1 Beginning on page 1, at the beginning of line 4 of the amendment,  
2 strike all of sections 1 through 7 and insert the following:

3 "NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** (1) The legislature shall convene a task  
4 force with the following voting members to examine the use of body  
5 worn cameras by law enforcement and corrections agencies:

6 (a) One member from each of the two largest caucuses of the  
7 senate, appointed by the president of the senate;

8 (b) One member from each of the two largest caucuses in the house  
9 of representatives, appointed by the speaker of the house of  
10 representatives;

11 (c) A representative from the governor's office;

12 (d) Two representatives from the Washington association of  
13 prosecuting attorneys;

14 (e) A representative from the Washington defender association;

15 (f) A representative of the Washington association of criminal  
16 defense lawyers;

17 (g) A representative from the American civil liberties union of  
18 Washington;

19 (h) A representative from the Washington association of sheriffs  
20 and police chiefs;

21 (i) Four chief local law enforcement officers, at least two of  
22 whom must be from local law enforcement agencies that have deployed  
23 body worn cameras, appointed jointly by the president of the senate  
24 and the speaker of the house of representatives;

25 (j) Three law enforcement officers, one representing the council  
26 of metropolitan police and sheriffs and two representing the  
27 Washington council of police and sheriffs;

28 (k) One representative of local governments responsible for  
29 oversight of law enforcement, appointed jointly by the president of  
30 the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives;

31 (l) A representative from the Washington coalition for open  
32 government;

1 (m) A representative of the news media, appointed jointly by the  
2 president of the senate and the speaker of the house of  
3 representatives;

4 (n) A representative of victims advocacy groups, appointed  
5 jointly by the president of the senate and the speaker of the house  
6 of representatives;

7 (o) Two representatives with experience in interactions between  
8 law enforcement and the public, appointed by the Washington state  
9 commission on African-American affairs;

10 (p) Two representatives with experience in interactions between  
11 law enforcement and the public, appointed by the Washington state  
12 commission on Asian Pacific American affairs;

13 (q) Two representatives with experience in interactions between  
14 law enforcement and the public, appointed by the Washington state  
15 commission on Hispanic affairs;

16 (r) One representative of immigrant or refugee communities,  
17 appointed jointly by the president of the senate and the speaker of  
18 the house of representatives;

19 (s) One representative of the Washington state hospital  
20 association;

21 (t) One person with expertise in the technology of retaining and  
22 redacting body worn camera recordings, appointed jointly by the  
23 president of the senate and the speaker of the house of  
24 representatives;

25 (u) Two representatives of the tribal communities with experience  
26 in interactions between law enforcement and the public, appointed  
27 jointly by the president of the senate and the speaker of the house  
28 of representatives; and

29 (v) A public member, appointed jointly by the president of the  
30 senate and the speaker of the house of representatives.

31 (2) The task force shall choose two cochairs from among its  
32 legislative members.

33 (3) The task force may request such information, recordings, and  
34 other records from agencies as the task force deems appropriate for  
35 it to effectuate this section. A participating agency must provide  
36 such information, recordings, or records upon request subject to  
37 exemptions under chapter 42.56 RCW or any applicable law.

38 (4) Staff support for the task force shall be provided by the  
39 senate committee services and the house of representatives office of  
40 program research.

1 (5) Legislative members of the task force may be reimbursed for  
2 travel expenses in accordance with RCW 44.04.120. Nonlegislative  
3 members, except those representing an employer or organization, are  
4 entitled to be reimbursed for travel expenses as provided in RCW  
5 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.

6 (6) The expenses of the task force shall be paid jointly by the  
7 senate and the house of representatives. Task force expenditures are  
8 subject to approval by the senate facilities and operations committee  
9 and the house of representatives executive rules committee, or their  
10 successor committees.

11 (7) The task force shall report its findings and recommendations  
12 to the governor and the appropriate committees of the legislature by  
13 December 1, 2017. The report must include, but is not limited to,  
14 findings and recommendations regarding costs assessed to requesters,  
15 policies adopted by agencies, retention and retrieval of data, model  
16 policies regarding body worn cameras, and the use of body worn  
17 cameras for gathering evidence, surveillance, and police  
18 accountability.

19 (8) This section expires June 1, 2018."
