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## SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 6233

State of Washington 65th Legislature 2018 Regular Session

- AN ACT Relating to regulating the use of step therapy protocols;
- 2 creating new sections; and providing an expiration date.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds the following:
  - (1) Health insurance plans are increasingly making use of step therapy protocols under which patients are required to try one or more prescription drugs before coverage is provided for a drug selected by the patient's health care provider;
  - (2) Such step therapy protocols, where they are based on well-developed scientific standards and administered in a flexible manner that takes into account the individual needs of patients, can play an important role in controlling health care costs; and
- (3) In some cases, requiring a patient to follow a step therapy protocol may have adverse and even dangerous consequences for the patient who may either not realize a benefit from taking a prescription drug or may suffer harm from taking an inappropriate drug.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. (1) The Washington state institute for public policy must conduct a literature review of step therapy protocol usage including information concerning negative outcomes or

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adverse events resulting from step therapy protocol usage. The 1 institute must provide recommendations to the appropriate committees 2 of the senate and house of representatives as to whether creating 3 exceptions based on medical necessity on the use of step therapy 4 would improve health outcomes and reduce adverse events. 5 6 institute may analyze any criteria deemed necessary to determine the 7 effectiveness of creating exceptions for step therapy including seeking input from interested parties. The institute will include in 8 its report a summary of similar exceptions that have been codified in 9 other states and the impact they have had on health outcomes. The 10 11 report with policy recommendations must be submitted by December 1, 12 2018.
