1 AN ACT Relating to enhancing youth voter registration; amending
2 RCW 29A.08.210, 29A.08.330, 29A.08.710, 29A.08.810, 46.20.155, and
3 42.56.250; adding a new section to chapter 29A.08 RCW; creating new
4 sections; and providing an effective date.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** The legislature is committed to granting
7 equal access to voter registration for all voters. The legislature
8 recognizes the importance of fostering lifelong civic participation.
9 Currently, many young people are denied access to the most popular
10 form of voter registration, motor voter. More than forty percent of
11 new voters are registered through motor voter, but this easy and
12 popular form of voter registration is not available to young people
13 if they obtained their driver's license at the age of sixteen or
14 seventeen. Denial of motor voter to so many young voters has
15 contributed to lower voter registration levels in the youngest voter
16 age groups. In Washington, according to the United States census
17 bureau, only 50.8 percent of eligible citizens between the ages of
18 eighteen and twenty-four are registered to vote, compared to sixty-
19 eight to eighty percent for other age groups. Studies show that young
20 adults who vote are likely to continue to do so throughout adulthood.
21 The legislature recognizes that these representational disparities in

1 registration rates and voting rates within the youth electorate will
2 improve by enacting election policies that engage all young citizens.
3 Therefore, the legislature declares that this act, allowing eligible
4 youth at least sixteen years of age to preregister to vote, is
5 intended to increase voter turnout in young adults.

6 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 29A.08
7 RCW to read as follows:

8 (1) A person may preregister to vote at the department of
9 licensing if he or she is sixteen or seventeen years of age.

10 (2) A person may preregister to vote at all other locations and
11 through electronic means if he or she is seventeen years of age.

12 (3) A person who preregisters to vote may not vote until he or
13 she is eighteen years of age, and his or her name may not be added to
14 the statewide voter registration database until such time as he or
15 she will be eighteen years of age before the next election.

16 **Sec. 3.** RCW 29A.08.210 and 2009 c 369 s 16 are each amended to
17 read as follows:

18 An applicant for voter registration shall complete an application
19 providing the following information concerning his or her
20 qualifications as a voter in this state:

21 (1) The former address of the applicant if previously registered
22 to vote;

23 (2) The applicant's full name;

24 (3) The applicant's date of birth;

25 (4) The address of the applicant's residence for voting purposes;

26 (5) The mailing address of the applicant if that address is not
27 the same as the address in subsection (4) of this section;

28 (6) The sex of the applicant;

29 (7) The applicant's Washington state driver's license number,
30 Washington state identification card number, or the last four digits
31 of the applicant's social security number if he or she does not have
32 a Washington state driver's license or Washington state
33 identification card;

34 (8) A check box allowing the applicant to indicate that he or she
35 is a member of the armed forces, national guard, or reserves, or that
36 he or she is an overseas voter;

1 (9) A check box allowing the applicant to (~~confirm~~) acknowledge
2 that he or she (~~is at least~~) must be eighteen years of age (~~or~~
3 ~~will be eighteen years of age by the next election~~) to vote;

4 (10) Clear and conspicuous language, designed to draw the
5 applicant's attention, stating that the applicant must be a United
6 States citizen in order to register to vote;

7 (11) A check box and declaration confirming that the applicant is
8 a citizen of the United States;

9 (12) The following warning:

10 "If you knowingly provide false information on this voter
11 registration form or knowingly make a false declaration about your
12 qualifications for voter registration you will have committed a class
13 C felony that is punishable by imprisonment for up to five years, a
14 fine of up to ten thousand dollars, or both."

15 (13) The oath required by RCW 29A.08.230 and a space for the
16 applicant's signature; and

17 (14) Any other information that the secretary of state determines
18 is necessary to establish the identity of the applicant and prevent
19 duplicate or fraudulent voter registrations.

20 This information shall be recorded on a single registration form
21 to be prescribed by the secretary of state.

22 **Sec. 4.** RCW 29A.08.330 and 2013 c 11 s 16 are each amended to
23 read as follows:

24 (1) The secretary of state shall prescribe the method of voter
25 registration for each designated agency. The agency shall use either
26 the state voter registration by mail form with a separate declination
27 form for the applicant to indicate that he or she declines to
28 register at this time, or the agency may use a separate form approved
29 for use by the secretary of state.

30 (2) The person providing service at the agency shall offer voter
31 preregistration or registration services to every client whenever he
32 or she applies for service or assistance and with each renewal,
33 recertification, or change of address. The person providing service
34 shall give the applicant the same level of assistance with the voter
35 registration application as is offered to fill out the agency's forms
36 and documents, including information about age and citizenship
37 requirements for voter registration.

