4 adopted and, subject to the provisions set forth in this act, the
5 several dollar amounts hereinafter specified, or so much thereof as
6 shall be sufficient to accomplish the purposes designated, are hereby
7 appropriated and authorized to be incurred for capital projects
8 during the period beginning with the effective date of this act and
9 ending June 30, 2019, out of the several funds specified in this act.

29 2017-19 Housing Trust Fund Program (30000872)

1 The appropriations in this section are subject to the following
2 conditions and limitations:

3 (1) \$58,000,000 of the state taxable building construction
4 account—state appropriation, (~~(\$43,400,000)~~) \$44,131,000 of the state
5 building construction account—state appropriation, and (~~(\$5,370,000)~~)
6 \$8,658,000 of the Washington housing trust account—state
7 appropriation are provided solely for affordable housing and
8 preservation of affordable housing. Of the amounts in this
9 subsection:

10 (a) \$24,370,000 is provided solely for housing projects that
11 provide supportive housing and case-management services to persons
12 with chronic mental illness. The department must prioritize low-
13 income supportive housing unit proposals that provide services or
14 include a partner community behavioral health treatment provider;

15 (b) \$10,000,000 is provided solely for housing preservation
16 grants or loans to be awarded competitively. The grants may be
17 provided for major building improvements, preservation, and system
18 replacements, necessary for the existing housing trust fund portfolio
19 to maintain long-term viability. The department must require that a
20 capital needs assessment is performed to estimate the cost of the
21 preservation project at contract execution. Funds may not be used to
22 add or expand the capacity of the property. To receive grants,
23 housing projects must meet the following requirements:

24 (i) The property is more than fifteen years old;

25 (ii) At least 50 percent of the housing units are occupied by
26 families and individuals at or below 30 percent area median income.

27 (iii) The improvements will result in reduction of operating or
28 utilities costs, or both; and

29 (iv) Other criteria that the department considers necessary to
30 achieve the purpose of this program.

31 (c) \$5,000,000 is provided solely for housing projects that
32 benefit people at or below 80 percent of the area median income who
33 have been displaced by a natural disaster declared by the governor,
34 including people who have been displaced within the last two biennia.

35 (d) \$1,000,000 of the Washington housing trust account—state
36 appropriation is provided solely for the department to work with the
37 communities of concern commission to focus on creating capital assets
38 that will help reduce poverty and build stronger and more sustainable
39 communities using the communities' cultural understanding and vision.

1 The funding must be used for predevelopment costs for capital
2 projects identified by the commission and for other activities to
3 assist communities in developing capacity to create community-owned
4 capital assets.

5 (e) \$1,000,000 of the Washington housing trust account—state
6 appropriation is provided solely for a nonprofit, public development
7 authority, local government, or housing authority to purchase the
8 south annex properties located at 1531 Broadway, 1534 Broadway, and
9 909 East Pine street owned by the state board of community and
10 technical colleges. The property must be used to provide services and
11 housing for homeless youth and young adults.

12 (f) (~~(\$21,987,000)~~) \$26,006,000 is provided solely for the
13 following list of housing projects:

23 (ix) \$2,500,000 is provided solely for grants to purchase low-
24 income mobile home parks. Up to \$2,500,000 is for the Firs Mobile
25 Home Park. If the Firs Mobile Home Park is not purchased, the amount
26 provided in this subsection shall lapse.

27 (x) \$6,000,000 is provided solely for grants for high quality
28 low-income housing projects that will quickly move people from
29 homelessness into secure housing, and are significantly less
30 expensive to construct than traditional housing. It is the intent of
31 the legislature that these grants serve projects with a total project
32 development cost per housing unit of less than \$125,000, excluding
33 the value of land, and with a commitment by the applicant to maintain
34 the housing units for at least a twenty-five year period. Amounts
35 provided that are subject to this subsection must be used to plan,
36 predesign, design, provide technical assistance and financial
37 services, purchase land for, and build innovative low-income housing
38 units. \$3,000,000 of the appropriation that is subject to this
39 subsection is provided solely for innovative affordable housing in
40 Shelton and \$3,000,000 of the appropriation that is subject to this

1 subsection is provided solely for innovative affordable housing for
2 veterans in Orting. Mental health and substance abuse counseling
3 services must be offered to residents of housing projects supported
4 by appropriations in this subsection. \$500,000 of the appropriation
5 for housing units in Shelton can be released for purchase of land,
6 planning, or predesign services before the project is fully funded.
7 \$500,000 of the appropriation for housing units in Orting can be
8 released for purchase of land, planning, or predesign services before
9 the project is fully funded.

