**SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 1840**

1            AN ACT Relating to establishing the Washington promise program,  
2 which provides for affordable access to community and technical  
3 colleges; amending RCW 43.88C.010; adding a new chapter to Title 28B  
4 RCW; providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6            NEW SECTION.            **Sec. 1.**            The Washington promise program is  
7 established to help make the first two years of college affordable  
8 and accessible to all citizens of the state of Washington by offering  
9 a tuition waiver for eligible students enrolled in associate degree  
10 or certificate programs offered by Washington's community and  
11 technical colleges. The purpose of the program is to encourage more  
12 Washington residents who have not yet earned an associate's degree to  
13 enroll in and successfully complete an associate's degree or  
14 certificate that will lead to opportunities for further education and  
15 jobs. By making a higher education credential more affordable and  
16 accessible, Washington will make more progress towards the  
17 legislature's attainment goal of seventy percent of Washington adults  
18 having a postsecondary credential by 2023.

19            The legislature recognizes that increasing the number of  
20 residents with associate degrees will lead to increased attainment

1 for higher level degrees as students may transfer to comprehensive or  
2 research universities.

3 It is the intent of the legislature to implement the Washington  
4 promise program in phases, starting with a free thirteenth year. The  
5 legislature recognizes that free thirteenth year and promise programs  
6 are proven to significantly increase high school graduation rates by  
7 ensuring all high school graduates know they can attend a community  
8 or technical college regardless of their family incomes. Thus,  
9 investment in these programs is an evidence-based means to improve  
10 high school graduation rates and to reduce, or even eliminate,  
11 opportunity gaps in postsecondary education for students from  
12 underrepresented minority groups, for low-income students, for foster  
13 youth, and for students with disabilities.

14 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** The definitions in this section apply  
15 throughout this chapter unless the context clearly requires  
16 otherwise.

17 (1) "Board" means the state board for community and technical  
18 colleges.

19 (2) "Community or technical college" means the community or  
20 technical colleges governed under chapter 28B.50 RCW.

21 (3) "Eligible degree or certificate program" means:

22 (a) An associate degree program;

23 (b) Academic programs with credits that can fully transfer via an  
24 articulation agreement toward a baccalaureate degree or  
25 postbaccalaureate degree at an institution of higher education; or

26 (c) Professional and technical programs that lead to a recognized  
27 postsecondary credential.

28 (4) "Gift aid" means financial aid received from the federal Pell  
29 grant, the state need grant program under chapter 28B.92 RCW, the  
30 college bound scholarship program under chapter 28B.118 RCW, the  
31 opportunity grant program under chapter 28B.50 RCW, the opportunity  
32 scholarship program under chapter 28B.145 RCW, or any other state  
33 grant or scholarship program that provides funds for educational  
34 purposes with no obligation of repayment. "Gift aid" does not include  
35 student loans and work-study programs.

36 (5) "Office" means the office of student financial assistance.

37 (6) "Program" means the Washington promise program.

38 (7) "Resident student" means a student who is a resident student  
39 as defined in RCW 28B.15.012.

1        NEW SECTION.    **Sec. 3.**    (1) Subject to availability of amounts  
2 appropriated for this specific purpose, the office shall administer  
3 the Washington promise program for resident students seeking an  
4 associate's degree or certificate from a community or technical  
5 college under the terms and conditions in this section.

6        (2) To be eligible for the program, a resident student who has  
7 not previously earned an associate's degree must be enrolled in a  
8 community or technical college in an eligible degree or certificate  
9 program.

10       (3) Students must complete the free application for federal  
11 student aid (FAFSA) or the Washington application for state financial  
12 aid each academic year in which they seek eligibility for the  
13 program.

14       (4) To remain eligible for the program, once a student has earned  
15 forty-five credits, the student must maintain a cumulative grade  
16 point average of 2.0.

17       (5) For the 2018-19 and 2019-20 academic years, eligible students  
18 shall receive an award for a free thirteenth year, or three academic  
19 quarters, if they meet the following requirements:

20       (a) Have graduated high school within the past six calendar  
21 months before enrolling in a community or technical college; and

22       (b) Have a family income that does not exceed seventy percent of  
23 the state median family income, adjusted for family size.

