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## HOUSE BILL 1790

State of Washington 64th Legislature 2015 Regular Session

- AN ACT Relating to clarifying the authority of a nurse working in a school setting; adding a new section to chapter 28A.210 RCW; and
- 3 creating a new section.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. (1) The legislature finds that:
- 6 (a) Nursing is governed by specific laws and regulations and
  7 requires a unique license to practice. Clinical supervision of a
  8 nurse is based on knowledge of the laws, regulations, and rules
  9 governing nursing practice, nursing practice standards, and nursing
  10 performance standards;
- 11 (b) Student health needs have changed dramatically over the last 12 twenty years. The number of students with special health care needs 13 has risen exponentially;
- (c) School nurses are held accountable through chapter 18.79 RCW and the uniform disciplinary act, chapter 18.130 RCW, for errors in nursing judgment and actions;
- 17 (d) Individuals who are not nurses are unqualified to make nursing judgments and assessments;
- 19 (e) The independent nature of nursing has been recognized in both 20 statute and rule. For example, under RCW 18.79.040, "registered 21 nursing practice" includes the "administration, supervision,

- 1 delegation, and evaluation of nursing practice." Furthermore, continuing competency rules recently adopted by the nursing care 2 quality assurance commission recognize and acknowledge the 3 independent nature of nursing; and 4
  - (f) The ability of a nurse to practice nursing without the supervision of a nonnurse supervisor is particularly important given the primacy of the nurse-patient relationship.
  - (2) It is therefore the intent of the legislature to reaffirm the authority of a licensed nurse working in a school setting to practice nursing without the supervision of a person who is not a licensed nurse.
- 12 (3) It is not the intent of the legislature to:

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- (a) Prohibit a nonnurse from supervising a licensed nurse working 13 in a school setting with respect to matters other than the practice 14 of nursing, such as matters of administration, terms and conditions 15 16 of employment, and employee performance; or
- 17 (b) Require a school to provide clinical supervision for a 18 licensed nurse working in a school setting.
- 19 NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 28A.210 20 RCW to read as follows:
- (1) Only a registered nurse or an advanced registered nurse 21 practitioner licensed under chapter 18.79 RCW may supervise, direct, 22 or evaluate a licensed nurse working in a school setting with respect 23 24 to the practice of nursing as defined in this section.
  - (2) Nothing in this section:
- (a) Prohibits a nonnurse supervisor from supervising, directing, 27 or evaluating a licensed nurse working in a school setting with respect to matters other than the practice of nursing; 28
- (b) Requires a registered nurse or an advanced registered nurse 29 30 practitioner to be clinically supervised in a school setting; or
- 31 (c) Prohibits a nonnurse supervisor from conferring with a licensed nurse working in a school setting with respect to the 32 practice of nursing. 33
- Within existing funds, the 34 superintendent of instruction shall notify each school district in this state of the 35 requirements of this section. 36
  - (4) For purposes of this section, "practice of nursing" means:
- (a) Registered nursing practice as defined in RCW 18.79.040, 38 advanced registered nursing practice as defined in RCW 18.79.050, and 39

p. 2 HB 1790 licensed practical nursing practice as defined in RCW 18.79.060, including, but not limited to:

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- (i) The administration of medication pursuant to a medication or treatment order; and
  - (ii) The decision to summon emergency medical assistance; and
- (b) Compliance with any state or federal statute or administrative rule specifically regulating licensed nurses, including any statute or rule defining or establishing standards of patient care or professional conduct or practice.
