- 1 Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the 2 following:
- INTENT. (1)(a) According to the 3 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. Washington interscholastic activities association, interscholastic 4 athletics and activities are a vital part of enriching students' 5 educational experiences and developing students into responsible 6 7 adults. The legislature finds that research compiled by the association 8 demonstrates that students who participate in extracurricular activities have: 9
- 10 (i) Better grades and higher standardized test scores;
- 11 (ii) Increased school attendance; and
- 12 (iii) Improved health and wellness.
- (b) In addition, the legislature finds that this research shows that participation in extracurricular activities develops lifelong skills and relationship building; has long-term economic benefits; increases the odds of attending and graduating from college; decreases the likelihood of juvenile crimes, drug, alcohol, and cigarette use, and sexual activities; and positively enhances a student's educational experience.
- 20 (2) Thus, the legislature intends to reduce barriers to 21 participation in extracurricular activities by:
- (a) Capping fees for low-income students who participate in these activities, including career and technical student organizations, and sports and other activities governed by the Washington interscholastic activities association;
- 26 (b) Requiring that the process for charging and collecting fees 27 be identical for all students; and
- 28 (c) Reducing the frequency of required physical examinations.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 28A.600 RCW to read as follows:

FEE LIMITATIONS. (1)(a) The maximum fee charged to a public or private high school student eligible to participate in the federal free and reduced-price meals program for an associated student body or other student identification card is five dollars per school year.

- (b) The maximum fee charged to a public or private high school student eligible to participate in the federal free and reduced-price meals program to participate in an extracurricular activity is five dollars per extracurricular activity per school year. This subsection (1)(b) applies only to high school students who are enrolled in a school district that is a member of the Washington interscholastic activities association.
- (c) The maximum fee charged to a public or private high school student eligible to participate in the federal free and reduced-price meals program to participate in career and technical student organizations is five dollars per organization per year.
- (2) The maximum fee limitations described in this section do not apply to admission fees for events, such as competition events, artistic exhibits or performances, or dances or other student gatherings, nor for the purchase of clothing, supplies, gear, or equipment required to participate in extracurricular activities or career and technical student organizations.
- (3) The process for charging and collecting fees from public and private high school students eligible to participate in the federal free and reduced-price meals program, as required by subsection (1) of this section, must be identical to the process for charging and collecting fees from other students.
- 27 (4) The legislature recommends, but does not require, that the 28 provisions of this section are made applicable to public and private 29 junior and middle schools.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 28A.320 RCW to read as follows:
- LIMITS. School districts 32 COMMUNICATING FEE must 33 effectively, and frequently communicate the fee limits on the 34 purchase of student identification cards, participation 35 extracurricular activities, and participation in career and technical student organizations for students eligible to participate in the 36 federal free and reduced-price meals program, described in section 2 37 of this act. Information about the fee limits must be included on the 38 high school's web site and the school district's web 39 Code Rev/KB:amh 2 H-4352.2/18 2nd draft

- 5 **Sec. 4.** RCW 28A.195.010 and 2009 c 548 s 303 are each amended to 6 read as follows:
 - (1) The legislature hereby recognizes that private schools should be subject only to those minimum state controls necessary to insure the health and safety of all the students in the state and to insure a sufficient basic education to meet usual graduation requirements. The state, any agency or official thereof, shall not restrict or dictate any specific educational or other programs for private schools except as hereinafter in this section provided.
 - (2) Principals of private schools or superintendents of private school districts shall file each year with the state superintendent of public instruction a statement certifying that the minimum requirements hereinafter set forth are being met, noting any deviations. After review of the statement, the state superintendent will notify schools or school districts of those deviations which must be corrected. In case of major deviations, the school or school district may request and the state board of education may grant provisional status for one year in order that the school or school district may take action to meet the requirements. The state board of education shall not require private school students to meet the student learning goals, obtain a certificate of academic achievement, or a certificate of individual achievement to graduate from high school, to master the essential academic learning requirements, or to be assessed pursuant to RCW 28A.655.061. However, private schools may choose, on a voluntary basis, to have their students master these essential academic learning requirements, take the assessments, and obtain a certificate of academic achievement or a certificate of individual achievement. Minimum requirements shall be as follows:
 - ((\(\frac{(1)}{1}\)) (a) The minimum school year for instructional purposes shall consist of no less than one hundred eighty school days or the equivalent in annual minimum instructional hour offerings, with a school-wide annual average total instructional hour offering of one thousand hours for students enrolled in grades one through twelve, and at least four hundred fifty hours for students enrolled in kindergarten.

- $((\frac{(2)}{2}))$ (b) The school day shall be the same as defined in RCW 28A.150.203.
- (((+3))) (c) All classroom teachers shall hold appropriate 4 Washington state certification except as follows:
- 5 (((a))) <u>(i)</u> Teachers for religious courses or courses for which 6 no counterpart exists in public schools shall not be required to 7 obtain a state certificate to teach those courses.