24       (6) For the 2020-21 academic year, eligible students shall  
25 receive an award for six academic quarters if they meet the following  
26 requirements:

27       (a) Have obtained a high school diploma or its equivalent within  
28 the past six calendar months before enrolling in a community or  
29 technical college; and

30       (b) Have a family income that does not exceed seventy percent of  
31 the state median family income, adjusted for family size.

32       (7) For the 2021-22 and 2022-23 academic years, eligible students  
33 shall receive an award for six academic quarters if they meet the  
34 following requirements:

35       (a) Have obtained a high school diploma or its equivalent within  
36 the past sixteen calendar months before enrolling in a community or  
37 technical college; and

38       (b) Have a family income that does not exceed the state median  
39 family income, adjusted for family size.

1 (8) Beginning with the 2023-24 academic year, eligible students  
2 shall receive an award for six academic quarters if they meet the  
3 following requirements:

4 (a) Have obtained a high school diploma or its equivalent; and

5 (b) Have a family income that does not exceed the state median  
6 family income, adjusted for family size.

7 (9)(a) The office shall award grants to eligible students for an  
8 amount up to the cost of tuition and fees as defined in RCW  
9 28B.15.020, and services and activities fees as defined in RCW  
10 28B.15.041, less all other gift aid. The student shall also receive a  
11 cost of attendance stipend if the student meets the criteria in (b)  
12 of this subsection. The calculation in this subsection (9)(a) shall  
13 not result in a reduction of gift aid.

14 (b) Five hundred dollars for books and other related higher  
15 education expenses must be provided as an annual stipend to students  
16 with a family income that does not exceed seventy percent of the  
17 state median family income. If a student eligible for the stipend  
18 under this subsection (9)(b) is enrolled less than full time, the  
19 student must receive a prorated portion of the stipend based on the  
20 number of credits in which the student is enrolled.

21 (10) By December 1, 2019, and annually by December 1st  
22 thereafter, the board shall report to the appropriate policy and  
23 fiscal committees of the legislature on the following impacts of the  
24 program:

25 (a) Student enrollment in the eligible degree or certificate  
26 programs;

27 (b) Student completion rates of credits, certificates, and  
28 degrees;

29 (c) The cost of implementation, including the cost per student;

30 (d) Additional resources used to meet student needs, such as  
31 counseling, precollege courses, child care, or transportation; and

32 (e) The number of students receiving wraparound services, the  
33 number of schools providing wraparound services, and the resources  
34 needed to provide wraparound services.

35 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 4.** The board shall develop a plan to provide  
36 all program students who are enrolled at a community or technical  
37 college with a quarter-long student success course, during or before  
38 their first enrollment period, that teaches essential skills for  
39 college success. Essential skills may include tips for study habits

1 and time management, financial aid information and resources,  
2 connecting students with advisors, encouraging student mentoring,  
3 helping establish student cohorts, and providing information about  
4 services available on campus. The plan must address how the board  
5 will ensure that students receiving a Washington promise program  
6 grant are enrolled in such a course during or before their first  
7 quarter of eligibility. The board shall provide the plan to the  
8 relevant committees of the legislature by December 1, 2018, and begin  
9 implementation of the plan for the 2019-20 academic year.

10 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 5.** The student achievement council, in  
11 collaboration with the state board for community and technical  
12 colleges, shall conduct a study on the effectiveness of the  
13 Washington promise program, including but not limited to: Any  
14 increase in enrollments in community or technical colleges; any  
15 decreases in enrollments elsewhere in institutions of higher  
16 education; changes in student persistence, completion, and time-to-  
17 degree rates in eligible degree or certificate programs. The study  
18 shall include an analysis on the demand for student services, such as  
19 advising and student success courses, recommendations to improve  
20 student services and outcomes, and the financial impact of the  
21 program on Washington promise students. The student achievement  
22 council shall report its findings to the relevant committees of the  
23 legislature by December 1, 2023.

24 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 6.** The caseload forecast council shall  
25 estimate the anticipated caseload of the program and submit this  
26 forecast as required in RCW 43.88C.020.

27 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7.** The board may adopt rules to implement  
28 this chapter.