1 (3) The person providing service at the agency shall determine if
2 the prospective applicant wants to register to vote or update his or
3 her voter registration by asking the following question:

4 "Do you want to preregister or register to vote or update your
5 voter registration?"

6 If the applicant chooses to preregister or register to vote or
7 update a registration, the service agent shall ask the following:

8 (a) "Are you a United States citizen?"

9 (b) "Are you (~~or will you be eighteen~~) seventeen years of age
10 or older on or before the next election?"

11 If the applicant answers in the affirmative to both questions,
12 the agent shall then provide the applicant with a voter registration
13 form and instructions and shall record that the applicant has
14 requested to preregister, register, or update a voter registration.
15 If the applicant answers in the negative to either question, the
16 agent shall not provide the applicant with a voter registration form.

17 (4) If an agency uses a computerized application process, it may,
18 in consultation with the secretary of state, develop methods to
19 capture simultaneously the information required for voter
20 registration during a person's computerized application process.

21 (5) Each designated agency shall transmit the applications to the
22 secretary of state or appropriate county auditor within three
23 business days. Information provided for preregistration under this
24 section is exempt from public inspection and copying pursuant to RCW
25 42.56.250.

26 **Sec. 5.** RCW 29A.08.710 and 2005 c 246 s 17 are each amended to
27 read as follows:

28 (1) The county auditor shall have custody of the original voter
29 registration records for each county. The original voter registration
30 form must be filed without regard to precinct and is considered
31 confidential and unavailable for public inspection and copying. An
32 automated file of all registered voters must be maintained pursuant
33 to RCW 29A.08.125. An auditor may maintain the automated file in lieu
34 of filing or maintaining the original voter registration forms if the
35 automated file includes all of the information from the original
36 voter registration forms including, but not limited to, a retrievable
37 facsimile of each voter's signature.

1 (2) The following information contained in voter registration
2 records or files regarding a voter or a group of voters is available
3 for public inspection and copying, except as provided in RCW
4 40.24.060: The voter's name, address, political jurisdiction, gender,
5 date of birth, voting record, date of registration, and registration
6 number. The information contained in voter preregistration
7 applications is exempt from public inspection and copying. No other
8 information from voter registration records or files is available for
9 public inspection or copying.

10 **Sec. 6.** RCW 29A.08.810 and 2011 c 10 s 20 are each amended to
11 read as follows:

12 (1) Registration of a person as a voter is presumptive evidence
13 of his or her right to vote. A challenge to the person's right to
14 vote must be based on personal knowledge of one of the following:

15 (a) The challenged voter has been convicted of a felony and the
16 voter's civil rights have not been restored;

17 (b) The challenged voter has been judicially declared ineligible
18 to vote due to mental incompetency;

19 (c) The challenged voter does not live at the residential address
20 provided, in which case the challenger must either:

21 (i) Provide the challenged voter's actual residence on the
22 challenge form; or

23 (ii) Submit evidence that he or she exercised due diligence to
24 verify that the challenged voter does not reside at the address
25 provided and to attempt to contact the challenged voter to learn the
26 challenged voter's actual residence, including that the challenger
27 personally:

28 (A) Sent a letter with return service requested to the challenged
29 voter's residential address provided, and to the challenged voter's
30 mailing address, if provided;

31 (B) Visited the residential address provided and contacted
32 persons at the address to determine whether the voter resides at the
33 address and, if not, obtained and submitted with the challenge form a
34 signed affidavit subject to the penalties of perjury from a person
35 who owns or manages property, resides, or is employed at the address
36 provided, that to his or her personal knowledge the challenged voter
37 does not reside at the address as provided on the voter registration;

1 (C) Searched local telephone directories, including online
2 directories, to determine whether the voter maintains a telephone
3 listing at any address in the county;

4 (D) Searched county auditor property records to determine whether
5 the challenged voter owns any property in the county; and

6 (E) Searched the statewide voter registration database to
7 determine if the voter is registered at any other address in the
8 state;

9 (d) The challenged voter (~~((will))~~) is not (~~((be))~~) eighteen years of
10 age (~~((by the next election))~~); or

11 (e) The challenged voter is not a citizen of the United States.

12 (2) A person's right to vote may be challenged by another
13 registered voter or the county prosecuting attorney.

