted ballots or sealed voting devices;

- 1 (14) The acceptance and filing of documents via electronic  
2 facsimile;
- 3 (15) Voter registration applications and records;
- 4 (16) The use of voter registration information in the conduct of  
5 elections;
- 6 (17) The coordination, delivery, and processing of voter  
7 registration records accepted by driver licensing agents or the  
8 department of licensing;
- 9 (18) The coordination, delivery, and processing of voter  
10 registration records accepted by agencies designated by the governor to  
11 provide voter registration services;
- 12 (19) Procedures to receive and distribute voter registration  
13 applications by mail;
- 14 (20) Procedures for a voter to change his or her voter registration  
15 address within a county by telephone;
- 16 (21) Procedures for a voter to change the name under which he or  
17 she is registered to vote;
- 18 (22) Procedures for canceling dual voter registration records and  
19 for maintaining records of persons whose voter registrations have been  
20 canceled;
- 21 (23) Procedures for the electronic transfer of voter registration  
22 records between county auditors and the office of the secretary of  
23 state;
- 24 (24) Procedures and forms for declarations of candidacy;
- 25 (25) Procedures and requirements for the acceptance and filing of  
26 declarations of candidacy by electronic means;
- 27 (26) Procedures for the circumstance in which two or more  
28 candidates have a name similar in sound or spelling so as to cause  
29 confusion for the voter;
- 30 (27) Filing for office;
- 31 (28) The order of positions and offices on a ballot;
- 32 (29) Sample ballots;
- 33 (30) Independent evaluations of voting systems;
- 34 (31) The testing, approval, and certification of voting systems;
- 35 (32) The testing of vote tallying software programming;
- 36 (33) Standards and procedures to prevent fraud and to facilitate  
37 the accurate processing and canvassing of absentee ballots and mail

2 hardware and software for automated signature verification systems;

9 (37) The tabulation of paper ballots before the close of the polls;  
10 (38) The accessibility of polling places and registration  
11 facilities that are accessible to elderly and disabled persons;  
12 (39) The aggregation of precinct results if reporting the results  
13 of a single precinct could jeopardize the secrecy of a person's ballot;  
14 (40) Procedures for conducting a statutory recount;  
15 (41) Procedures for filling vacancies in congressional offices if  
16 the general statutory time requirements for availability of absentee  
17 ballots, certification, canvassing, and related procedures cannot be  
18 met;  
19 (42) Procedures for the statistical sampling of signatures for

28 (46) Procedures for conducting special elections regarding nuclear

30 of absentee ballots, certification, canvassing, and related procedures  
31 cannot be met;  
32 (47) Procedures for conducting partisan primary elections;  
33 (48) Standards and procedures for the proper conduct of voting  
34 during the early voting period to provide accessibility for the blind  
35 or visually impaired;  
36 (49) Standards for voting technology and systems used by the state  
37 or any political subdivision to be accessible for individuals with  
38 disabilities, including nonvisual accessibility for the blind and

1 visually impaired, in a manner that provides the same opportunity for  
2 access and participation, including privacy and independence, as other  
3 voters;

4 (50) All data formats for transferring voter registration data on  
5 electronic or machine-readable media for the purpose of administering  
6 the statewide voter registration list required by the Help America Vote  
7 Act (P.L. 107-252);

8 (51) Defining the interaction of electronic voter registration  
9 election management systems employed by each county auditor to maintain  
10 a local copy of each county's portion of the official state list of  
11 registered voters;

12 (52) Provisions and procedures to implement the state-based  
13 administrative complaint procedure as required by the Help America Vote  
14 Act (P.L. 107-252);

15 (53) Facilitating the payment of local government grants to local  
16 government election officers or vendors; and

17 (54) Standards for the verification of signatures on absentee,  
18 mail, and provisional ballot envelopes.

19 **Sec. 6.** RCW 29A.08.010 and 2006 c 320 s 2 are each amended to read  
20 as follows:

21 ~~((As used in this chapter:—"Information required for voter  
22 registration" means))~~ (1) The minimum information provided on a voter  
23 registration application that is required ~~((by the county auditor))~~ in  
24 order to place a voter registration applicant on the voter registration  
25 rolls~~((This information))~~ includes:

26 ~~((+1))~~ (a) Name;

27 ~~((+2))~~ (b) Residential address;

28 ~~((+3))~~ (c) Date of birth;

29 ~~((+4) Washington state driver's license number or Washington state  
30 identification card number, or the last four digits of the applicant's  
31 Social Security number if the applicant does not have a Washington  
32 state driver's license or Washington state identification card;~~

33 ~~+5))~~ (d) A signature attesting to the truth of the information  
34 provided on the application; and

35 ~~((+6))~~ (e) A check or indication in the box confirming the  
36 individual is a United States citizen.

