- 3 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 28A.715 4 RCW to read as follows:
 - (1) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall establish a pilot project for one or more schools that are the subject of a state-tribal education compact, schools also known as "tribal compact schools," to implement modifications to requirements governing school attendance, school year length, and assessments. Tribal compact schools that apply to the office of the superintendent of public instruction to participate in the pilot project must be included in the pilot project.
- 13 (2) The purpose of the pilot project is to grant participating 14 schools flexibility regarding:
- 15 (a) Accommodating cultural, fisheries, and agricultural events 16 and practices; and
 - (b) Replacing, to the maximum extent permitted by state and federal law, statewide student assessments with locally developed assessments that are culturally relevant, based on community standards, and aligned with the Washington state learning standards.
 - (3) Schools participating in the pilot project may:
- 22 (a) Request a waiver, in accordance with section 2 of this act, 23 the requirement for a one hundred eighty-day school 24 established in RCW 28A.150.220. The waiver requested in accordance this subsection (3)(a) for allowing additional 25 may be 26 instructional days, including allowance an for vear-round 27 instruction;
- (b) Develop curricula that links student learning with engagement in cultural, fisheries, and agricultural programs, and aligns with the Washington state learning standards;

- 1 (c) Request authorization to consider student participation in 2 cultural, fisheries, or agricultural programs as instructional days 3 for the purposes of RCW 28A.150.220(5);
 - (d) Replace, to the maximum extent permitted by state and federal law, statewide student assessments with locally developed assessments that are culturally relevant, based on community standards, and aligned with the Washington state learning standards; and
 - (e) Consider and implement, to the maximum extent permitted by state and federal law, other modifications to requirements as determined by each participating school.
 - (4) The office of native education within the office of the superintendent of public instruction must collaborate with each tribal compact school participating in the pilot project, including providing technical support and assistance, and review any terms of the compact that relate to the school's implementation of the pilot project.
 - (5) The office of the superintendent of public instruction, in establishing the pilot project required by this section, shall explore and pursue options for granting flexibility to participating schools from state and federal requirements, including requirements related to assessments, to further the purpose of the pilot project as expressed in subsection (2) of this section.
 - (6) If requested by a tribal compact school participating or intending to participate in the pilot project, the superintendent of public instruction shall convene a government-to-government meeting with the tribal compact school for the purpose of revising the compact to reflect the terms of the pilot project. The superintendent of public instruction may also convene a government-to-government meeting on his or her own accord.
 - (7) Nothing contained in this section is intended or may be construed to limit the amount of funding allocated to tribal compact schools participating in the pilot project.
 - (8)(a) Each tribal compact school participating in the pilot project shall submit a report every two years to the appropriate committees of the house of representatives and senate and the office of the superintendent of public instruction, with the first report submitted no later than August 1, 2021.
- 38 (b) Reports submitted in accordance with this subsection (8) must 39 include:

- (i) Information about student performance on assessments required for state and federal accountability purposes and locally developed assessments under subsection (3)(d) of this section, including differences in student performance between the statewide and locally developed assessments; and
- 6 (ii) Recommendations for lessening or removing barriers that may 7 affect either student performance on assessments, the effective 8 administration of assessments, or both.
- 9 (c) The final report of each participating school must include a 10 recommendation of whether the pilot project should be modified, 11 continued, expanded, or discontinued.
- 12 (d) Reports submitted to the house of representatives and the 13 senate in accordance with this subsection (8) must comply with RCW 14 43.01.036.
- 15 (9) The pilot project expires August 1, 2023.
- 16 (10) This section expires September 1, 2023.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 28A.300 RCW to read as follows:
- 19 (1) The superintendent of public instruction shall, upon receipt 20 of an application from a school that is the subject of a state-tribal 21 education compact and that is participating in the pilot project 22 established in section 1 of this act:
- 23 (a) Grant a waiver from the requirements for a one hundred 24 eighty-day school year under RCW 28A.150.220; and
- (b) Authorize the school to consider student participation in cultural, fisheries, or agricultural programs as instructional days for the purposes of RCW 28A.150.220(5).
- 28 (2) This section expires September 1, 2023.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 28A.715 RCW to read as follows:
- 31 (1) Students in a school that is the subject of a state-tribal 32 education compact and that is participating in the pilot project 33 established in section 1 of this act are exempt from the obligation 34 to earn:
- 35 (a) A certificate of academic achievement as a prerequisite for 36 graduating from a public high school under RCW 28A.230.090 and 37 28A.655.061; or

