## **E3SHB 1775** - S AMD By Senator Dhingra

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## ADOPTED AND ENGROSSED 3/6/20

Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the 1 2 following:

"NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that commercial 3 sexual exploitation of children is a severe form of human trafficking 4 and a severe human rights and public health issue, leaving children 5 at substantial risk of physical harm, substantial physical and 6 7 emotional pain, and trauma. This trauma has a long-term impact on the social, emotional, and economic future of these children. The state 8 9 shall provide a victim-centered, trauma-informed response to children who are exploited in this manner rather than treating them as 10 11 criminals. The state shall also hold accountable the buyers and 12 traffickers who exploit children.

- 13 NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 7.68 RCW 14 to read as follows:
  - (1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the department of children, youth, and families shall administer funding for two receiving center programs for commercially sexually exploited children. One of these programs must be located west of the crest of the Cascade mountains and one of these programs must be located east of the crest of the Cascade mountains. Law enforcement and service providers may refer children to these programs or children may self-refer into these programs.
- 23 (2) The receiving center programs established under this section 24 shall:
  - (a) Begin providing services by January 1, 2021;
- (b) Utilize existing facilities and not require the construction 26 27 of new facilities; and
- (c) Provide ongoing case management for all children who are 28 29 being served or were served by the programs.
- 30 (3) The receiving centers established under this section shall:

(a) Include a short-term evaluation function that is accessible twenty-four hours per day seven days per week that has the capacity to evaluate the immediate needs of commercially sexually exploited children ages twelve through seventeen and either meet immediate needs or refer those children to the appropriate services;

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- (b) Assess children for mental health and substance use disorder needs and provide appropriate referrals as needed; and
- (c) Provide individual and group counseling focused on developing and strengthening coping skills, and improving self-esteem and dignity.
  - (4) The department of children, youth, and families shall:
- (a) Collect nonidentifiable demographic data of the children served by the programs established under this section;
- (b) Collect data regarding the locations that children exit to after being served by the programs; and
- (c) Report the data described in this subsection along with recommendations for modification or expansion of these programs to the relevant committees of the legislature by December 1, 2022.
- (5) For the purposes of this section, the following definitions apply:
- (a) "Receiving center" means a trauma-informed, secure location that meets the multidisciplinary needs of commercially sexually exploited children ages twelve through seventeen located in a behavioral health agency licensed or certified under RCW 71.24.037 to provide inpatient or residential treatment services; and
- (b) "Short-term evaluation function" means a short-term emergency shelter that is accessible twenty-four hours per day seven days per week that has the capacity to evaluate the immediate needs of commercially sexually exploited children under age eighteen and either meet those immediate needs or refer those children to the appropriate services.
- (6)(a) The department of children, youth, and families, the department of health, and the division of behavioral health and recovery, shall meet to coordinate the implementation of receiving centers as provided for in this section, including developing eligibility criteria for serving commercially sexually exploited children that allows referral from service providers and prioritizes referral from law enforcement.
- (b) By December 1, 2020, and in compliance with RCW 43.01.036, 39 40 the department of children, youth, and families shall submit a report

- to the governor and legislature summarizing the implementation plan 1
- 2 and eligibility criteria as described in (a) of this subsection, and
- provide any additional policy recommendations regarding receiving 3
- 4 centers as it deems necessary.

- 33 read as follows:
- 34 (1) Complaints referred to the juvenile court alleging the
- of an offense shall be referred directly to the 35
- prosecutor. The prosecutor, upon receipt of a complaint, shall screen 36
- the complaint to determine whether: 37

1 (a) The alleged facts bring the case within the jurisdiction of 2 the court; and