1       (2) The residential address provided must identify the actual  
2 physical residence of the voter in Washington, as defined in RCW  
3 29A.04.151, with detail sufficient to allow the voter to be assigned to  
4 the proper precinct and to locate the voter to confirm his or her  
5 residence for purposes of verifying qualification to vote under Article  
6 VI, section 1 of the state Constitution. A residential address may be  
7 either a traditional address or a nontraditional address. A  
8 traditional address consists of a street number and name, optional  
9 apartment number or unit number, and city or town, as assigned by a  
10 local government, which serves to identify the parcel or building of  
11 residence and the unit if a multiunit residence. A nontraditional  
12 address consists of a narrative description of the location of the  
13 voter's residence, and may be used when a traditional address has not  
14 been assigned to the voter's residence. ~~((If the postal service does  
15 not deliver mail to the voter's residential address, or the voter  
16 prefers to receive mail at a different address, the voter may  
17 separately provide the mailing address at which they receive mail. Any  
18 mailing address provided shall be used only for mail delivery purposes  
19 and not for precinct assignment or confirmation of residence for voter  
20 qualification purposes.~~

21       ~~If the individual does not have a driver's license, state  
22 identification card, or Social Security number, the registrant must be  
23 issued a unique voter registration number in order to be placed on the  
24 voter registration rolls.))~~

25       (3) All other information supplied is ancillary and not to be used  
26 as grounds for not registering an applicant to vote.

27       (4) Modification of the language of the official Washington state  
28 voter registration form by the voter will not be accepted and will  
29 cause the rejection of the registrant's application.

30       **Sec. 7.** RCW 29A.08.030 and 2005 c 246 s 3 are each amended to read  
31 as follows:

32       The definitions set forth in this section apply throughout this  
33 chapter, unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

34       (1) "Verification notice" means a notice sent by the county auditor  
35 or secretary of state to a voter registration applicant and is used to  
36 verify or collect information about the applicant in order to complete

1 the registration. The verification notice must be designed to include  
2 a postage prepaid, preaddressed return form by which the applicant may  
3 verify or send information.

4 (2) "Acknowledgement notice" means a notice sent by nonforwardable  
5 mail by the county auditor or secretary of state to a registered voter  
6 to acknowledge a voter registration transaction, which can include  
7 initial registration, transfer, or reactivation of an inactive  
8 registration. An acknowledgement notice may be a voter registration  
9 card.

10 (3) "Identification notice" means a notice sent to a provisionally  
11 registered voter to confirm the applicant's identity.

12 (4) "Confirmation notice" means a notice sent to a registered voter  
13 by first-class forwardable mail at the address indicated on the voter's  
14 permanent registration record and to any other address at which the  
15 county auditor or secretary of state could reasonably expect mail to be  
16 received by the voter in order to confirm the voter's residence  
17 address. The confirmation notice must be designed to include a postage  
18 prepaid, preaddressed return form by which the registrant may verify  
19 the address information.

20 **Sec. 8.** RCW 29A.08.105 and 2004 c 267 s 105 are each amended to  
21 read as follows:

22 (1) In compliance with the Help America Vote Act (P.L. 107-252),  
23 the centralized statewide voter registration list maintained by the  
24 secretary of state is the official list of eligible voters for all  
25 elections.

26 (2) In all counties, the county auditor shall be the chief  
27 registrar of voters for every precinct within the county. ((The  
28 auditor may appoint registration assistants to assist in registering  
29 persons residing in the county. Each registration assistant holds  
30 office at the pleasure of the county auditor and must be a registered  
31 voter.