10 ((~~viii~~—\$6,000,000)) (xi) \$7,290,000 is provided solely for
11 grants to the following organizations using innovative methods to
12 address homelessness: ((~~\$3,000,000~~)) \$4,290,000 for THA Arlington
13 drive youth campus in Tacoma and \$3,000,000 for a King county housing
14 project.

15 (xii) \$1,500,000 is provided solely for Valley Cities modular
16 housing project in Auburn.

17 (g) Of the amounts appropriated remaining after (a) through (f)
18 of this subsection, the department must allocate the funds as
19 follows:

20 (i) 10 percent is provided solely for housing projects that
21 benefit veterans;

22 (ii) 10 percent is provided solely for housing projects that
23 benefit homeownership;

24 (iii) 5 percent is provided solely for housing projects that
25 benefit people with developmental disabilities;

26 (iv) The remaining amount is provided solely for projects that
27 serve low-income and special needs populations in need of housing,
28 including, but not limited to, homeless families with children,
29 homeless youth, farmworkers, and seniors.

30 (2) In evaluating projects in this section, the department must
31 give preference for applications based on some or all of the criteria
32 in RCW 43.185.070(5).

33 (3) The department must strive to allocate all of the amounts
34 appropriated in this section within the 2017-2019 fiscal biennium in
35 the manner prescribed in subsection (1) of this section. However, if
36 upon review of applications the department determines there are not
37 adequate suitable projects in a category, the department may allocate
38 funds to projects serving other low-income and special needs
39 populations, provided those projects are located in an area with an
40 identified need for the type of housing proposed.

22 Spokane river forum. The department shall not execute a contract with
23 the grant recipient unless the Spokane river forum is in receipt of
24 all permits by (~~March~~) June 1, 2018. If the terms and conditions of
25 this subsection are not met by (~~March~~) June 1, 2018, the funding
26 provided in this subsection shall lapse.

35 2018 Local and Community Projects (40000005)

1 The appropriations in this section are subject to the following
2 conditions and limitations:

3 (1) The department shall not expend the appropriations in this
4 section unless and until the nonstate share of project costs have
5 been either expended or firmly committed, or both, in an amount
6 sufficient to complete the project or a distinct phase of the project
7 that is useable to the public for the purpose intended by the
8 legislature. This requirement does not apply to projects where a
9 share of the appropriation is for design costs only.

10 (2) Prior to receiving funds, project recipients must demonstrate
11 that the project site is under control for a minimum of ten years,
12 either through ownership or a long-term lease. This requirement does
13 not apply to appropriations for preconstruction activities or
14 appropriations in which the sole purpose is to purchase real property
15 that does not include a construction or renovation component.

16 (3) Projects funded in this section may be required to comply
17 with Washington's high performance building standards as required by
18 chapter 39.35D RCW.

19 (4) Project funds are available on a reimbursement basis only,
20 and shall not be advanced under any circumstances.

21 (5) In contracts for grants authorized under this section the
22 department shall include provisions which require that capital
23 improvements be held by the grantee for a specified period of time
24 appropriate to the amount of the grant and that facilities be used
25 for the express purpose of the grant. If the grantee is found to be
26 out of compliance with provisions of the contract, the grantee shall
27 repay to the state general fund the principal amount of the grant
28 plus interest calculated at the rate of interest on state of
29 Washington general obligation bonds issued most closely to the date
30 of authorization of the grant.

31 (6) Projects funded in this section, including those that are
32 owned and operated by nonprofit organizations, are generally required
33 to pay state prevailing wages.

20 (4) The first meeting of the task force must occur by June 30,
21 2018. The task force must immediately focus on water resource
22 inventory area 4. The task force shall not meet regarding water
23 resource inventory area 3 before January 1, 2019.

24 (5) Staff support for the task force must be provided by the
25 office of program research and senate committee services. The
26 department of ecology and the department of fish and wildlife shall
27 cooperate with the task force and provide information as the cochairs
28 reasonably request.