29 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8.** If the legislature does not appropriate  
30 enough funding to support the statewide implementation of section  
31 3(5) of this act in full, the board shall provide matching grants to  
32 community or technical college districts based on the appropriation  
33 received to implement the free thirteenth year of the program. The  
34 community or technical college districts shall partner with local  
35 governments and private entities to secure matching funding for the  
36 free thirteenth year. The board shall adopt criteria for the grants,

1 prioritizing aid for at-risk students and programs with funding  
2 partners.

3 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 9.** This chapter may be known and cited as the  
4 Washington promise program.

5 **Sec. 10.** RCW 43.88C.010 and 2015 c 128 s 2 are each amended to  
6 read as follows:

7 (1) The caseload forecast council is hereby created. The council  
8 shall consist of two individuals appointed by the governor and four  
9 individuals, one of whom is appointed by the chairperson of each of  
10 the two largest political caucuses in the senate and house of  
11 representatives. The chair of the council shall be selected from  
12 among the four caucus appointees. The council may select such other  
13 officers as the members deem necessary.

14 (2) The council shall employ a caseload forecast supervisor to  
15 supervise the preparation of all caseload forecasts. As used in this  
16 chapter, "supervisor" means the caseload forecast supervisor.

17 (3) Approval by an affirmative vote of at least five members of  
18 the council is required for any decisions regarding employment of the  
19 supervisor. Employment of the supervisor shall terminate after each  
20 term of three years. At the end of the first year of each three-year  
21 term the council shall consider extension of the supervisor's term by  
22 one year. The council may fix the compensation of the supervisor. The  
23 supervisor shall employ staff sufficient to accomplish the purposes  
24 of this section.

25 (4) The caseload forecast council shall oversee the preparation  
26 of and approve, by an affirmative vote of at least four members, the  
27 official state caseload forecasts prepared under RCW 43.88C.020. If  
28 the council is unable to approve a forecast before a date required in  
29 RCW 43.88C.020, the supervisor shall submit the forecast without  
30 approval and the forecast shall have the same effect as if approved  
31 by the council.

32 (5) A councilmember who does not cast an affirmative vote for  
33 approval of the official caseload forecast may request, and the  
34 supervisor shall provide, an alternative forecast based on  
35 assumptions specified by the member.

36 (6) Members of the caseload forecast council shall serve without  
37 additional compensation but shall be reimbursed for travel expenses  
38 in accordance with RCW 44.04.120 while attending sessions of the

1 council or on official business authorized by the council.  
2 Nonlegislative members of the council shall be reimbursed for travel  
3 expenses in accordance with RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.

4 (7) "Caseload," as used in this chapter, means:

5 (a) The number of persons expected to meet entitlement  
6 requirements and require the services of public assistance programs,  
7 state correctional institutions, state correctional noninstitutional  
8 supervision, state institutions for juvenile offenders, the common  
9 school system, long-term care, medical assistance, foster care, and  
10 adoption support;

11 (b) The number of students who are eligible for the Washington  
12 college bound scholarship program and are expected to attend an  
13 institution of higher education as defined in RCW 28B.92.030;

14 (c) The number of students who are eligible for the Washington  
15 promise program and are expected to attend a community or technical  
16 college as defined in section 2 of this act; and

17 (d) The number of children who are eligible, as defined in RCW  
18 43.215.405, to participate in, and the number of children actually  
19 served by, the early childhood education and assistance program.

20 (8) The caseload forecast council shall forecast the temporary  
21 assistance for needy families and the working connections child care  
22 programs as a courtesy.

23 (9) The caseload forecast council shall forecast youth  
24 participating in the extended foster care program pursuant to RCW  
25 74.13.031 separately from other children who are residing in foster  
26 care and who are under eighteen years of age.

27 (10) Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the  
28 definitions provided in RCW 43.88.020 apply to this chapter.

29 NEW SECTION. Sec. 11. Sections 1 through 9 and 12 of this act  
30 constitute a new chapter in Title 28B RCW.

31 NEW SECTION. Sec. 12. This act is necessary for the immediate  
32 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of  
33 the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes  
34 effect July 1, 2017.