32 ~~(3) The county auditor shall ensure that mail-in voter registration~~  
33 ~~application forms are readily available to the public at locations to~~  
34 ~~include but not limited to the elections office, and all common~~  
35 ~~schools, fire stations, and public libraries.))~~



1       **Sec. 9.** RCW 29A.08.107 and 2005 c 246 s 4 are each amended to read  
2 as follows:

3       ~~(1) ((The secretary of state must review the information provided~~  
4 ~~by each voter registration applicant to ensure that))~~ If the  
5 ~~((provided))~~ driver's license number, state identification card number,  
6 or last four digits of the Social Security number provided by the  
7 applicant match the information maintained by the Washington department  
8 of licensing or the Social Security administration, and the applicant  
9 provided all information required by RCW 29A.08.010, the applicant must  
10 be registered to vote. ((If a match cannot be made, the secretary of  
11 state or county auditor must correspond with the applicant to resolve  
12 the discrepancy.

13       ~~(2) If the applicant fails to respond to any correspondence~~  
14 ~~required in this section to confirm information provided on a voter~~  
15 ~~registration application within forty five days, the applicant will not~~  
16 ~~be registered to vote. The secretary of state shall forward the~~  
17 ~~application to the appropriate county auditor for document storage.~~

18       ~~(3) Only after the secretary of state has confirmed that the~~  
19 ~~provided driver's license number, state identification card number, or~~  
20 ~~last four digits of the applicant's Social Security number match~~  
21 ~~existing records with the Washington department of licensing or the~~  
22 ~~Social Security administration, or determined that the applicant does~~  
23 ~~not have a driver's license number, state identification card number,~~  
24 ~~or Social Security number may the applicant be placed on the official~~  
25 ~~list of registered voters.~~

26       ~~(4) In order to prevent duplicate registration records, all~~  
27 ~~complete voter registration applications must be screened against~~  
28 ~~existing voter registration records in the official statewide voter~~  
29 ~~registration list. If a match of an existing record is found in the~~  
30 ~~official list, the record must be updated with the new information~~  
31 ~~provided on the application. If the new information indicates that the~~  
32 ~~voter has changed his or her county of residence, the application must~~  
33 ~~be forwarded to the voter's new county of residence for processing.))~~

34       (2) If the driver's license number, state identification card  
35 number, or last four digits of the Social Security number provided by  
36 the applicant do not match the information maintained by the Washington  
37 department of licensing or the Social Security administration, or if  
38 the applicant does not provide a Washington driver's license, a

1 Washington state identification card, or a Social Security number, the  
2 applicant must be provisionally registered to vote. An identification  
3 notice must be sent to the voter to obtain the correct driver's license  
4 number, state identification card number, last four digits of the  
5 Social Security number, or one of the following forms of alternate  
6 identification:

7 (a) Valid photo identification;

8 (b) A valid enrollment card of a federally recognized Indian tribe  
9 in Washington state;

10 (c) A copy of a current utility bill;

11 (d) A current bank statement;

12 (e) A copy of a current government check;

13 (f) A copy of a current paycheck; or

14 (g) A government document, other than a voter registration card,  
15 that shows both the name and address of the voter.

16 (3) The ballot of a provisionally registered voter may not be  
17 counted until the voter provides a driver's license number, a state  
18 identification card number, or the last four digits of a Social  
19 Security number that matches the information maintained by the  
20 Washington department of licensing or the Social Security  
21 administration, or until the voter provides alternate identification.  
22 The identification must be provided no later than the day before  
23 certification of the primary or election. If the voter provides one of  
24 the forms of identification in subsection (2) of this section, the  
25 voter's registration status must be changed from provisionally  
26 registered to registered.

27 (4) A provisional registration must remain on the official list of  
28 registered voters through at least two general elections for federal  
29 office. If, after two general elections for federal office, the voter  
30 still has not verified his or her identity, the provisional  
31 registration may be canceled.

32 (5) The requirements of this section do not apply to an overseas or  
33 service voter who registers to vote by signing the return envelope of  
34 an absentee ballot, or to a registered voter transferring his or her  
35 registration.