- 1 (b) A certificate of individual achievement as a prerequisite for 2 graduating from a public high school under RCW 28A.155.045 and 28A.230.090.
 - (2) If a student attends a school that is participating in the pilot project established in section 1 of this act, the statewide high school assessments in English language arts and mathematics that are administered under RCW 28A.655.070 may not be used:
 - (a) To determine whether the student has met the requirements for graduating from a public high school; or
 - (b) For assessing the student's career and college readiness.
 - (3) Schools participating in the pilot project established in section 1 of this act are exempt from the provisions in RCW 28A.230.125 that require standardized high school transcripts to include a notation of whether the student has earned a certificate of individual achievement or certificate of academic achievement.
 - (4) This section expires September 1, 2023.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. If any part of this act is found to be in conflict with federal requirements that are a prescribed condition to the allocation of federal funds to the state, the conflicting part of this act is inoperative solely to the extent of the conflict and with respect to the agencies directly affected, and this finding does not affect the operation of the remainder of this act in its application to the agencies concerned. Rules adopted under this act must meet federal requirements that are a necessary condition to the receipt of federal funds by the state."

Correct the title.

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<u>EFFECT:</u> (1) Specifies that the tribal compact schools pilot project is to be established by the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) and that tribal compact schools applying to participate in the pilot project must be included in the pilot project.

- (2) Directs the OSPI to explore and pursue options for granting flexibility to schools participating in the pilot project (participating schools) from state and federal requirements to further the purpose of the pilot project.
- (3) Specifies that one purpose of the pilot project is to replace, to the maximum extent permitted by state and federal law, statewide student assessments with locally developed assessments that are culturally relevant, based on community standards, and aligned with the Washington State Learning Standards.
- (4) Decouples high school graduation requirements from assessments for students at participating schools by exempting these

students from the obligation to earn a certificate of academic achievement as a prerequisite to graduating from a public high school.

- (5) Exempts qualifying students at participating schools from the requirement to earn a certificate of individual achievement as a prerequisite to graduating from public high school.
- (6) Prohibits statewide high school assessments for students at participating schools from being used to determine whether the student has met the requirements for graduating from a public high school or for assessing the student's career and college readiness.
- (7) Exempts participating schools from a provision requiring standardized high school transcripts to include a notation of whether a student has earned a certificate of individual achievement or a certificate of academic achievement.
- (8) Directs the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI), if requested by a participating school or a school intending to participate in the pilot project, to convene a government-to-government meeting to revise the applicable tribal compact to reflect the terms of the pilot project. Also allows the SPI to convene this meeting without an external request.
- (9) Authorizes participating schools to request a waiver, rather than obtain a waiver, to the requirement for a 180-day school year, but obligates the SPI to approve the waiver.
- (10) Specifies that the waiver for the 180-day school year requirement may be for allowing additional instructional days, including instruction throughout the calendar year.
- (11) Directs the Office of Native Education, in collaborating with each participating school, to provide technical support and assistance.
- (12) Specifies that curricula developed by schools participating in the pilot project must be aligned to the Washington State Learning Standards rather than Washington's content standards.
- (13) Authorizes participating schools to request authorization to consider student activities in certain events as instructional days, rather than counting participation as instructional days.
- (14) Specifies that reports required of participating schools must include information about student performance on assessments required for state and federal accountability purposes as well as on locally developed assessments, including differences in student performance between the assessments.
- (15) Specifies that the final report of each participating school must include a recommendation of whether the pilot project should be modified, continued, expanded, or discontinued.
- (16) Authorizes the SPI to authorize the requesting participating school to consider student participation in certain activities as instructional days.
- (17) Adds a federal severability clause making any requirements found in conflict with federal requirements that are a prescribed condition to the allocation of federal funds to the state inoperative to the extent of the conflict.
- (18) Makes numerous other changes, including: (a) Specifying that schools that are the subject of a state-tribal education compact are also known as "tribal compact schools"; (b) replacing a pilot project purpose reference to "calendar requirements" with "school year length"; (c) directing reports of the schools to be submitted to the appropriate committees of the House of Representatives and the Senate rather than of the Legislature; (d) specifying that schools participating in the pilot project may consider and implement, to the maximum extent permitted by state and federal law, other modifications to requirements as determined by the schools, rather

than specifying that schools may develop various options in implementing the pilot project including, but not limited to, delineated provisions; and (e) specifying that the first report of a participating school must be submitted no later than August 1, 2021.

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
