<u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 28A.657 RCW to read as follows:

Subject to funds appropriated specifically for this purpose, the office of the superintendent of public instruction shall award grants on a competitive basis to persistently lowest-achieving schools identified under this chapter to support implementation of successful models of family and community engagement. To qualify for a grant, a school must demonstrate that its academic performance audit and needs assessment based on the turnaround principles indicate a need for improved family and community engagement. In addition, the school must develop its proposal for specific strategies or programs of family and community engagement to be supported by the grant with input and participation from families and community organizations associated with the school. Grants awarded under this section may not exceed a duration of three years.