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- (b) On a basis of available evidence there is probable cause to believe that the juvenile did commit the offense.
- (2) If the identical alleged acts constitute an offense under both the law of this state and an ordinance of any city or county of this state, state law shall govern the prosecutor's screening and charging decision for both filed and diverted cases.
- (3) If the requirements of subsection (1)(a) and (b) of this section are met, the prosecutor shall either file an information in juvenile court or divert the case, as set forth in subsections (5), (6), and (8) of this section. If the prosecutor finds that the requirements of subsection (1)(a) and (b) of this section are not met, the prosecutor shall maintain a record, for one year, of such decision and the reasons therefor. In lieu of filing an information or diverting an offense a prosecutor may file a motion to modify community supervision where such offense constitutes a violation of community supervision.
- (4) An information shall be a plain, concise, and definite written statement of the essential facts constituting the offense charged. It shall be signed by the prosecuting attorney and conform to chapter 10.37 RCW.
  - (5) The prosecutor shall file an information with the juvenile court if (a) an alleged offender is accused of an offense that is defined as a sex offense or violent offense under RCW 9.94A.030, other than assault in the second degree or robbery in the second degree; or (b) an alleged offender has been referred by a diversion unit for prosecution or desires prosecution instead of diversion.
  - (6) Where a case is legally sufficient the prosecutor shall divert the case if the alleged offense is a misdemeanor or gross misdemeanor or violation and the alleged offense is the offender's first offense or violation. If the alleged offender is charged with a related offense that may be filed under subsections (5) and (8) of this section, a case under this subsection may also be filed.
- (7) Where a case is legally sufficient to charge an alleged 35 36 offender with:

(b) Voyeurism in the second degree, the offender is under seventeen years of age, and the alleged offense is the offender's first voyeurism in the second degree offense, the prosecutor shall divert the case, unless the offender has received two diversions for any offense in the previous two years;

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- (c) Minor selling depictions of himself or herself engaged in sexually explicit conduct under RCW 9.68A.053(5) and the alleged offense is the offender's first violation of RCW 9.68A.053(5), the prosecutor shall divert the case; or
- (d) A distribution, transfer, dissemination, or exchange of sexually explicit images of other minors thirteen years of age or older offense as provided in RCW 9.68A.053(1) and the alleged offense is the offender's first violation of RCW 9.68A.053(1), the prosecutor shall divert the case.
- (8) Where a case is legally sufficient and falls into neither subsection (5) nor (6) of this section, it may be filed or diverted. In deciding whether to file or divert an offense under this section the prosecutor may be guided by the length, seriousness, and recency of the alleged offender's criminal history and the circumstances surrounding the commission of the alleged offense.
- (9) Whenever a juvenile is placed in custody or, where not placed in custody, referred to a diversion interview, the parent or legal guardian of the juvenile shall be notified as soon as possible concerning the allegation made against the juvenile and the current status of the juvenile. Where a case involves victims of crimes against persons or victims whose property has not been recovered at the time a juvenile is referred to a diversion unit, the victim shall be notified of the referral and informed how to contact the unit.
- (10) The responsibilities of the prosecutor under subsections (1) through (9) of this section may be performed by a juvenile court probation counselor for any complaint referred to the court alleging the commission of an offense which would not be a felony if committed by an adult, if the prosecutor has given sufficient written notice to the juvenile court that the prosecutor will not review such complaints.
- 36 (11) The prosecutor, juvenile court probation counselor, or diversion unit may, in exercising their authority under this section 37 or RCW 13.40.080, refer juveniles to community-based programs, 38 restorative justice programs, mediation, or victim offender 39

- 1 reconciliation programs. Such mediation or victim offender 2 reconciliation programs shall be voluntary for victims.
  - (12) Prosecutors and juvenile courts are encouraged to engage with and partner with community-based programs to expand, improve, and increase options to divert youth from formal processing in juvenile court. Nothing in this chapter should be read to limit partnership with community-based programs to create opportunities for juveniles.