14 (3) The challenger must file a signed affidavit subject to the
15 penalties of perjury swearing that, to his or her personal knowledge
16 and belief, having exercised due diligence to personally verify the
17 evidence presented, the challenged voter either is not qualified to
18 vote or does not reside at the address given on his or her voter
19 registration record based on one of the reasons allowed in subsection
20 (1) of this section. The challenger must provide the factual basis
21 for the challenge, including any information required by subsection
22 (1)(c) of this section, in the signed affidavit. The challenge may
23 not be based on unsupported allegations or allegations by anonymous
24 third parties. All documents pertaining to the challenge are public
25 records.

26 (4) Challenges based on a felony conviction under RCW 29A.08.520
27 must be heard according to RCW 29A.08.520 and rules adopted by the
28 secretary of state.

29 **Sec. 7.** RCW 46.20.155 and 2013 c 11 s 90 are each amended to
30 read as follows:

31 (1) Before issuing an original license or identicard or renewing
32 a license or identicard under this chapter, the licensing agent shall
33 determine if the applicant wants to preregister or register to vote
34 or update his or her voter registration by asking the following
35 question:

36 "Do you want to preregister or register to vote or update your
37 voter registration?"

1 If the applicant chooses to preregister or register to vote, or
2 update a registration, the agent shall ask the following:

3 (1) "Are you a United States citizen?"

4 (2) "Are you (~~or will you be eighteen~~) at least sixteen years
5 of age (~~on or before the next election~~)?"

6 If the applicant answers in the affirmative to both questions,
7 the agent shall then submit the preregistration, registration, or
8 update. If the applicant answers in the negative to either question,
9 the agent shall not submit (~~a voter registration~~) an application.
10 Information provided for preregistration under this section is exempt
11 from public inspection and copying pursuant to RCW 42.56.250.

12 (2) The department shall establish a procedure that substantially
13 meets the requirements of subsection (1) of this section when
14 permitting an applicant to renew a license or identicard by mail or
15 by electronic commerce.

16 **Sec. 8.** RCW 42.56.250 and 2014 c 106 s 1 are each amended to
17 read as follows:

18 The following employment and licensing information is exempt from
19 public inspection and copying under this chapter:

20 (1) Test questions, scoring keys, and other examination data used
21 to administer a license, employment, or academic examination;

22 (2) All applications for public employment, including the names
23 of applicants, resumes, and other related materials submitted with
24 respect to an applicant;

25 (3) The following information held by any public agency in
26 personnel records, public employment related records, volunteer
27 rosters, or included in any mailing list of employees or volunteers
28 of any public agency: Residential addresses, residential telephone
29 numbers, personal wireless telephone numbers, personal electronic
30 mail addresses, social security numbers, driver's license numbers,
31 identicard numbers, and emergency contact information of employees or
32 volunteers of a public agency, and the names, dates of birth,
33 residential addresses, residential telephone numbers, personal
34 wireless telephone numbers, personal electronic mail addresses,
35 social security numbers, and emergency contact information of
36 dependents of employees or volunteers of a public agency. For
37 purposes of this subsection, "employees" includes independent
38 provider home care workers as defined in RCW 74.39A.240;

1 (4) Information that identifies a person who, while an agency
2 employee: (a) Seeks advice, under an informal process established by
3 the employing agency, in order to ascertain his or her rights in
4 connection with a possible unfair practice under chapter 49.60 RCW
5 against the person; and (b) requests his or her identity or any
6 identifying information not be disclosed;

7 (5) Investigative records compiled by an employing agency
8 conducting an active and ongoing investigation of a possible unfair
9 practice under chapter 49.60 RCW or of a possible violation of other
10 federal, state, or local laws prohibiting discrimination in
11 employment;

12 (6) Criminal history records checks for board staff finalist
13 candidates conducted pursuant to RCW 43.33A.025;

14 (7) Except as provided in RCW 47.64.220, salary and benefit
15 information for maritime employees collected from private employers
16 under RCW 47.64.220(1) and described in RCW 47.64.220(2); (~~and~~)

17 (8) Photographs and month and year of birth in the personnel
18 files of employees and workers of criminal justice agencies as
19 defined in RCW 10.97.030. The news media, as defined in RCW
20 5.68.010(5), shall have access to the photographs and full date of
21 birth. For the purposes of this subsection, news media does not
22 include any person or organization of persons in the custody of a
23 criminal justice agency as defined in RCW 10.97.030; and

24 (9) Information contained in voter preregistration records under
25 Title 29A RCW and RCW 46.20.155.

26 NEW SECTION. Sec. 9. This act may be known and cited as the
27 young voter registration equality act.

28 NEW SECTION. Sec. 10. This act takes effect January 1, 2016.

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