- (((b))) <u>(ii)</u> In exceptional cases, people of unusual competence but without certification may teach students so long as a certified person exercises general supervision. Annual written statements shall be submitted to the office of the superintendent of public instruction reporting and explaining such circumstances.
- ((\(\frac{(4)}{1}\)) (\(\frac{d}{1}\)) An approved private school may operate an extension program for parents, guardians, or persons having legal custody of a child to teach children in their custody. The extension program shall require at a minimum that:
 - $((\frac{(a)}{(a)}))$ (i) The parent, guardian, or custodian be under the supervision of an employee of the approved private school who is certified under chapter 28A.410 RCW;
 - $((\frac{b}{b}))$ (ii) The planning by the certified person and the parent, guardian, or person having legal custody include objectives consistent with this subsection (2)(d) and ((subsections (1), (2), (5), (6), and (7) of this section)) (a), (b), (e), (f), and (g) of this subsection;
 - (((e))) (iii) The certified person spend a minimum average each
 month of one contact hour per week with each student under his or her
 supervision who is enrolled in the approved private school extension
 program;
- $((\frac{d}{d}))$ <u>(iv)</u> Each student's progress be evaluated by the 30 certified person; and
- $((\frac{\langle e \rangle}{\langle e \rangle}))$ The certified employee shall not supervise more than thirty students enrolled in the approved private school's extension program.
- (((+5))) (e) Appropriate measures shall be taken to safeguard all permanent records against loss or damage.

 37 shall be adequate to meet the program offered by the school or
 38 district: PROVIDED, That each school building shall meet reasonable

- $((\frac{7}{7}))$ (g) Private school curriculum shall include instruction 4 of the basic skills of occupational education, science, mathematics, 5 6 social studies, history, health, reading, writing, spelling, and the development of appreciation of art and music, all 7 in sufficient units for meeting state board of education graduation 8 9 requirements.
- $((\frac{8}{8}))$ (h) Each school or school district shall be required to 10 11 maintain up-to-date policy statements related to the administration 12 and operation of the school or school district.

- (3) All decisions of policy, philosophy, selection of books, teaching material, curriculum, except as in subsection $((\frac{7}{2}))$ of this section provided, school rules and administration, or other matters not specifically referred to in this section, shall be the responsibility of the administration and administrators of the particular private school involved.
- (4) Each school or school district shall comply with the 19 requirements of sections 2 and 3 of this act relating to fee limits 20 on the purchase of student identification cards, participation in 21 extracurricular activities, and participation in career and technical 22 student organizations for students eligible to participate in the 23 federal free and reduced-price meals program. 24
- 25 NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. A new section is added to chapter 28A.300 26 RCW to read as follows:
- 27 PROMOTING LIVELY ACTIVITIES FOR YOUTH (PLAY) GRANT PROGRAM. (1)(a) The promoting lively activities for youth (PLAY) grant program 28 is created to subsidize small school districts unduly impacted by 29 30 section 2(1)(a) of this act, which limits the associated student body or other student identification card fee charged to public high 31 school students eligible to participate in the federal free and 32 reduced-price meals program. 33
- (b) The office of financial management must contract with the 34 Washington interscholastic activities association to administer the 35 36 program.
- (2)(a) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for 37 this specific purpose and beginning in the 2018-19 school year, the 38 Washington interscholastic activities association must allocate, on a 39 H-4352.2/18 2nd draft

- first come basis, up to fifty thousand dollars per school year for the purposes of the PLAY grant program.
- 3 (b) The Washington interscholastic activities association may not 4 retain any of the appropriated amounts for administrative purposes.
 - (3) To qualify for a PLAY grant, a school district must:
 - (a) Have fewer than two thousand students;
- 7 (b) Have fifty percent or more of their high school students 8 eligible to participate in the federal free and reduced-price meals 9 program; and
- 10 (c) Be impacted by the maximum student identification card fee 11 limitations described in section 2(1)(a) of this act.
 - (4) Applications for a PLAY grant must include the number and overall percentage of high school students eligible to participate in the federal free and reduced-price meals program who purchased a student identification card in the prior school year, and an estimate of the number of student identification card fees subject to the maximum described in section 2(1)(a) of this act.
- 18 (5) The maximum grant award per school district is two thousand 19 dollars per year.
- (6) By November 1, 2019, and in compliance with RCW 43.01.036, 20 21 November 1st annually thereafter, the interscholastic activities association must report to the appropriate 22 policy and fiscal committees of the legislature the following data: 23 24 The number of applications, a summary of the information submitted with applications as required under subsection (4) of this section, 25 26 and the number and amount of PLAY grants awarded.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 6. A new section is added to chapter 28A.600 RCW to read as follows:
- 29 PHYSICAL EXAMINATION FREQUENCY. Students may not be required to 30 complete a physical examination to participate in extracurricular 31 activities more often than every twenty-four months, unless 32 recommended by a medical authority licensed to perform a physical 33 examination."

<u>EFFECT:</u> (1) Makes the maximum fee limit for participation in Career and Technical Student Organizations (CTSO) applicable only to students eligible to participate in the federal free and reduced-price meals (FRPM) program;

- (2) Specifies that the maximum fee limitations do not apply to admission fees for events or the purchase of supplies required to participate in extracurricular activities or CTSOs;
- (3) Changes the purpose of the PLAY grant to subsidizing small school districts unduly impacted by student identification card fee limits, rather than extracurricular activities participation fee limits;
- (4) Reduces the maximum grant award per school district to two thousand, rather than five thousand, dollars per year; and
- (5) Changes the organization required to contract with the Washington Interscholastic Activities Association (WIAA) for administration of the grant program from the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction to the Office of Financial Management (OFM).