29 (6) Within existing appropriations, the expenses of the
30 operations of the task force, including the expenses associated with
31 the task force's meetings, must be paid jointly and in equal amounts
32 by the senate and the house of representatives. Task force
33 expenditures and meetings are subject to approval by the house

35 committee. Legislative members of the task force are reimbursed for
36 travel expenses in accordance with RCW 44.04.120. Nonlegislative

24 conservation and education values. To fulfill the goals of the 2018

2 scoring process to the legislative fiscal committees and the four-
3 year institutions. Each project must be reviewed and scored within
4 one of the following categories, according to the project's principal

21 and upgrade space to meet current program requirements. Renovation
22 projects should represent a complete renovation of a total facility
23 or an isolated wing of a facility. A reasonable renovation project
24 should cost between sixty to eighty percent of current replacement
25 value and restore the renovated area to at least twenty-five years of
26 useful life. New space may be programmed for the same or a different
27 use than the space being renovated and may include additions to
28 improve access and enhance the relationship of program or support
29 space;

30 (d) Major stand-alone campus infrastructure projects;

31 (e) Projects that promote economic growth and innovation through
32 expanded research activity. The acquisition and installation of
33 specialized equipment is authorized under this category; and

34 (f) Other project categories as determined by the office of
35 financial management in consultation with the legislative fiscal
36 committees.

37 (2) The office of financial management, in consultation with the
38 legislative fiscal committees, shall establish a scoring system and
39 process for each four-year project category that is based on the
40 framework used in the community and technical college system of

1 prioritization. Staff from the state board for community and
2 technical colleges and the four-year institutions shall provide
3 technical assistance on the development of a scoring system and
4 process.

5 (3) The office of financial management shall consult with the
6 legislative fiscal committees in the scoring of four-year institution
7 project proposals, and may also solicit participation by independent

9 (a) For each four-year project category, the scoring system must,
10 at a minimum, include an evaluation of enrollment trends,

14 (b) Each four-year project category may include projects at the
15 predesign, design, or construction funding phase.

16 (c) To the extent possible, the objective analysis and scoring
17 system of all capital budget projects shall occur within the context
18 of any and all performance agreements between the office of financial
19 management and the governing board of a public, four-year institution
20 of higher education that aligns goals, priorities, desired outcomes,
21 flexibility, institutional mission, accountability, and levels of
22 resources.

23 (4) In evaluating and scoring four-year institution projects, the
24 office of financial management shall take into consideration project
25 schedules that result in realistic, balanced, and predictable
26 expenditure patterns over the ensuing three biennia.

27 (5) The office of financial management shall distribute common
28 definitions, the scoring system, and other information required for
29 the project proposal and scoring process as part of its biennial
30 budget instructions. The office of financial management, in
31 consultation with the legislative fiscal committees, shall develop
32 common definitions that four-year institutions must use in developing
33 their project proposals and lists under this section.

34 (6) In developing any scoring system for capital projects
35 proposed by the four-year institutions, the office of financial

37 (a) Shall be provided with all required information by the four-

8 year higher education institution shall prepare and submit
9 prioritized lists of the individual projects proposed by the
10 institution for the ensuing six-year period in each category. The
11 lists must be submitted to the office of financial management and the
12 legislative fiscal committees. The four-year institutions may
13 aggregate minor works project proposals by primary purpose for
14 ranking purposes. Proposed minor works projects must be prioritized
15 within the aggregated proposal, and supporting documentation,
16 including project descriptions and cost estimates, must be provided
17 to the office of financial management and the legislative fiscal
18 committees.

19 (8) For the 2017-2019 fiscal biennium, pursuant to subsection (1)
20 of this section, by November 1, 2018, the office of financial
21 management must score higher education capital project criteria with
22 a rating scale that assesses how well a particular project satisfies

29 project; and the amount and fund source being requested.

30 (c) The office of financial management shall reference these
31 reporting requirements in its budget instructions.

