BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

18 privatization of retail and distribution of liquor to result in a

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- system that is more efficient than public sector retail 1 2 distribution. The legislature finds that the present system of state control includes a markup amount at distribution that generates revenue 3 for the state and local governments, and that this markup will be 4 eliminated when liquor sales and distribution are privatized. 5 The 6 legislature further intends that the privatization of liquor sales and 7 distribution not result in revenue losses to state or local governments 8 as compared to projected revenues assumed under state control, not including any separate licenses or franchises. 9
 - (2) Therefore, the legislature directs the liquor control board and the department of revenue, with assistance from legislative staff and the office of financial management, to present a report to the legislature by December 1, 2010, on a recommended method and rates of liquor taxation that would generate the same future projected revenue for the state and local jurisdictions as under the current state control system. In determining what the future projected revenue will be, the liquor control board must consider the markup and taxes paid on liquor as of the effective date of this section and assume that this will increase through a three percent growth factor for future years.
 - (3) The report may include recommendations on tax enforcement and simplification to the current system of liquor taxation and distribution of revenues and whether the license fee established in section 2 of this act is adequate to cover the administrative and enforcement costs of the spirits license.
- 25 (4) The report must include a plan that provides for all state 26 liquor stores and the distribution center to cease operation on July 1, 27 2012, and all inventory and assets to be sold to qualifying licensees 28 or buyers.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 102. A new section is added to chapter 66.08 RCW to read as follows:
- 31 (1) There shall be a spirits retailer's license to be designated as 32 a spirits license to sell spirits at retail in original containers, not 33 to be consumed on the premises where sold.
- 34 (2) The annual fee for the spirits license is one thousand five 35 hundred seventy-eight dollars.

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Sec. 103. RCW 66.04.010 and 2009 c 373 s 1 and 2009 c 271 s 2 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

In this title, unless the context otherwise requires:

- (1) "Alcohol" is that substance known as ethyl alcohol, hydrated oxide of ethyl, or spirit of wine, which is commonly produced by the fermentation or distillation of grain, starch, molasses, or sugar, or other substances including all dilutions and mixtures of this substance. The term "alcohol" does not include alcohol in the possession of a manufacturer or distiller of alcohol fuel, as described in RCW 66.12.130, which is intended to be denatured and used as a fuel for use in motor vehicles, farm implements, and machines or implements of husbandry.
 - (2) "Authorized representative" means a person who:
- 14 (a) Is required to have a federal basic permit issued pursuant to 15 the federal alcohol administration act, 27 U.S.C. Sec. 204;
 - (b) Has its business located in the United States outside of the state of Washington;
 - (c) Acquires ownership of <u>spirits</u>, beer, or wine for transportation into and resale in the state of Washington; and which <u>spirits</u>, beer, or wine is produced by a <u>distiller</u>, brewery, or winery in the United States outside of the state of Washington; and
 - (d) Is appointed by the <u>distiller</u>, brewery, or winery referenced in (c) of this subsection as its authorized representative for marketing and selling its products within the United States in accordance with a written agreement between the authorized representative and such <u>distiller</u>, brewery, or winery pursuant to this title.
 - (3) "Beer" means any malt beverage, flavored malt beverage, or malt liquor as these terms are defined in this chapter.
 - (4) "Beer distributor" means a person who buys beer from a domestic brewery, microbrewery, beer certificate of approval holder, or beer importers, or who acquires foreign produced beer from a source outside of the United States, for the purpose of selling the same pursuant to this title, or who represents such brewer or brewery as agent.
 - (5) "Beer importer" means a person or business within Washington who purchases beer from a beer certificate of approval holder or who acquires foreign produced beer from a source outside of the United States for the purpose of selling the same pursuant to this title.

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1 (6) "Board" means the liquor control board, constituted under this title.

