1 AN ACT Relating to adoption of rules; and amending RCW 34.05.328
2 and 34.05.360.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 **Sec. 1.** RCW 34.05.328 and 2010 c 112 s 15 are each amended to read
5 as follows:

6 (1) Before adopting a rule described in subsection (~~(+5+)~~) (6) of
7 this section, an agency shall:

8 (a) Clearly state in detail the general goals and specific
9 objectives of the statute that the rule implements;

10 (b) Determine that the rule is needed to achieve the general goals
11 and specific objectives stated under (a) of this subsection, and
12 analyze alternatives to rule making and the consequences of not
13 adopting the rule;

14 (c) Provide notification in the notice of proposed rule making
15 under RCW 34.05.320 that a preliminary cost-benefit analysis is
16 available. The preliminary cost-benefit analysis must fulfill the
17 requirements of the cost-benefit analysis under (d) of this subsection.
18 If the agency files a supplemental notice under RCW 34.05.340, the
19 supplemental notice shall include notification that a revised

1 preliminary cost-benefit analysis is available. A final cost-benefit
2 analysis shall be available when the rule is adopted under RCW
3 34.05.360;

4 (d) Determine that the probable benefits of the rule are greater
5 than its probable costs, taking into account both the qualitative and
6 quantitative benefits and costs and the specific directives of the
7 statute being implemented;

8 (e) Determine, after considering alternative versions of the rule
9 and the analysis required under (b), (c), and (d) of this subsection,
10 that the rule being adopted is the least burdensome alternative for
11 those required to comply with it that will achieve the general goals
12 and specific objectives stated under (a) of this subsection;

13 (f) Determine that the rule does not require those to whom it
14 applies to take an action that violates requirements of another federal
15 or state law;

16 (g) Determine that the rule does not impose more stringent
17 performance requirements on private entities than on public entities
18 unless required to do so by federal or state law;

19 (h) Determine if the rule differs from any federal regulation or
20 statute applicable to the same activity or subject matter and, if so,
21 determine that the difference is justified by the following:

22 (i) A state statute that explicitly allows the agency to differ
23 from federal standards; or

24 (ii) Substantial evidence that the difference is necessary to
25 achieve the general goals and specific objectives stated under (a) of
26 this subsection; and

27 (i) Coordinate the rule, to the maximum extent practicable, with
28 other federal, state, and local laws applicable to the same activity or
29 subject matter.

30 (2) In making its determinations pursuant to subsection (1)(b)
31 through (h) of this section, the agency shall place in the rule-making
32 file documentation of sufficient quantity and quality so as to persuade
33 a reasonable person that the determinations are justified.

34 (3) Before adopting rules described in subsection ~~((+5+))~~ (6) of
35 this section, an agency shall place in the rule-making file a rule
36 implementation plan for rules filed under each adopting order. The
37 plan shall describe how the agency intends to:

1 (a) Implement and enforce the rule, including a description of the
2 resources the agency intends to use;

3 (b) Inform and educate affected persons about the rule;

4 (c) Promote and assist voluntary compliance; and

5 (d) Evaluate whether the rule achieves the purpose for which it was
6 adopted, including, to the maximum extent practicable, the use of
7 interim milestones to assess progress and the use of objectively
8 measurable outcomes.

9 (4) The adoption of rules described in subsection (6) of this
10 section must be made before December 1st of any year, and the rules may
11 not take effect before the end of the regular legislative session in
12 the next year.

13 (5) After adopting a rule described in subsection ((+5+)) (6) of
14 this section regulating the same activity or subject matter as another
15 provision of federal or state law, an agency shall do all of the
16 following:

17 (a) Coordinate implementation and enforcement of the rule with the
18 other federal and state entities regulating the same activity or
19 subject matter by making every effort to do one or more of the
20 following:

21 (i) Deferring to the other entity;

22 (ii) Designating a lead agency; or

23 (iii) Entering into an agreement with the other entities specifying
24 how the agency and entities will coordinate implementation and
25 enforcement.

26 If the agency is unable to comply with this subsection ((+4+))
27 (5)(a), the agency shall report to the legislature pursuant to (b) of
28 this subsection;

29 (b) Report to the joint administrative rules review committee:

30 (i) The existence of any overlap or duplication of other federal or
31 state laws, any differences from federal law, and any known overlap,
32 duplication, or conflict with local laws; and

33 (ii) Make recommendations for any legislation that may be necessary
34 to eliminate or mitigate any adverse effects of such overlap,
35 duplication, or difference.

