SENATE BILL 5680

State of Washington 64th Legislature 2015 Regular Session

By Senators Frockt, Bailey, Kohl-Welles, Keiser, and Hasegawa Read first time 01/28/15. Referred to Committee on Health Care.

- AN ACT Relating to family medicine residencies in health professional shortage areas; amending RCW 70.112.020; reenacting and amending RCW 70.112.010; adding a new section to chapter 43.70 RCW; adding new sections to chapter 70.112 RCW; and creating a new section.
- 6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. It is the intent of the legislature to increase the number of family medicine physicians in shortage areas in the state by providing a fiscal incentive for hospitals and clinics to develop or expand residency programs in these areas. The legislature also intends to encourage family medicine residents to work in shortage areas by funding the health professional loan repayment and scholarship program.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 43.70 RCW to read as follows:
- 16 (1) The department shall conduct a performance audit and 17 evaluation of the family medicine residency programs created in 18 chapter 70.112 RCW.
- 19 (2) The audit must:

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- 1 (a) Determine the locations of the residency programs, whether 2 the programs are in health professional shortage areas as defined in 3 RCW 70.112.010 and how the distribution of programs changes over 4 time;
- 5 (b) Compare the number of family medical residents who attended 6 an in-state versus an out-of-state medical school;
- 7 (c) Compare the number of residents in family medicine versus 8 specialty areas; and
- 9 (d) Determine whether graduates of the residency programs in 10 health professional shortage areas continue to work within shortage 11 areas.
- 12 (3) The department shall report to the appropriate legislative 13 committees of the house of representatives and the senate the results 14 of its findings by November 1, 2016, and November 1st every even year 15 thereafter.
- 16 Sec. 3. RCW 70.112.010 and 2010 1st sp.s. c 7 s 41 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:
- 18 <u>The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter</u> 19 <u>unless the context clearly requires otherwise.</u>
- 20 (1) "Advisory board" means the family medicine education advisory 21 board created in section 5 of this act.
- 22 (2) "Affiliated" means established or developed in cooperation 23 with the school of medicine.

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- (((2) "Family practice unit" means the community facility or classroom used for training of ambulatory health skills within a residency training program.))
- 27 (3) "Health professional shortage areas" has the same definition 28 as in RCW 28B.115.020.
- 29 <u>(4)</u> "Residency programs" ((mean[s])) means community_based 30 ((family practice)) residency educational programs <u>in family</u> 31 medicine, either in existence or established under this chapter <u>and</u> 32 that are certified by the accreditation council for graduate medical 33 education or by the American osteopathic association.
- ((\(\frac{(++)}{4}\))) (5) "Schools of medicine" means the University of
 Washington school of medicine located in Seattle, Washington; the
 Pacific Northwest University of Health Sciences located in Yakima,
 Washington; and any other such medical schools that are accredited by
 the liaison committee on medical education or the American
 osteopathic association's commission on osteopathic college

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- 1 accreditation, and that locate their entire four-year medical program
- 2 in Washington.
- 3 **Sec. 4.** RCW 70.112.020 and 2012 c 117 s 426 are each amended to 4 read as follows:
- 5 <u>(1)</u> There is established a statewide medical education system for 6 the purpose of training resident physicians in family ((practice)) 7 medicine.
- 8 (2) The deans of the school of medicine shall be responsible for implementing the development and expansion of residency programs in 9 10 cooperation with the medical profession, hospitals, and clinics 11 located throughout the state. The ((chair of the department of family medicine in the)) schools of medicine shall ((determine where 12 13 affiliated residency programs shall exist;)) support development of high quality, accredited, affiliated residency programs, giving 14 15 consideration to communities in the state where the population, 16 hospital facilities, number of physicians, and interest in medical 17 education indicate the potential success of the residency program and prioritizing support for health professional shortage areas in the 18 19 state.
- 20 (3) The medical education system shall provide financial support 21 for residents in training for those programs which are affiliated 22 with the schools of medicine and shall establish positions for 23 appropriate faculty to staff these programs.
- 24 (4) The schools of medicine shall coordinate with the office of 25 student financial assistance to notify prospective family medicine 26 students and residents of their eligibility for the health 27 professional loan repayment and scholarship program under chapter 28 28B.115 RCW.
- 29 <u>(5)</u> The number of programs shall be determined by the board and 30 be in keeping with the needs of the state.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. A new section is added to chapter 70.112 RCW to read as follows:
- 33 (1) There is created a family medicine education advisory board, 34 which must consist of the following nine members:
- 35 (a) One member appointed by the dean of the school of medicine at 36 the University of Washington school of medicine;
- 37 (b) One member appointed by the dean of the school of medicine at 38 the Pacific Northwest University of Health Sciences;

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1 (c) Two citizen members, one from west of the crest of the 2 Cascade mountains and one from east of the crest of the Cascade 3 mountains, to be appointed by the governor;

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- (d) One member appointed by the Washington state medical association;
- 6 (e) One member appointed by the Washington osteopathic medical association;
- 8 (f) One member appointed by the Washington state academy of 9 family physicians;
- 10 (g) One hospital administrator representing those Washington 11 hospitals with family medicine residency programs, appointed by the 12 Washington state hospital association; and
- 13 (h) One director representing the directors of community-based 14 family medicine residency programs, appointed by the family medicine 15 residency network.
- 16 (2) The two members of the advisory board appointed by the deans 17 of the schools of medicine shall serve as chairs of the advisory 18 board.
 - (3) The cochairs of the advisory board, appointed by the deans of the schools of medicine, shall serve as permanent members of the advisory board without specified term limits. The deans of the schools of medicine have the authority to replace the chair representing their school. The deans of the schools of medicine shall appoint a new member in the event that the member representing their school vacates his or her position.
- 26 (4) Other members must be initially appointed as follows: Terms of the two public members must be two years; terms of the members 27 appointed by the medical association and the hospital association 28 29 must be three years; and the remaining members must be four years. Thereafter, terms for the nonpermanent members must be four years. 30 31 Members may serve two consecutive terms. New appointments must be 32 filled in the same manner as for original appointments. Vacancies 33 must be filled for an unexpired term in the manner of the original appointment. 34
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 6. A new section is added to chapter 70.112 RCW to read as follows:
- The advisory board shall consider and provide recommendations on the selection of the areas within the state where affiliate residency programs could exist, the allocation of funds appropriated under this

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- 1 chapter, and the procedures for review and evaluation of the
- 2 residency programs.

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