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- (7) "Brewer" or "brewery" means any person engaged in the business of manufacturing beer and malt liquor. Brewer includes a brand owner of malt beverages who holds a brewer's notice with the federal bureau of alcohol, tobacco, and firearms at a location outside the state and whose malt beverage is contract-produced by a licensed in-state brewery, and who may exercise within the state, under a domestic brewery license, only the privileges of storing, selling to licensed beer distributors, and exporting beer from the state.
- (8) "Club" means an organization of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, operated solely for fraternal, benevolent, educational, athletic or social purposes, and not for pecuniary gain.
- (9) "Confection" means a preparation of sugar, honey, or other natural or artificial sweeteners in combination with chocolate, fruits, nuts, dairy products, or flavorings, in the form of bars, drops, or pieces.
- 18 (10) "Consume" includes the putting of liquor to any use, whether 19 by drinking or otherwise.
- 20 (11) (("Contract liquor store" means a business that sells liquor 21 on behalf of the board through a contract with a contract liquor store 22 manager.
- 23 (12))) "Craft distillery" means a distillery that pays the reduced licensing fee under RCW 66.24.140.
- $((\frac{(13)}{(12)}))$ "Dentist" means a practitioner of dentistry duly and regularly licensed and engaged in the practice of his profession within the state pursuant to chapter 18.32 RCW.
- 28 $((\frac{14}{1}))$ <u>(13)</u> "Distiller" means a person engaged in the business of distilling spirits.
- 30 $((\frac{(15)}{)})$ $\underline{(14)}$ "Domestic brewery" means a place where beer and malt liquor are manufactured or produced by a brewer within the state.
- $((\frac{16}{16}))$ <u>(15)</u> "Domestic winery" means a place where wines are manufactured or produced within the state of Washington.
- $((\frac{17}{17}))$ (16) "Drug store" means a place whose principal business is, the sale of drugs, medicines and pharmaceutical preparations and maintains a regular prescription department and employs a registered pharmacist during all hours the drug store is open.

 $((\frac{18}{18}))$ <u>(17)</u> "Druggist" means any person who holds a valid certificate and is a registered pharmacist and is duly and regularly engaged in carrying on the business of pharmaceutical chemistry pursuant to chapter 18.64 RCW.

(((19))) (18) "Employee" means any person employed by the board.

(((20))) <u>(19)</u> "Flavored malt beverage" means:

- (a) A malt beverage containing six percent or less alcohol by volume to which flavoring or other added nonbeverage ingredients are added that contain distilled spirits of not more than forty-nine percent of the beverage's overall alcohol content; or
- (b) A malt beverage containing more than six percent alcohol by volume to which flavoring or other added nonbeverage ingredients are added that contain distilled spirits of not more than one and one-half percent of the beverage's overall alcohol content.

(((21))) <u>(20)</u> "Fund" means 'liquor revolving fund.'

- $((\frac{(22)}{)})$ (21) "Hotel" means buildings, structures, and grounds, having facilities for preparing, cooking, and serving food, that are kept, used, maintained, advertised, or held out to the public to be a place where food is served and sleeping accommodations are offered for pay to transient guests, in which twenty or more rooms are used for the sleeping accommodation of such transient guests. The buildings, structures, and grounds must be located on adjacent property either owned or leased by the same person or persons.
- (((23) "Importer" means a person who buys distilled spirits from a distillery outside the state of Washington and imports such spirituous liquor into the state for sale to the board or for export.
 - (24))) (22) "Imprisonment" means confinement in the county jail.
- ((\(\frac{(25)}{25}\))) (23) "Liquor" includes the four varieties of liquor herein defined (alcohol, spirits, wine and beer), and all fermented, spirituous, vinous, or malt liquor, or combinations thereof, and mixed liquor, a part of which is fermented, spirituous, vinous or malt liquor, or otherwise intoxicating; and every liquid or solid or semisolid or other substance, patented or not, containing alcohol, spirits, wine or beer, and all drinks or drinkable liquids and all preparations or mixtures capable of human consumption, and any liquid, semisolid, solid, or other substance, which contains more than one percent of alcohol by weight shall be conclusively deemed to be

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intoxicating. Liquor does not include confections or food products that contain one percent or less of alcohol by weight.

