1 AN ACT Relating to a mentoring and service learning opportunity
2 program for students in K-12 and postsecondary education; adding a new
3 section to chapter 28B.35 RCW; creating a new section; and making an
4 appropriation.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that mentoring and
7 service learning opportunities help to improve the academic success of
8 low-performing, high-risk students in K-12 and postsecondary education
9 in addition to other benefits. The legislature intends to increase
10 mentoring and service learning opportunities for K-12 and postsecondary
11 education students who are at risk of not completing their programs of
12 study.

13 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.35 RCW
14 to read as follows:

15 (1) Western Washington University shall host a statewide consortium
16 of public and private institutions of higher education with the purpose
17 of providing and increasing the number of campus-based mentoring and
18 service learning opportunities in K-12 education and at eligible

1 institutions as defined in RCW 28B.12.030. The consortium shall
2 develop and administer a state campus compact between eligible
3 institutions.

4 (2) The mentoring and service learning opportunities developed
5 under the state campus compact are intended to serve the following
6 target populations of students:

7 (a) For K-12 students, those who are at risk of dropping out of
8 school, not on track to complete their high school diploma on time,
9 from a low-income family, in or transitioning from foster care, or from
10 a family with no previous experience in attending college; and

11 (b) For postsecondary education students, those who are not on
12 track to complete their degree or certificate on time, enrolled in one
13 or more precollege level courses or programs, from a low-income family,
14 in or transitioning from foster care, from a family with no previous
15 experience in attending college, or veterans of the armed services.

16 (3) The mentoring and service-learning opportunities of the state
17 campus compact shall be designed to:

18 (a) Increase student engagement in learning and postsecondary
19 education;

20 (b) Develop workforce, financial literacy, and citizenship skills;

21 (c) Improve student attitudes and behaviors; and

22 (d) Improve academic success and retention.

23 (4) The state campus compact shall address:

24 (a) Training and outreach to postsecondary students to serve as
25 mentors and increase the number and retention of participating mentors;

26 (b) Coordination of service learning projects;

27 (c) Training for successful partnerships between institutions and
28 schools;

29 (d) Financial literacy training for mentors and mentees;

30 (e) Methods to improve the accountability of the program by
31 compiling statewide data to measure the impact of mentoring programs
32 and implementing statewide assessment tools by measuring:

33 (i) Academic improvement;

34 (ii) Retention and completion rates;

35 (iii) Access to institutions of higher education; and

36 (iv) Development of workforce and citizenship skills, attitudes,
37 and behaviors;

1 (f) Increased tutoring support for developmental education students
2 taking online math courses; and
3 (g) Dissemination of best practices and impacts of mentoring
4 programs statewide.

5 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** The sum of one million three hundred seventy
6 thousand dollars, or as much thereof as may be necessary, is
7 appropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2015, from the general
8 fund to Western Washington University for the purposes of this act.

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