36 **Sec. 10.** RCW 29A.08.110 and 2005 c 246 s 5 are each amended to  
37 read as follows:

1 (1) An application is considered complete only if it contains the  
2 (~~applicant's name, complete valid residence address, date of birth,~~  
3 ~~signature attesting to the truth of the information provided, a mark in~~  
4 ~~the check-off box confirming United States citizenship, and an~~  
5 ~~indication that the provided driver's license number, state~~  
6 ~~identification card number, or Social Security number has been~~  
7 ~~confirmed by the secretary of state. If it is not complete, the~~  
8 ~~auditor shall promptly mail a verification notice of the deficiency to~~  
9 ~~the applicant. This verification notice shall require the applicant to~~  
10 ~~provide the missing information. If the verification notice is not~~  
11 ~~returned by the applicant within forty five days or is returned as~~  
12 ~~undeliverable, the name of the applicant shall not be placed on the~~

20 mailing or date of delivery, whichever is applicable. The auditor  
21 shall record the appropriate precinct identification, taxing district  
22 identification, and date of registration on the voter's record in the  
23 state voter registration list. Any mailing address provided shall be  
24 used only for mail delivery purposes, and not for precinct assignment  
25 or residency purposes. Within (~~forty five~~) sixty days after the  
26 receipt of an application (~~but no later than seven days before the~~  
27 ~~next primary, special election, or general election~~) or transfer, the  
28 auditor shall send to the applicant, by first-class nonforwardable

10 **Sec. 11.** RCW 29A.08.115 and 2005 c 246 s 8 are each amended to  
11 read as follows:

12 A person or organization collecting voter registration application  
13 forms must transmit the forms to the secretary of state or a county  
14 auditor (~~at least once weekly~~) within five business days. The  
15 registration date on such forms will be the date they are received by  
16 the secretary of state or county auditor.

17 **Sec. 12.** RCW 29A.08.125 and 2005 c 246 s 9 are each amended to  
18 read as follows:

19 (1) The office of the secretary of state shall maintain a statewide  
20 voter registration database. This database must be a centralized,  
21 uniform, interactive computerized statewide voter registration list  
22 that contains the name and registration information of every registered  
23 voter in the state.

24 (2) The statewide list is the official list of registered voters  
25 for the conduct of all elections.

26 (3) The statewide list must include, but is not limited to, the  
27 name, date of birth, residence address, signature, gender, and date of  
28 registration of every legally registered voter in the state.

29 (4) A unique identifier must be assigned to each registered voter  
30 in the state.

31 (5) The database must be coordinated with other government  
32 databases within the state including, but not limited to, the  
33 department of corrections, the department of licensing, the department  
34 of health, the administrative office of the courts, and county  
35 auditors. The database may also be coordinated with the databases of  
36 election officials in other states.

1       (6) Authorized employees of the secretary of state and each county  
2 auditor must have immediate electronic access to the information  
3 maintained in the database.

4       (7) Voter registration information received by each county auditor  
5 must be electronically entered into the database. The office of the  
6 secretary of state must provide support, as needed, to enable each  
7 county auditor to enter and maintain voter registration information in  
8 the state database.

9       (8) The secretary of state has data authority over all voter  
10 registration data.

11       (9) The voter registration database must be designed to accomplish  
12 at a minimum, the following:

13       (a) Comply with the help America vote act of 2002 (P.L. 107-252);

14       (b) Identify duplicate voter registrations;

15       (c) Identify suspected duplicate voters;

16       (d) Screen against any available databases maintained by other  
17 government agencies to identify voters who are ineligible to vote due  
18 to a felony conviction, lack of citizenship, or mental incompetence;

19       (e) Provide images of voters' signatures for the purpose of  
20 checking signatures on initiative and referendum petitions;

21       (f) Provide for a comparison between the voter registration  
22 database and the department of licensing change of address database;

23       (g) Provide access for county auditors that includes the  
24 capability to update registrations and search for duplicate  
25 registrations; and

26       (h) Provide for the cancellation of registrations of voters who  
27 have moved out of state.

28       (10) The secretary of state may, upon agreement with other  
29 appropriate jurisdictions, screen against any available databases  
30 maintained by election officials in other states and databases  
31 maintained by federal agencies including, but not limited to, the  
32 federal bureau of investigation, the federal court system, the federal  
33 bureau of prisons, and the bureau of citizenship and immigration  
34 services.

35       (11) The database shall retain information regarding previous  
36 successful appeals of proposed cancellations of registrations in order  
37 to avoid repeated cancellations for the same reason.

1       ~~(12) Each county auditor shall maintain a ((computer file~~  
2 ~~containing a copy of each record))~~ list of all registered voters within  
3 the county that are contained on the official statewide voter  
4 registration list ~~((for that county))~~.

5       ~~((2) The secretary of state shall at least quarterly review and~~  
6 ~~update the records of all registered voters on the official statewide~~  
7 ~~voter registration database to make additions and corrections.~~