36 ((+5+)) (6)(a) Except as provided in (b) of this subsection, this
37 section applies to:

1 (i) Significant legislative rules of the departments of ecology,
2 labor and industries, health, revenue, social and health services, and
3 natural resources, the employment security department, the forest
4 practices board, the office of the insurance commissioner, and to the
5 legislative rules of the department of fish and wildlife implementing
6 chapter 77.55 RCW; and

7 (ii) Any rule of any agency, if this section is voluntarily made
8 applicable to the rule by the agency, or is made applicable to the rule
9 by a majority vote of the joint administrative rules review committee
10 within forty-five days of receiving the notice of proposed rule making
11 under RCW 34.05.320.

12 (b) This section does not apply to:

13 (i) Emergency rules adopted under RCW 34.05.350;

14 (ii) Rules relating only to internal governmental operations that
15 are not subject to violation by a nongovernment party;

16 (iii) Rules adopting or incorporating by reference without material
17 change federal statutes or regulations, Washington state statutes,
18 rules of other Washington state agencies, shoreline master programs
19 other than those programs governing shorelines of statewide
20 significance, or, as referenced by Washington state law, national
21 consensus codes that generally establish industry standards, if the
22 material adopted or incorporated regulates the same subject matter and
23 conduct as the adopting or incorporating rule;

24 (iv) Rules that only correct typographical errors, make address or
25 name changes, or clarify language of a rule without changing its
26 effect;

27 (v) Rules the content of which is explicitly and specifically
28 dictated by statute;

29 (vi) Rules that set or adjust fees or rates pursuant to legislative
30 standards;

31 (vii) Rules of the department of social and health services
32 relating only to client medical or financial eligibility and rules
33 concerning liability for care of dependents; or

34 (viii) Rules of the department of revenue that adopt a uniform
35 expiration date for reseller permits as authorized in RCW 82.32.780 and
36 82.32.783.

37 (c) For purposes of this subsection:

1 (i) A "procedural rule" is a rule that adopts, amends, or repeals
2 (A) any procedure, practice, or requirement relating to any agency
3 hearings; (B) any filing or related process requirement for making
4 application to an agency for a license or permit; or (C) any policy
5 statement pertaining to the consistent internal operations of an
6 agency.

7 (ii) An "interpretive rule" is a rule, the violation of which does
8 not subject a person to a penalty or sanction, that sets forth the
9 agency's interpretation of statutory provisions it administers.

10 (iii) A "significant legislative rule" is a rule other than a
11 procedural or interpretive rule that (A) adopts substantive provisions
12 of law pursuant to delegated legislative authority, the violation of
13 which subjects a violator of such rule to a penalty or sanction; (B)
14 establishes, alters, or revokes any qualification or standard for the
15 issuance, suspension, or revocation of a license or permit; or (C)
16 adopts a new, or makes significant amendments to, a policy or
17 regulatory program.

18 (d) In the notice of proposed rule making under RCW 34.05.320, an
19 agency shall state whether this section applies to the proposed rule
20 pursuant to (a)(i) of this subsection, or if the agency will apply this
21 section voluntarily.

22 ((+6+)) (7) By January 31, 1996, and by January 31st of each even-
23 numbered year thereafter, the office of financial management, after
24 consulting with state agencies, counties, and cities, and business,
25 labor, and environmental organizations, shall report to the governor
26 and the legislature regarding the effects of this section on the
27 regulatory system in this state. The report shall document:

28 (a) The rules proposed to which this section applied and to the
29 extent possible, how compliance with this section affected the
30 substance of the rule, if any, that the agency ultimately adopted;

31 (b) The costs incurred by state agencies in complying with this
32 section;

33 (c) Any legal action maintained based upon the alleged failure of
34 any agency to comply with this section, the costs to the state of such
35 action, and the result;

36 (d) The extent to which this section has adversely affected the
37 capacity of agencies to fulfill their legislatively prescribed mission;

1 (e) The extent to which this section has improved the acceptability
2 of state rules to those regulated; and

3 (f) Any other information considered by the office of financial
4 management to be useful in evaluating the effect of this section.

5 **Sec. 2.** RCW 34.05.360 and 1988 c 288 s 311 are each amended to
6 read as follows:

7 The order of adoption by which each rule is adopted by an agency
8 shall contain all of the following:

9 (1) The signature of the governor;

10 (2) The date the agency adopted the rule;

11 ~~((+2))~~ (3) A concise statement of the purpose of the rule;

12 ~~((+3))~~ (4) A reference to all rules repealed, amended, or
13 suspended by the rule;

14 ~~((+4))~~ (5) A reference to the specific statutory or other
15 authority authorizing adoption of the rule;

16 ~~((+5))~~ (6) Any findings required by any provision of law as a
17 precondition to adoption or effectiveness of the rule; and

18 ~~((+6))~~ (7) The effective date of the rule if other than that
19 specified in RCW 34.05.380(2).

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