- $((\frac{26}{1}))$ (24) "Malt beverage" or "malt liquor" means any beverage such as beer, ale, lager beer, stout, and porter obtained by the alcoholic fermentation of an infusion or decoction of pure hops, or pure extract of hops and pure barley malt or other wholesome grain or cereal in pure water containing not more than eight percent of alcohol by weight, and not less than one-half of one percent of alcohol by volume. For the purposes of this title, any such beverage containing more than eight percent of alcohol by weight shall be referred to as "strong beer."
- $((\frac{27}{27}))$ <u>(25)</u> "Manufacturer" means a person engaged in the preparation of liquor for sale, in any form whatsoever.
 - $((\frac{(28)}{)})$ $\underline{(26)}$ "Nightclub" means an establishment that provides entertainment and has as its primary source of revenue (a) the sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises, (b) cover charges, or (c) both, and has an occupancy load of one hundred or more.
- $((\frac{(29)}{)})$ "Package" means any container or receptacle used for 19 holding liquor.
- $((\frac{30}{30}))$ <u>(28)</u> "Passenger vessel" means any boat, ship, vessel, barge, or other floating craft of any kind carrying passengers for compensation.
- $((\frac{(31)}{)})$ <u>(29)</u> "Permit" means a permit for the purchase of liquor 24 under this title.
- $((\frac{(32)}{)})$ "Person" means an individual, copartnership, 26 association, or corporation.
- $((\frac{(33)}{)})$ $\underline{(31)}$ "Physician" means a medical practitioner duly and regularly licensed and engaged in the practice of his profession within the state pursuant to chapter 18.71 RCW.
 - (((34))) <u>(32)</u> "Prescription" means a memorandum signed by a physician and given by him to a patient for the obtaining of liquor pursuant to this title for medicinal purposes.
 - (((35))) <u>(33)</u> "Public place" includes streets and alleys of incorporated cities and towns; state or county or township highways or roads; buildings and grounds used for school purposes; public dance halls and grounds adjacent thereto; those parts of establishments where beer may be sold under this title, soft drink establishments, public buildings, public meeting halls, lobbies, halls and dining rooms of

hotels, restaurants, theatres, stores, garages and filling stations which are open to and are generally used by the public and to which the public is permitted to have unrestricted access; railroad trains, stages, and other public conveyances of all kinds and character, and the depots and waiting rooms used in conjunction therewith which are open to unrestricted use and access by the public; publicly owned bathing beaches, parks, and/or playgrounds; and all other places of like or similar nature to which the general public has unrestricted right of access, and which are generally used by the public.

 $((\frac{36}{36}))$ "Regulations" means regulations made by the board under the powers conferred by this title.

(((37))) (35) "Restaurant" means any establishment provided with special space and accommodations where, in consideration of payment, food, without lodgings, is habitually furnished to the public, not including drug stores and soda fountains.

((\(\frac{(38\)}{)}\)) (36) "Sale" and "sell" include exchange, barter, and traffic; and also include the selling or supplying or distributing, by any means whatsoever, of liquor, or of any liquid known or described as beer or by any name whatever commonly used to describe malt or brewed liquor or of wine, by any person to any person; and also include a sale or selling within the state to a foreign consignee or his agent in the state. "Sale" and "sell" shall not include the giving, at no charge, of a reasonable amount of liquor by a person not licensed by the board to a person not licensed by the board, for personal use only. "Sale" and "sell" also does not include a raffle authorized under RCW 9.46.0315((\(\ddoc{\tau}{\text{PROVIDED}}, \text{That})), if the nonprofit organization conducting the raffle has obtained the appropriate permit from the board.

 $((\frac{39}{39}))$ "Soda fountain" means a place especially equipped with apparatus for the purpose of dispensing soft drinks, whether mixed or otherwise.

((40))) <u>(38)</u> "Spirits" means any beverage which contains alcohol obtained by distillation, except flavored malt beverages, but including wines exceeding twenty-four percent of alcohol by volume.

35 (((41) "Store" means a state liquor store established under this 36 title.

(42))) (39) "Spirits distributor" means a person who buys spirits from a domestic distiller, spirits certificate of approval holder, or

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spirits importer, or who acquires foreign produced spirits from a source outside of the United States, for the purpose of selling the same not in violation of this title, or who represents such distiller as agent.

