- 1 AN ACT Relating to prioritizing infrastructure projects; and 2 amending RCW 43.330.100 and 43.160.060.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 **Sec. 1.** RCW 43.330.100 and 1993 c 280 s 13 are each amended to read as follows:
  - (1)(a) The department ((shall)) <u>must</u> support the development and maintenance of local infrastructure and public facilities and provide local communities with flexible sources of funding. The department ((shall)) <u>must</u> coordinate grant and loan programs that provide infrastructure and investment in local communities. This ((shall)) <u>must</u> include coordinating funding for eligible projects with other federal, state, local, private, and nonprofit funding sources.
  - $((\frac{2}{2}))$  (b) At a minimum, the department  $(\frac{2}{2})$  must provide coordinated procedures for applying for and tracking grants and loans among and between the community economic revitalization board, the public works trust fund, and community development block grants.
- 17 (2) The department must work with county officials and associate 18 development organizations to identify areas meriting prioritization in 19 receipt of infrastructure funding awards.

1 **Sec. 2.** RCW 43.160.060 and 2008 c 327 s 5 are each amended to read 2 as follows:

(1) The board is authorized to make direct loans to political 3 4 subdivisions of the state and to federally recognized Indian tribes for the purposes of assisting the political subdivisions and federally 5 6 recognized Indian tribes in financing the cost of public facilities, 7 including development of land and improvements for public facilities, 8 project-specific environmental, capital facilities, land permitting, feasibility, and marketing studies and plans; project 9 10 design, site planning, and analysis; project debt and revenue impact 11 analysis; as well as the construction, rehabilitation, alteration, 12 expansion, or improvement of the facilities. The board may make direct 13 loans to rural counties for carrying out an analysis of industrial sites to identify where high priority infrastructure developments are 14 15 warranted. A grant may also be authorized for purposes designated in this chapter, but only when, and to the extent that, a loan is not 16 17 reasonably possible, given the limited resources of the political 18 subdivision or the federally recognized Indian tribe and the finding by 19 the board that financial circumstances require grant assistance to 20 enable the project to move forward. However, no more than twenty-five 21 percent of all financial assistance approved by the board in any 22 biennium may consist of grants to political subdivisions and federally 23 recognized Indian tribes.

- (2) Application for funds ((shall)) <u>must</u> be made in the form and manner as the board may prescribe. In making grants or loans the board ((shall)) <u>must</u> conform to the following requirements:
- 27  $((\frac{1}{1}))$  <u>(a)</u> The board  $(\frac{1}{1})$  <u>may</u> not provide financial 28 assistance:
- 29  $((\frac{a}{a}))$  (i) For a project the primary purpose of which is to facilitate or promote a retail shopping development or expansion.
  - $((\frac{b}{b}))$  (ii) For any project that evidence exists would result in a development or expansion that would displace existing jobs in any other community in the state.
- (((c))) <u>(iii)</u> For a project the primary purpose of which is to facilitate or promote gambling.
- $((\frac{d}{d}))$  (iv) For a project located outside the jurisdiction of the applicant political subdivision or federally recognized Indian tribe.

- $((\frac{a}{a}))$  (i) For a project demonstrating convincing evidence that a specific private development or expansion is ready to occur and will occur only if the public facility improvement is made that:
- $((\frac{1}{2}))$  (A) Results in the creation of significant private sector jobs or significant private sector capital investment as determined by the board and is consistent with the state comprehensive economic development plan developed by the Washington economic development commission pursuant to chapter 43.162 RCW, once the plan is adopted; and
- 12 ((<del>(ii)</del>)) <u>(B)</u> Will improve the opportunities for the successful 13 maintenance, establishment, or expansion of industrial or commercial 14 plants or will otherwise assist in the creation or retention of long-15 term economic opportunities;
  - $((\frac{b}{b}))$  <u>(iii)</u> For a project that cannot meet the requirement of (a)<u>(i)</u> of this subsection <u>(2)</u> but is a project that:
    - $((\frac{1}{2}))$  (A) Results in the creation of significant private sector jobs or significant private sector capital investment as determined by the board and is consistent with the state comprehensive economic development plan developed by the Washington economic development commission pursuant to chapter 43.162 RCW, once the plan is adopted;
- 23 ((<del>(ii)</del>)) <u>(B)</u> Is part of a local economic development plan 24 consistent with applicable state planning requirements;
  - $((\frac{(iii)}{)}))$  (C) Can demonstrate project feasibility using standard economic principles; and
- 27  $((\frac{\text{(iv)}}{\text{)}})$  (D) Is located in a rural community as defined by the 28 board, or a rural county;
  - (((c))) (iv) For site-specific plans, studies, and analyses that address environmental impacts, capital facilities, land use, permitting, feasibility, marketing, project engineering, design, site planning, and project debt and revenue impacts, as grants not to exceed fifty thousand dollars.
- $((\frac{3}{3}))$  (c) The board  $(\frac{3}{3})$  must develop guidelines for local participation and allowable match and activities.
- $((\frac{4}{}))$  (d) An application must demonstrate local match and local participation, in accordance with guidelines developed by the board.

((<del>(5)</del>)) <u>(e)</u> An application must be approved by the political subdivision and supported by the local associate development organization or local workforce development council or approved by the governing body of the federally recognized Indian tribe.

- $((\frac{(6)}{(6)}))$  <u>(f)</u> The board may allow de minimis general system improvements to be funded if they are critically linked to the viability of the project.
- $((\frac{7}{}))$  (g) An application must demonstrate convincing evidence that the median hourly wage of the private sector jobs created after the project is completed will exceed the countywide median hourly wage.
- ((+8))) (h) The board ((+8))) must prioritize each proposed project according to:
  - $((\frac{1}{2}))$  (i) The relative benefits provided to the community by the jobs the project would create, not just the total number of jobs it would create after the project is completed, but also giving consideration to the unemployment rate in the area in which the jobs would be located;
  - ((\(\frac{(\frac{(b)}{b})}{)}\) (ii) The rate of return of the state's investment, including, but not limited to, the leveraging of private sector investment, anticipated job creation and retention, and expected increases in state and local tax revenues associated with the project;
  - $((\frac{\langle c \rangle}{\langle c \rangle}))$  <u>(iii)</u> Whether the proposed project offers a health insurance plan for employees that includes an option for dependents of employees;
  - $((\frac{d}{d}))$  (iv) Whether the public facility investment will increase existing capacity necessary to accommodate projected population and employment growth in a manner that supports infill and redevelopment of existing urban or industrial areas that are served by adequate public facilities. Projects should maximize the of use existing and provide for infrastructure adequate funding of necessary transportation improvements; and
- $((\frac{\langle e \rangle}{}))$  <u>(v)</u> Whether the applicant has developed and adhered to guidelines regarding its permitting process for those applying for development permits consistent with section 1(2), chapter 231, Laws of 2007.
- $((\frac{(9)}{(9)}))$  (i) A responsible official of the political subdivision or the federally recognized Indian tribe  $(\frac{(shall)}{(shall)})$  must be present during board deliberations and provide information that the board requests.

(3) Before any financial assistance application is approved, the political subdivision or the federally recognized Indian tribe seeking the assistance must demonstrate to the community economic revitalization board that no other timely source of funding is available to it at costs reasonably similar to financing available from the community economic revitalization board.
