NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. It is the legislature's intent to promote the arts, culture, and rich heritage of the state and to enhance opportunities for collaboration and coordination by restructuring those programs and departments that are inextricably linked by common pursuits which are cultural in nature and deserve increased visibility and recognition within state government. Therefore, the legislature is establishing the department of heritage, arts, and culture consisting of archaeology and historic preservation, the museums and historical societies, the Washington legacy project, the arts commission, film and video promotion, Washington tourism, and the state library.

- 11 **Sec. 2.** RCW 27.34.020 and 2007 c 333 s 5 are each amended to read 12 as follows:
- Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter:
- 15 (1) "Advisory council" means the advisory council on historic 16 preservation.
- 17 (2) "Board of advisors" means the board of advisors to the women's history consortium.
  - (3) "Commission" means the Washington tourism commission.

In addition to barns, "heritage barn" includes agricultural resources such as milk houses, sheds, silos, or other outbuildings, that are historically associated with the working life of the farm or ranch, if these outbuildings are on the same property as a heritage barn.

((6)) "Heritage council" means the Washington state heritage council.

 $((\frac{(7)}{)})$  (11) "Historic preservation" includes the protection, rehabilitation, restoration, identification, scientific excavation, and reconstruction of districts, sites, buildings, structures, and objects significant in American and Washington state history, architecture, archaeology, or culture.

 $((\frac{(+8)}{(+8)}))$  (12) "Preservation officer" means the state historic preservation officer as provided for in  $((\frac{RCW}{43.334.020}))$  section 102 of this act.

 $((\frac{(9)}{)})$  (13) "Project" means programs leading to the preservation for public benefit of historical properties, whether by state and local governments or other public bodies, or private organizations or individuals, including the acquisition of title or interests in, and the development of, any district, site, building, structure, or object that is significant in American and Washington state history, architecture, archaeology, or culture, and property used in connection therewith, or for its development.

 $((\frac{10}{10}))$  <u>(14)</u> "State historical agencies" means the state historical societies and the department.

 $((\frac{11}{11}))$  (15) "State historical societies" means the Washington state historical society and the eastern Washington state historical society.

((12) "Cultural resource management plan" means a comprehensive plan which identifies and organizes information on the state of Washington's historic, archaeological, and architectural resources into a set of management criteria, and which is to be used for producing reliable decisions, recommendations, and advice relative to the identification, evaluation, and protection of these resources.))

- 2 **Sec. 101.** RCW 43.334.010 and 2005 c 333 s 1 are each amended to read as follows:
  - (1) ((There is created a department of state government to be known as)) The department of ((archaeology and historic preservation)) heritage, arts, and culture is created as an executive branch agency. The department is vested with all powers and duties transferred to it under this chapter and such other powers and duties as may be authorized by law.
- 10 (2) ((Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the 11 definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter.
- 12 (a) "Department" means the department of archaeology and historic
  13 preservation.
- (b) "Director" means the director of the department of archaeology 14 and historic preservation)) The executive head and appointing authority 15 16 of the department is the director. The director is appointed by the governor, subject to confirmation by the senate. The director serves 17 at the pleasure of the governor. The director is paid a salary fixed 18 by the governor in accordance with RCW 43.03.040. If a vacancy occurs 19 20 in the position of director while the senate is not in session, the 21 governor shall make a temporary appointment until the next meeting of the senate at which time he or she shall present to that body his or 22 23 her nomination for the position.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 102. A new section is added to chapter 43.334 25 RCW to read as follows:
  - (1) The director of heritage, arts, and culture shall supervise and administer the activities of the department of heritage, arts, and culture and shall advise the governor and the legislature with respect to matters under the jurisdiction of the department.
  - (2) In addition to other powers and duties granted to the director, the director shall have the following powers and duties:
- 32 (a) Enter into contracts on behalf of the state to carry out the 33 purposes of this chapter;

- (d) Appoint a state historic preservation officer, who shall have a background in program administration, an active involvement in historic preservation, and knowledge of the national, state, and local preservation programs as they affect the state of Washington. The state historic preservation officer is exempt from the provisions of chapter 41.06 RCW;
- (e) Adopt rules in accordance with chapter 34.05 RCW and perform all other functions necessary and proper to carry out the purposes of this chapter;
- (f) Delegate powers, duties, and functions as the director deems necessary for efficient administration, but the director shall be responsible for the official acts of the officers and employees of the department;
- 17 (g) Apply for grants from public and private entities, and receive 18 and administer any grant funding received for the purpose and intent of 19 this chapter; and
- 20 (h) Perform other duties as are necessary and consistent with law.