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- (40) "Spirits importer" means a person who buys distilled spirits from a distiller outside the state of Washington and imports such spirituous liquor into the state for sale or for export.
- (41) "Tavern" means any establishment with special space and accommodation for sale by the glass and for consumption on the premises, of beer, as herein defined.
- (((43))) (42)(a) "Wine" means any alcoholic beverage obtained by fermentation of fruits (grapes, berries, apples, et cetera) or other agricultural product containing sugar, to which any saccharine substances may have been added before, during or after fermentation, and containing not more than twenty-four percent of alcohol by volume, including sweet wines fortified with wine spirits, such as port, sherry, muscatel and angelica, not exceeding twenty-four percent of alcohol by volume and not less than one-half of one percent of alcohol by volume. For purposes of this title, any beverage containing no more than fourteen percent of alcohol by volume when bottled or packaged by the manufacturer shall be referred to as "table wine," and any beverage containing alcohol in an amount more than fourteen percent by volume when bottled or packaged by the manufacturer shall be referred to as "fortified wine." However, "fortified wine" shall not include: (i) Wines that are both sealed or capped by cork closure and aged two years or more; and (ii) wines that contain more than fourteen percent alcohol by volume solely as a result of the natural fermentation process and that have not been produced with the addition of wine spirits, brandy, or alcohol.
- (b) This subsection shall not be interpreted to require that any wine be labeled with the designation "table wine" or "fortified wine."
- ((44))) (43) "Wine distributor" means a person who buys wine from a domestic winery, wine certificate of approval holder, or wine importer, or who acquires foreign produced wine from a source outside of the United States, for the purpose of selling the same not in violation of this title, or who represents such vintner or winery as agent.

((45))) <u>(44)</u> "Wine importer" means a person or business within Washington who purchases wine from a wine certificate of approval holder or who acquires foreign produced wine from a source outside of the United States for the purpose of selling the same pursuant to this title.

 $((\frac{46}{)}))$ $\underline{(45)}$ "Winery" means a business conducted by any person for the manufacture of wine for sale, other than a domestic winery.

8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 104.** A new section is added to chapter 66.24 9 RCW to read as follows:

There shall be a license for spirits distributors to sell spirits, purchased from licensed Washington distilleries, spirits certificate of approval holders, licensed spirits importers, or suppliers of foreign spirits located outside of the United States, to licensed spirits retailers and other spirits distributors and to export the same from the state of Washington; fee six hundred sixty dollars per year for each distributing unit.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 105. A new section is added to chapter 66.24 RCW to read as follows:

There shall be a license for spirits importers that authorizes the licensee to import spirits purchased from certificate of approval holders into the state of Washington. The licensee may also import, from suppliers located outside of the United States, spirits manufactured outside the United States.

- (1) Spirits so imported may be sold to licensed spirits distributors or exported from the state.
- (2) Every person, firm, or corporation licensed as a spirits importer shall establish and maintain a principal office within the state at which shall be kept proper records of all spirits imported into the state under this license.
- (3) No spirits importer's license shall be granted to a nonresident of the state nor to a corporation whose principal place of business is outside the state until such applicant has established a principal office and agent within the state upon which service can be made.
- (4) As a requirement for license approval, a spirits importer shall enter into a written agreement with the board to furnish on or before the twentieth day of each month, a report under oath, detailing the

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quantity of spirits sold or delivered to each licensed spirits distributor. Failure to file such reports may result in the suspension or cancellation of this license.

- (5) Spirits imported under this license must conform to the provisions of RCW 66.28.100 and have received label approval from the board. The board shall not certify spirits labeled with names that may be confused with other nonalcoholic beverages whether manufactured or produced from a domestic distiller or imported nor spirits that fail to meet quality standards established by the board.
 - (6) The license fee shall be one hundred sixty dollars per year.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 106. A new section is added to chapter 66.24 RCW to read as follows:

- (1) Every person, firm, or corporation, holding a distiller's license, shall, on or before the twentieth day of each month, furnish to the Washington state liquor control board, on a form to be prescribed by the board, a statement showing the quantity of spirits sold for resale during the preceding calendar month to each spirits distributor within the state of Washington.
- (2)(a) A United States distiller, located outside the state of Washington, must hold a certificate of approval to allow sales and shipment of the certificate of approval holder's spirits to licensed Washington spirits distributors, importers, or retailers. A certificate of approval holder with a direct shipment endorsement may act as a distributor for spirits of its own production.
- (b) Authorized representatives must hold a certificate of approval to allow sales and shipment of United States produced spirits to licensed Washington spirits distributors or importers.
- (c) Authorized representatives must also hold a certificate of approval to allow sales and shipments of foreign produced spirits to licensed Washington spirits distributors or importers.
- (3) The certificate of approval shall not be granted unless and until such distiller or authorized representative makes a written agreement with the board to furnish to the board, on or before the twentieth day of each month, a report under oath, on a form to be prescribed by the board, showing the quantity of spirits sold or delivered to each licensed spirits distributor, importer, or retailer during the preceding month, and shall further have agreed with the