  - (1) A law enforcement officer shall take a child into custody:
- 34 (a) If a law enforcement agency has been contacted by the parent 35 of the child that the child is absent from parental custody without 36 consent; or
- (b) If a law enforcement officer reasonably believes, considering 37 the child's age, the location, and the time of day, that a child is 38

in circumstances which constitute a danger to the child's safety or that a child is violating a local curfew ordinance; or

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- (c) If an agency legally charged with the supervision of a child has notified a law enforcement agency that the child has run away from placement.
- (2) Law enforcement custody shall not extend beyond the amount of time reasonably necessary to transport the child to a destination authorized by law and to place the child at that destination. Transfer of custody is not complete unless the person, agency, or entity to whom the child is released agrees to accept custody.
- (3) If a law enforcement officer takes a child into custody pursuant to either subsection (1)(a) or (b) of this section and transports the child to a crisis residential center, the officer shall, within twenty-four hours of delivering the child to the center, provide to the center a written report detailing the reasons the officer took the child into custody. The center shall provide the department of children, youth, and families with a copy of the officer's report if the youth is in the care of or receiving services from the department of children, youth, and families.
- (4) If the law enforcement officer who initially takes the juvenile into custody or the staff of the crisis residential center have reasonable cause to believe that the child is absent from home because he or she is abused or neglected, a report shall be made immediately to the department of children, youth, and families.
- Nothing in this section affects the authority of any political subdivision to make regulations concerning the conduct of minors in public places by ordinance or other local law.

- Sec. 10. RCW 74.15.020 and 2019 c 172 s 10 are each amended to 11 read as follows: 12
- The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter and 13 RCW 74.13.031 unless the context clearly requires otherwise. 14

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- (1) "Agency" means any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, or facility which receives children, expectant mothers, or persons with developmental disabilities for control, care, or maintenance outside their own homes, or which places, arranges the placement of, or assists in the placement of children, expectant mothers, or persons with developmental disabilities for foster care or placement of children for adoption, and shall include the following irrespective of whether there is compensation to the agency or to the children, expectant mothers, or persons with developmental disabilities for services rendered:
- (a) "Child-placing agency" means an agency which places a child or children for temporary care, continued care, or for adoption;
- (b) "Community facility" means a group care facility operated for juveniles committed to the department under RCW the care of 13.40.185. A county detention facility that houses committed to the department under RCW 13.40.185 pursuant to a contract with the department is not a community facility;
- (c) "Crisis residential center" means an agency which is a temporary protective residential facility operated to perform the duties specified in chapter 13.32A RCW, in the manner provided in RCW 43.185C.295 through 43.185C.310;
- (d) "Emergency respite center" is an agency that may be commonly known as a crisis nursery, that provides emergency and crisis care for up to seventy-two hours to children who have been admitted by their parents or quardians to prevent abuse or neglect. Emergency

respite centers may operate for up to twenty-four hours a day, and 1 for up to seven days a week. Emergency respite centers may provide 2 care for children ages birth through seventeen, and for persons 3 eighteen through twenty with developmental disabilities who are 4 admitted with a sibling or siblings through age seventeen. Emergency 5 6 respite centers may not substitute for crisis residential centers or 7 HOPE centers, or any other services defined under this section, and may not substitute for services which are required under chapter 8 9 13.32A or 13.34 RCW;

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- (e) "Foster-family home" means an agency which regularly provides care on a twenty-four hour basis to one or more children, expectant mothers, or persons with developmental disabilities in the family abode of the person or persons under whose direct care and supervision the child, expectant mother, or person with developmental disability is placed;
- 16 (f) "Group-care facility" means an agency, other than a foster-17 family home, which is maintained and operated for the care of a group 18 of children on a twenty-four hour basis. "Group care facility" includes but is not limited to: 19
- (i) Qualified residential treatment programs as defined in RCW 20 21 13.34.030;
- 22 (ii) Facilities specializing in providing prenatal, postpartum, or parenting supports for youth; and 23

All other street youth must have court approval under chapter 13.34 or 13.32A RCW to remain in a HOPE center 37 up to thirty days; 38
- 39 "Maternity service" means agency which provides or an 40 arranges for care or services to expectant mothers, before or during

1 confinement, or which provides care as needed to mothers and their infants after confinement; 2

