- 1 Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the 2 following:
- 3 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 70.54 RCW 4 to read as follows:
- 5 (1)The department of health shall create the breastfeeding-friendly Washington designation, a voluntary program to 6 7 recognize hospitals that effectively support and encourage 8 breastfeeding.
- 9 (2) July 1, 2014, Beginning а hospital the may use 10 breastfeeding-friendly Washington designation provided in subsection 11 (3) of this section on promotional materials if the hospital achieves 12 criteria defined by the department of health based on the following ten 13 steps:
- 14 (a) Have a written breastfeeding policy that is routinely 15 communicated to all health care staff;
- 16 (b) Train all health care staff in skills necessary to implement 17 this policy;
- 18 (c) Inform all pregnant women about the benefits and management of breastfeeding;
 - (d) Help mothers initiate breastfeeding within one hour of birth;
- (e) Show mothers how to breastfeed and how to maintain lactation, even if they are separated from their infants;
- 23 (f) Encourage breast milk over alternatives, but may provide 24 guidance on formula supplementation or bottle feeding if preferred by 25 the mother or medically indicated;
- 26 (g) Practice rooming in by allowing mothers and infants to remain 27 together twenty-four hours a day;
 - (h) Encourage breastfeeding on demand;
- 29 (i) Inform all pregnant women about the risks and benefits of 30 pacifiers or artificial nipples to infants; or

- 1 (j) Foster the establishment of breastfeeding support groups and 2 refer mothers to them on discharge from the hospital or clinic.
 - (3)(a) A hospital seeking to use the breastfeeding-friendly Washington designation must submit its breastfeeding policy and supporting documentation with its application to the department of health for approval. The department shall review and approve those policies and supporting documents that meet the requirements of this section and issue a designation based on the number of steps met by the hospital.
 - (b) The department shall issue two types of breastfeeding-friendly Washington designations based on the number of steps met by a hospital:(i) A designation recognizing a hospital that meets the criteria for five steps or more; and (ii) a designation recognizing a hospital that meets all the criteria for all ten steps.
 - (4) The department of health must submit a report to the legislature by December 31, 2016, on the levels of achievement by and locations of participating hospitals and with recommendations to improve or expand the program.
- 19 (5) For the purposes of this section, "hospital" means the 20 maternity or newborn service of a facility licensed under chapter 70.41 21 RCW and includes "birthing center" or "childbirth center" as defined in 22 RCW 18.46.010."

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On page 1, line 2 of the title, after "designation;" strike the remainder of the title and insert "and adding a new section to chapter 70.54 RCW."

EFFECT: Removes program components related to health care

providers, workplaces, and child day care centers; removes a section defining the program and places a shortened program definition in subsection (1); replaces a step requiring a hospital to "Give newborn infants no food or drink other than breast milk, unless medically indicated" with "Encourage breast milk over alternatives, but may provide guidance on formula supplementation or bottle feeding, if preferred by the mother or medically indicated;" replaces a step requiring a hospital to "Give no pacifiers or artificial nipples to breastfeeding infants" with "Inform all pregnant women about the risks and benefits of pacifiers or artificial nipples to infants;" requires DOH to issue two designations: One to applicants meeting five or more steps and another to applicants meeting all ten steps; and requires DOH to report to the Legislature by December 31, 2016.

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