37 prioritized list of capital projects for the legislature to consider
38 that includes all of the projects requested by the four-year

2 list of capital projects shall be based on the following priorities
3 in the following order:

9 (b) The office of financial management shall include all of the
10 capital projects requested by the four-year institutions of higher

13 (c) The form of the prioritized list for capital projects
14 requested by the four-year institutions of higher education shall be
15 provided as one list, ranked in priority order with the highest
16 priority project ranked number "1" through the lowest priority
17 project numbered last. The ranking for the prioritized list of
18 capital projects may not:

19 (i) Include subpriorities;

20 (ii) Be organized by category;

21 (iii) Assume any state bond or building account biennial funding
22 level to prioritize the list; or

23 (iv) Assume any specific share of projects by institution in the
24 priority list.

25 (5) Institutions and the state board for community and technical
26 colleges shall submit any supplemental capital budget requests and
27 revisions to the office of financial management by November 1st and
28 to the legislature by January 1st.

31 obligated to, develop one prioritized list of capital projects for
32 the legislature to consider that includes all of the projects

34 scored by the office of financial management pursuant to chapter

37 NEW SECTION. Sec. 7015. A new section is added to 2018 c 2
38 (uncodified) to read as follows:

1 (1) The department of natural resources must conduct an asset
2 valuation of state lands and state forestlands held in trust and
3 managed by the department. The analysis required in subsections (3)
4 and (4) of this section may be provided through contracted services.

5 (2) The department must describe all trust lands, by trust,
6 including timber lands, agricultural lands, commercial lands, and
7 other lands, and identify revenues from leases or other sources for
8 those lands. The department must briefly describe the income from
9 these trust lands, and potential enhancements to income, including
10 intergenerational income, from the asset bases of these trusts.

11 (3) The analysis must estimate the current fair market value of
12 these lands for each trust beneficiary, including the separate
13 beneficiaries of state lands as defined in RCW 79.02.010, and the
14 beneficiaries of state forestlands as specified in chapter 79.22 RCW.
15 The estimation of current fair market values must specify the values
16 by the various asset classes including, but not limited to, the
17 following asset classes: Timber lands; irrigated agriculture; dryland
18 agriculture, including grazing lands; commercial real estate; mining;
19 and other income production. The analysis must also estimate the
20 value of ecosystem services and recreation benefits for asset classes
21 that produce these benefits. The legislature encourages the
22 department and its contractors to develop methods and tools to allow
23 tracking of the estimated fair market values over time.

25 various trusts, the analysis must calculate the average annual gross
26 and net income as a percentage of estimated current asset value.

27 (5) The department must provide a progress report to the
28 legislature by December 1, 2018. A follow up progress report is
29 expected to be provided by December 1, 2019, and may include any
30 initial recommendations. The final report is expected to be submitted
31 by June 30, 2020, and must include options to:

32 (a) Improve the net rates of return on different classes of
33 assets;

34 (b) Increase the reliability of, and enhance if possible, revenue
35 for trust beneficiaries; and

36 (c) Present and explain factors that either (i) define, (ii)
37 constrict, or (iii) define and constrict the department's management
38 practices and revenue production. The factors to be considered
39 include, but are not limited to, statutory, constitutional,
40 operational, and social factors.

1 **Sec. 7016.** RCW 43.17.200 and 2005 c 36 s 4 are each amended to

3 (1) All state agencies including all state departments, boards,
4 councils, commissions, and quasi public corporations shall allocate,
5 as a nondeductible item, out of any moneys appropriated for the

13 an artist and design art to be integrated in the building design. The
14 one-half of one percent to be expended by the Washington state arts
15 commission must be adjusted downward by the amount expended by a
16 state agency during the design phase of the capital project.

17 (3) The works of art may be placed on public lands, integral to
18 or attached to a public building or structure, detached within or
19 outside a public building or structure, part of a portable exhibition
20 or collection, part of a temporary exhibition, or loaned or exhibited
21 in other public facilities.

22 (4) In addition to the cost of the works of art, the one-half of
23 one percent of the appropriation as provided herein shall be used to
24 provide for the administration of the visual arts program, including
25 conservation of the state art collection, by the Washington state
26 arts commission and all costs for installation of the works of art.

EFFECT: Appropriations, including alternative financing contracts, total \$414.8 million, of which \$198 million are appropriated from bond proceeds. The Striking Amendment replaces ESSB 6095, increasing bond appropriations by \$12.3 million dollars and other funds by \$18.2 million.