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- (i) "Resource and assessment center" means an agency that provides short-term emergency and crisis care for a period up to seventy-two hours, excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays to children who have been removed from their parent's or quardian's care by child protective services or law enforcement;
- (j) "Responsible living skills program" means an agency licensed by the secretary that provides residential and transitional living services to persons ages sixteen to eighteen who are dependent under chapter 13.34 RCW and who have been unable to live in his or her legally authorized residence and, as a result, the minor lived outdoors or in another unsafe location not intended for occupancy by the minor. Dependent minors ages fourteen and fifteen may be eligible if no other placement alternative is available and the department approves the placement;
- 17 (k) "Service provider" means the entity that operates a community 18 facility.
  - (2) "Agency" shall not include the following:
- (a) Persons related to the child, expectant mother, or person 20 21 with developmental disability in the following ways:
  - Any blood relative, including those of half-blood, and including first cousins, second cousins, nephews or nieces, and persons of preceding generations as denoted by prefixes of grand, great, or great-great;
    - (ii) Stepfather, stepmother, stepbrother, and stepsister;
  - (iii) A person who legally adopts a child or the child's parent as well as the natural and other legally adopted children of such persons, and other relatives of the adoptive parents in accordance with state law;
- 31 (iv) Spouses of any persons named in (a)(i), (ii), or (iii) of this subsection (2), even after the marriage is terminated; 32
  - (v) Relatives, as named in (a)(i), (ii), (iii), or (iv) of this subsection (2), of any half sibling of the child; or
- (vi) Extended family members, as defined by the law or custom of 35 36 the Indian child's tribe or, in the absence of such law or custom, a person who has reached the age of eighteen and who is the Indian 37 child's grandparent, aunt or uncle, brother or sister, brother-in-law 38 or sister-in-law, niece or nephew, first or second cousin, or 39

stepparent who provides care in the family abode on a twenty-fourhour basis to an Indian child as defined in 25 U.S.C. Sec. 1903(4);

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- (b) Persons who are legal guardians of the child, expectant mother, or persons with developmental disabilities;
- (c) Persons who care for a neighbor's or friend's child or 5 6 children, with or without compensation, where the parent and person providing care on a twenty-four-hour basis have agreed to the 7 placement in writing and the state is not providing any payment for 8 9 the care;
  - (d) A person, partnership, corporation, or other entity that provides placement or similar services to exchange students or international student exchange visitors or persons who have the care of an exchange student in their home;
    - (e) A person, partnership, corporation, or other entity that provides placement or similar services to international children who have entered the country by obtaining visas that meet the criteria for medical care as established by the United States citizenship and immigration services, or persons who have the care of such an international child in their home;
    - (f) Schools, including boarding schools, which are engaged primarily in education, operate on a definite school year schedule, follow a stated academic curriculum, accept only school-age children and do not accept custody of children;
    - (g) Hospitals licensed pursuant to chapter 70.41 RCW performing functions defined in chapter 70.41 RCW, nursing homes licensed under chapter 18.51 RCW and assisted living facilities licensed under chapter 18.20 RCW;
      - (h) Licensed physicians or lawyers;
      - (i) Facilities approved and certified under chapter 71A.22 RCW;
  - (j) Any agency having been in operation in this state ten years prior to June 8, 1967, and not seeking or accepting moneys or assistance from any state or federal agency, and is supported in part by an endowment or trust fund;
    - (k) Persons who have a child in their home for purposes of adoption, if the child was placed in such home by a licensed childplacing agency, an authorized public or tribal agency or court or if a replacement report has been filed under chapter 26.33 RCW and the placement has been approved by the court;

1 (1) An agency operated by any unit of local, state, or federal government or an agency licensed by an Indian tribe pursuant to RCW 2 3 74.15.190;