- board, that such distiller or authorized representative and all general 1 2 sales corporations or agencies maintained by them, and all of their 3 trade representatives, corporations, and agencies, shall and will faithfully comply with all laws of the state of Washington pertaining 4 5 to the sale of intoxicating liquors and all rules and regulations of the Washington state liquor control board. A violation of the terms of 6 7 this agreement will cause the board to take action to suspend or revoke 8 such certificate.
 - (4) The fee for the certificate of approval and related endorsements, issued pursuant to the provisions of this title, shall be from time to time established by the board at a level that is sufficient to defray the costs of administering the certificate of approval program. The fee shall be fixed by rule by the board in accordance with the provisions of the administrative procedure act, chapter 34.05 RCW.
- 16 (5) Certificate of approval holders are deemed to have consented to 17 the jurisdiction of Washington concerning enforcement of this chapter 18 and all laws and rules related to the sale and shipment of spirits.

- 26 **Sec. 202.** RCW 66.08.026 and 2008 c 67 s 1 are each amended to read 27 as follows:

Administrative expenses of the board shall be appropriated and paid from the liquor revolving fund. These administrative expenses shall include, but not be limited to: The salaries and expenses of the board and its employees, ((the cost of opening additional state liquor stores and warehouses,)) legal services, pilot projects, annual or other audits, and other general costs of conducting the business of the board. ((The administrative expenses shall not include costs of liquor and lottery tickets purchased, the cost of transportation and delivery

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to the point of distribution, the cost of operating, maintaining, 1 2 relocating, and leasing state liquor stores and warehouses, other costs pertaining to the acquisition and receipt of liquor and lottery 3 4 tickets, agency commissions for contract liquor stores, transaction fees associated with credit or debit card purchases for liquor in state 5 6 liquor stores and in contract liquor stores pursuant to RCW 66.16.040 7 and 66.16.041, sales tax, and those amounts distributed pursuant to RCW 66.08.180, 66.08.190, 66.08.200, 66.08.210 and 66.08.220. Agency 8 commissions for contract liquor stores shall be established by the 9 10 liquor control board after consultation with and approval by the director of the office of financial management.)) All expenditures and 11 12 payment of obligations authorized by this section are subject to the 13 allotment requirements of chapter 43.88 RCW.

- 14 **Sec. 203.** RCW 66.08.030 and 2002 c 119 s 2 are each amended to read as follows:
 - (1) For the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of this title according to their true intent or of supplying any deficiency therein, the board may make such regulations not inconsistent with the spirit of this title as are deemed necessary or advisable. All regulations so made shall be a public record and shall be filed in the office of the code reviser, and thereupon shall have the same force and effect as if incorporated in this title. Such regulations, together with a copy of this title, shall be published in pamphlets and shall be distributed as directed by the board.
 - (2) Without thereby limiting the generality of the provisions contained in subsection (1), it is declared that the power of the board to make regulations in the manner set out in that subsection shall extend to:
 - (a) ((regulating the equipment and management of stores and warehouses in which state liquor is sold or kept, and prescribing the books and records to be kept therein and the reports to be made thereon to the board;

- (i)) (c) Prescribing forms to be used for purposes of this title or the regulations, and the terms and conditions to be contained in permits and licenses issued under this title, and the qualifications for receiving a permit or license issued under this title, including a criminal history record information check. The board may submit the criminal history record information check to the Washington state patrol and to the identification division of the federal bureau of investigation in order that these agencies may search their records for prior arrests and convictions of the individual or individuals who filled out the forms. The board shall require fingerprinting of any applicant whose criminal history record information check is submitted to the federal bureau of investigation;

- ((\(\frac{(p)}{p}\))) (j) Regulating premises in which liquor is kept for export from the state, or from which liquor is exported, prescribing the books and records to be kept therein and the reports to be made thereon to the board, and providing for the inspection of the premises and the books, records and the liquor so kept;
- $((\frac{q}{q}))$ (k) Prescribing the conditions and qualifications requisite for the obtaining of club licenses and the books and records to be kept and the returns to be made by clubs, prescribing the manner of licensing clubs in any municipality or other locality, and providing for the inspection of clubs;

