- 1 AN ACT Relating to adding posttraumatic stress and traumatic
- 2 brain injury to the terminal or debilitating medical conditions that
- 3 qualify for the medical use of marijuana; and amending RCW

- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 6 **Sec. 1.** RCW 69.51A.010 and 2010 c 284 s 2 are each amended to read as follows:
- 8 The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter 9 unless the context clearly requires otherwise.
 - (1) "Designated provider" means a person who:
- 11 (a) Is eighteen years of age or older;
- 12 (b) Has been designated in writing by a patient to serve as a 13 designated provider under this chapter;
- 14 (c) Is prohibited from consuming marijuana obtained for the 15 personal, medical use of the patient for whom the individual is 16 acting as designated provider; and
- 17 (d) Is the designated provider to only one patient at any one 18 time.
- 19 (2) "Health care professional," for purposes of this chapter 20 only, means a physician licensed under chapter 18.71 RCW, a physician 21 assistant licensed under chapter 18.71A RCW, an osteopathic physician

- 1 licensed under chapter 18.57 RCW, an osteopathic physicians'
- 2 assistant licensed under chapter 18.57A RCW, a naturopath licensed
- 3 under chapter 18.36A RCW, or an advanced registered nurse
- 4 practitioner licensed under chapter 18.79 RCW.
- 5 (3) "Medical use of marijuana" means the production, possession,
- 6 or administration of marijuana, as defined in RCW $69.50.101((\frac{q}{q}))$
- 7 $\underline{\text{(t)}}$, for the exclusive benefit of a qualifying patient in the
- 8 treatment of his or her terminal or debilitating illness.
 - (4) "Qualifying patient" means a person who:

- 10 (a) Is a patient of a health care professional;
- 11 (b) Has been diagnosed by that health care professional as having 12 a terminal or debilitating medical condition;
- 13 (c) Is a resident of the state of Washington at the time of such 14 diagnosis;
- 15 (d) Has been advised by that health care professional about the 16 risks and benefits of the medical use of marijuana; and
- 17 (e) Has been advised by that health care professional that they 18 may benefit from the medical use of marijuana.
- 19 (5) "Tamper-resistant paper" means paper that meets one or more 20 of the following industry-recognized features:
- 21 (a) One or more features designed to prevent copying of the 22 paper;
- 23 (b) One or more features designed to prevent the erasure or 24 modification of information on the paper; or
- 25 (c) One or more features designed to prevent the use of counterfeit valid documentation.
 - (6) "Terminal or debilitating medical condition" means:
- 28 (a) Cancer, human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), multiple 29 sclerosis, epilepsy or other seizure disorder, or spasticity 30 disorders; ((er))
- 31 (b) Intractable pain, limited for the purpose of this chapter to 32 mean pain unrelieved by standard medical treatments and medications; 33 ((or))
- 34 (c) Glaucoma, either acute or chronic, limited for the purpose of 35 this chapter to mean increased intraocular pressure unrelieved by 36 standard treatments and medications; ((or))
- 37 (d) Crohn's disease with debilitating symptoms unrelieved by 38 standard treatments or medications; ((ex))
- (e) Hepatitis C with debilitating nausea or intractable pain unrelieved by standard treatments or medications; ((ex))

- 1 (f) Diseases, including anorexia, which result in nausea, 2 vomiting, wasting, appetite loss, cramping, seizures, muscle spasms, 3 or spasticity, when these symptoms are unrelieved by standard 4 treatments or medications; ((or))
 - (g) <u>Posttraumatic stress;</u>

- (h) Traumatic brain injury; or
- (i) Any other medical condition duly approved by the Washington state medical quality assurance commission in consultation with the board of osteopathic medicine and surgery as directed in this chapter.
 - (7) "Valid documentation" means:
- (a) A statement signed and dated by a qualifying patient's health care professional written on tamper-resistant paper, which states that, in the health care professional's professional opinion, the patient may benefit from the medical use of marijuana; and
- 16 (b) Proof of identity such as a Washington state driver's license 17 or identicard, as defined in RCW 46.20.035.
