- "NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. (1) The legislature finds that domestic 3 violence causes physical and psychological harm, broken families, 4 economic loss, and other societal ills. According to the center for 5 disease control's national intimate partner and sexual violence 6 7 survey, about one in three women and one in three men reported experiencing intimate partner violence in their 8 lifetime. 9 Washington in 2017, over fifty-four thousand domestic violence offenses were reported to law enforcement and forty-nine domestic 10 11 violence homicides were committed.
- (2) The legislature finds that the workplace may be the only 13 location in which an individual experiencing domestic violence may be 14 free from a perpetrator and feel safe. Individuals experiencing domestic violence may also find the workplace a place of shared 15 confidences. Therefore, the legislature intends to create a task 16 17 force to explore ways in which the employer and employee community may help curb domestic violence.
- 19 (3) This section expires June 30, 2020.
- 20 NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. (1) The department of commerce shall 21 convene a task force on domestic violence and workplace resources to 22 identify the role of the workplace in helping to curb domestic violence. 23
- 2.4 (2) The members of the task force are as provided in this subsection. 25
- 26 (a) The president of the senate shall appoint one member from 27 each of the two largest caucuses in the senate.
- (b) The speaker of the house of representatives shall appoint one 28 29 member from each of the two largest caucuses of the house of 30 representatives.
- 31 (c) The department of commerce shall appoint:

- 1 (i) One member representing each of the following:
- 2 (A) The association of Washington business;
- 3 (B) The national federation of independent business;
- 4 (C) The Washington hospitality association;
- 5 (D) The Washington retail association;
 - (E) The Washington state labor council;
- 7 (F) The Washington coalition of sexual assault programs;
- 8 (G) The Washington coalition against domestic violence; and
- 9 (H) A federally recognized tribe;
- 10 (ii) A business owner;

- 11 (iii) A survivor of domestic violence; and
- 12 (iv) Up to two additional members.
- 13 (3) The task force shall choose two cochairs from among its 14 legislative membership.
 - (4) The task force shall review the following issues:
- 16 (a) The role of the workplace in the lives of individuals 17 experiencing domestic violence;
- 18 (b) The appropriate role of employers and employees in helping 19 reduce the incidence of domestic violence; and
- 20 (c) Whether legislation is needed to address the issues outlined 21 in this subsection.
- 22 (5) The department of commerce shall convene the meetings and 23 provide staff support for the task force.
- 24 (6) The task force shall submit its findings and recommendations 25 to the appropriate committees of the legislature by December 1, 2019.
 - (7) This section expires June 30, 2020."

<u>EFFECT:</u> Changes the bill from a Joint Legislative Task Force staffed by the Office of Program Research and Senate Committee Services to a Task Force convened and staffed by the Department of Commerce. Retains the Task Force membership of the underlying bill.
