## SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 2514

State of Washington 66th Legislature 2020 Regular Session

- 1 AN ACT Relating to creating the Washington common application;
- 2 adding a new section to chapter 28B.10 RCW; and creating a new
- 3 section.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 The legislature recognizes that while NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. 6 institutions of higher education generally intend 7 admissions processes to be as equitable as possible, 8 administrative barriers can create inequities with disproportionate negative impacts on underrepresented student populations. One such 9 10 barrier includes the time and financial resources required for 11 students to apply to multiple institutions each with their own unique 12 application processes. Despite significant commonality 13 applications, students applying to multiple institutions must answer 14 duplicative or similar questions from one application to the next, 15 responses to accommodate different alter similar word count 16 requirements, navigate separate fee waiver processes, and more. The 17 money, and particular expertise required to successfully 18 complete these applications creates an unnecessary administrative 19 barrier that especially impacts students with competing obligations, 20 such as job and familial responsibilities, as well as students who 21 may lack access to college admissions resources. - 1 that when institutions adopt a common application, they improve
- 2 access for potential students, resulting in a larger and more diverse
- 3 applicant pool. Given these facts, the legislature intends to direct
- 4 institutions of higher education to adopt a common application so
- 5 that students may apply to all six public four-year institutions of
- 6 higher education in Washington using the same application.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 28B.10 RCW to read as follows:
- 9 (1) The public four-year institutions of higher education shall all enroll in the same preexisting online common application for use in admitting students by the 2022-23 academic year. The preexisting online common application adopted shall meet the following requirements:
- 14 (a) Includes more than five hundred institutional participants; 15 and
- 16 (b) Has an established application fee waiver process for low-17 income students.
- 18 (2) Nothing in this section precludes a public institution of 19 higher education from adopting a second preexisting online common 20 application that meets the following requirements:
- 21 (a) Includes more than one hundred institutional participants; 22 and
- 23 (b) Has an established application fee waiver process for low-24 income students.
- 25 (3) The public four-year institutions of higher education are 26 encouraged to collaborate on standardized fee waiver requirements for 27 low-income students to help ensure predictability and equity for 28 students.