Licensees obtaining a written endorsement from the board may also sell malt liquor in kegs or other containers capable of holding four gallons or more of liquid. The annual fee for the beer and/or wine specialty shop license is one hundred dollars for each store. The sale of any container holding four gallons or more must comply with RCW 66.28.200 and 66.28.220.
 - (2) Licensees under this section may provide, free or for a charge, single-serving samples of two ounces or less to customers for the purpose of sales promotion. Sampling activities of licensees under this section are subject to RCW ((66.28.010 and)) 66.28.040 and the

cost of sampling under this section may not be borne, directly or indirectly, by any manufacturer, importer, or distributor of liquor.

- (3) The board shall issue a restricted beer and/or wine specialty shop license, authorizing the licensee to sell beer and only table wine, if the board finds upon issuance or renewal of the license that the sale of strong beer or fortified wine would be against the public interest. In determining the public interest, the board shall consider at least the following factors:
- 9 (a) The likelihood that the applicant will sell strong beer or 10 fortified wine to persons who are intoxicated;
 - (b) Law enforcement problems in the vicinity of the applicant's establishment that may arise from persons purchasing strong beer or fortified wine at the establishment; and
 - (c) Whether the sale of strong beer or fortified wine would be detrimental to or inconsistent with a government-operated or funded alcohol treatment or detoxification program in the area.

If the board receives no evidence or objection that the sale of strong beer or fortified wine would be against the public interest, it shall issue or renew the license without restriction, as applicable. The burden of establishing that the sale of strong beer or fortified wine by the licensee would be against the public interest is on those persons objecting.

- (4) Licensees holding a beer and/or wine specialty shop license must maintain a minimum three thousand dollar wholesale inventory of beer, strong beer, and/or wine.
- **Sec. 221.** RCW 66.24.380 and 2005 c 151 s 10 are each amended to 27 read as follows:

There shall be a retailer's license to be designated as a special occasion license to be issued to a not-for-profit society or organization to sell spirits, beer, and wine by the individual serving for on-premises consumption at a specified event, such as at picnics or other special occasions, at a specified date and place; fee sixty dollars per day.

(1) The not-for-profit society or organization is limited to sales of no more than twelve calendar days per year. For the purposes of this subsection, special occasion licensees that are "agricultural area fairs" or "agricultural county, district, and area fairs," as defined

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- 1 by RCW 15.76.120, that receive a special occasion license may, once per
- 2 calendar year, count as one event fairs that last multiple days, so
- 3 long as alcohol sales are at set dates, times, and locations, and the
- 4 board receives prior notification of the dates, times, and locations.
- 5 The special occasion license applicant will pay the sixty dollars per
- 6 day for this event.

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- 7 (2) The licensee may sell beer and/or wine in original, unopened 8 containers for off-premises consumption if permission is obtained from 9 the board prior to the event.
- 10 (3) Sale, service, and consumption of spirits, beer, and wine is to 11 be confined to specified premises or designated areas only.
- (4) Spirituous liquor sold under this special occasion license must be purchased ((at a state liquor store or contract liquor store without discount)) at retail prices, including all taxes.
- 15 (5) Any violation of this section is a class 1 civil infraction 16 having a maximum penalty of two hundred fifty dollars as provided for 17 in chapter 7.80 RCW.
- 18 **Sec. 222.** RCW 66.40.140 and 1933 ex.s. c 62 s 88 are each amended 19 to read as follows:

Whenever a majority of qualified voters voting upon said question in any such unit shall have voted "Against sale of liquor", the county auditor shall file with the liquor control board a certificate showing the result of the canvass at such election; and thereafter, except as hereinafter provided, it shall not be lawful for a liquor store to be operated therein nor for licensees to maintain and operate licensed premises therein except as hereinafter provided:

- (1) ((As to any stores maintained by the board within any such unit at the time of such licensing, the board shall have a period of thirty days from and after the date of the canvass of the vote upon such election to continue operation of its store or stores therein.

 $((\frac{4}{}))$ (3) Nothing herein contained shall prevent any person residing in any unit in which the sale of liquor shall have been forbidden by popular vote as herein provided, who is otherwise qualified to receive and hold a permit under this title, from lawfully purchasing without the unit and transporting into or receiving within the unit, liquor lawfully purchased by him outside the boundaries of such unit.