- 33 **Sec. 201.** RCW 27.34.060 and 1983 c 91 s 6 are each amended to read 34 as follows:

p. 5 HB 2033

Each state historical society shall submit its budget requests to the heritage council and the director for review and comment.

**Sec. 202.** RCW 27.34.070 and 2005 c 333 s 14 are each amended to read as follows:

- (1) Each state historical society is designated a trustee for the state whose powers and duties are subject to review and approval by the director and include but are not limited to the following:
- (a) To collect, catalog, preserve, and interpret objects, manuscripts, sites, photographs, and other materials illustrative of the cultural, artistic, and natural history of this state;
- (b) To operate state museums and assist and encourage cultural and historical studies and museum interpretive efforts throughout the state, including those sponsored by local historical organizations, and city, county, and state agencies;
- (c) To engage in cultural, artistic, and educational activities, including classes, exhibits, seminars, workshops, and conferences if these activities are related to the basic purpose of the society;
- (d) To plan for and conduct celebrations of significant events in the history of the state of Washington and to give assistance to and coordinate with state agencies, local governments, and local historical organizations in planning and conducting celebrations;
  - (e) To create one or more classes of membership in the society;
- (f) To engage in the sale of various articles which are related to the basic purpose of the society;
- (g) To engage in appropriate fund-raising activities for the purpose of increasing the self-support of the society;
- (h) To accept gifts, grants, conveyances, bequests, and devises, of real or personal property, or both, in trust or otherwise, and sell, lease, exchange, invest, or expend the same or the proceeds, rents, profits, and income therefrom except as limited by the donor's terms. The governing boards of the state historical societies shall adopt rules to govern and protect the receipt and expenditure of the proceeds, rents, profits, and income of all such gifts, grants, conveyances, bequests, and devises;
- 35 (i) To accept on loan or lend objects of historical interest, and 36 sell, exchange, divest itself of, or refuse to accept, items which do 37 not enhance the collection; and

1 (j) To charge general or special admission fees to its museums or exhibits and to waive or decrease such fees as it finds appropriate.

- (2) All objects, sites, manuscripts, photographs, and all property, including real property, now held or hereafter acquired by the state historical societies shall be held by the societies in trust for the use and benefit of the people of Washington state.
- **Sec. 203.** RCW 27.34.220 and 1997 c 145 s 1 are each amended to 8 read as follows:

The director or the director's designee is authorized:

- (1) To promulgate and maintain the Washington heritage register of districts, sites, buildings, structures, and objects significant in American or Washington state history, architecture, archaeology, and culture, and to prepare comprehensive statewide historic surveys and plans and research and evaluation of surveyed resources for the preparation of nominations to the Washington heritage register and the national register of historic places, in accordance with criteria approved by the advisory council established under RCW 27.34.250 (as recodified by this act). Nominations to the national register of historic places shall comply with any standards and regulations promulgated by the United States secretary of the interior for the preservation, acquisition, and development of such properties. Nominations to the Washington heritage register shall comply with rules adopted under this chapter.
- (2) To establish a program of matching grants-in-aid to public agencies, public or private organizations, or individuals for projects having as their purpose the preservation for public benefit of properties that are significant in American or Washington state history, architecture, archaeology, and culture.
- (3) To promote historic preservation efforts throughout the state, including private efforts and those of city, county, and state agencies.
- (4) To enhance the effectiveness of the state preservation program through the initiation of legislation, the use of varied funding sources, the creation of special purpose programs, and contact with state, county, and city officials, civic groups, and professionals.
- (5) To spend funds, subject to legislative appropriation and the availability of funds, where necessary to assist the Indian tribes of

The nonstate portion of the total 9 10 project cost may include cash, the value of real property when acquired solely for the purpose of the project, and in-kind contributions. 11 12 department shall not sign contracts or otherwise financially obligate 13 funds under this section until the legislature has approved a specific 14 list of projects. In contracts for grants authorized under this section, the ((society)) department shall include provisions requiring 15 that capital improvements be held by the grantee for a specified period 16 17 of time appropriate to the amount of the grant and that facilities be used for the express purpose of the grant. If the grantee is found to 18 19 be out of compliance with provisions of the contract, the grantee shall repay to the state general fund the principal amount of the grant plus 20 21 interest calculated at the rate of interest on state of Washington 22 general obligation bonds issued most closely to the date 23 authorization of the grant.

- (1) A women's history consortium is created with the ((Washington state historical society)) department as the managing agency. To ensure geographic, demographic, and subject matter diversity, the consortium shall be managed by a board of advisors representing a range of perspectives, including private citizens, business, labor, historical societies, colleges and universities, educators, tribes, and public officials. Appointment of the board of advisors must be completed by September 30, 2005.

The program shall be called the Washington state legacy project.