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- (m) A maximum or medium security program for juvenile offenders operated by or under contract with the department;
- (n) An agency located on a federal military reservation, except where the military authorities request that such agency be subject to the licensing requirements of this chapter;
- (o) A host home program, and host home, operated by a tax exempt 9 organization for youth not in the care of or receiving services from 10 the department, if that program: (i) Recruits and screens potential 11 12 homes in the program, including performing background checks on individuals over the age of eighteen residing in the home through the 13 Washington state patrol or equivalent law enforcement agency and 14 performing physical inspections of the home; (ii) screens and 15 16 provides case management services to youth in the program; (iii) 17 obtains a notarized permission slip or limited power of attorney from the parent or legal guardian of the youth authorizing the youth to 18 participate in the program and the authorization is updated every six 19 months when a youth remains in a host home longer than six months; 20 (iv) obtains insurance for the program through an insurance provider 21 authorized under Title 48 RCW; (v) provides mandatory reporter and 22 confidentiality training; and (vi) registers with the secretary of 23 state as provided in RCW 24.03.550. A host home is a private home 24 25 that volunteers to host youth in need of temporary placement that is associated with a host home program. Any host home program that 26 receives local, state, or government funding shall report the 27 following information to the office of homeless youth prevention and 28 protection programs annually by December 1st of each year: The number 29 of children the program served, why the child was placed with a host 30 31 home, and where the child went after leaving the host home, including 32 but not limited to returning to the parents, running away, reaching the age of majority, or becoming a dependent of the state. A host 33 home program shall not receive more than one hundred thousand dollars 34 per year of public funding, including local, state, and federal 35 36 funding. A host home shall not receive any local, state, or government funding; 37
  - (p) Receiving centers as defined in section 2 of this act.
- 39 (3) "Department" means the department of children, youth, and 40 families.

(4) "Juvenile" means a person under the age of twenty-one who has been sentenced to a term of confinement under the supervision of the department under RCW 13.40.185.

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- "Performance-based contracts" or "contracting" means the structuring of all aspects of the procurement of services around the purpose of the work to be performed and the desired results with the contract requirements set forth in clear, specific, and objective terms with measurable outcomes. Contracts may also include provisions that link the performance of the contractor to the level and timing of the reimbursement.
- (6) "Probationary license" means a license issued disciplinary measure to an agency that has previously been issued a full license but is out of compliance with licensing standards.
- (7) "Requirement" means any rule, regulation, or standard of care to be maintained by an agency.
  - (8) "Secretary" means the secretary of the department.
  - (9) "Street youth" means a person under the age of eighteen who lives outdoors or in another unsafe location not intended for occupancy by the minor and who is not residing with his or her parent or at his or her legally authorized residence.
- (10) "Transitional living services" means at a minimum, to the extent funds are available, the following:
  - Educational including basic services, literacy computational skills training, either in local alternative or public high schools or in a high school equivalency program that leads to obtaining a high school equivalency degree;
  - (b) Assistance and counseling related to obtaining vocational training or higher education, job readiness, job search assistance, and placement programs;
- (c) Counseling and instruction in life skills such as money management, home management, consumer skills, parenting, health care, access to community resources, and transportation and housing options;
  - (d) Individual and group counseling; and
- (e) Establishing networks with federal agencies and state and 35 36 local organizations such as the United States department of labor, employment and training administration programs including the 37 workforce innovation and opportunity act which administers private 38 39 industry councils and the job corps; vocational rehabilitation; and 40 volunteer programs.

- 1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 11.** A new section is added to chapter 7.68 2 RCW to read as follows:
  - (1) By September 1, 2020, the statewide coordinating committee shall convene a meeting related to the role that child advocacy centers have in responding to and supporting commercially sexually exploited children.
- 7 (a) The meeting required under this subsection must include representatives from child advocacy centers. 8
- (b) By October 1, 2020, the department must provide a report to 9 the statewide coordinating committee that includes: 10
- (i) An inventory of the number and location of child advocacy 11 centers in the state; and 12

  - (d) Recommendations for ensuring that child advocacy centers connect commercially sexually exploited children with available services in the community.
    - (3) For purposes of this section:

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- 29 (a) "Child advocacy center" has the same meaning as the definition provided under RCW 26.44.020. 30
  - (b) "Department" means the department of commerce.
- (c) "Statewide coordinating committee" means the commercially 32 33 sexually exploited children statewide coordinating committee established under RCW 7.68.801. 34
- (4) This section expires June 30, 2021. 35
