## HOUSE BILL 2757

- 1 AN ACT Relating to official state designations; amending RCW
- 2 1.20.090 and 1.20.042; adding a new section to chapter 1.20 RCW; and
- 3 creating a new section.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that the Ellensburg
- 6 blue agate is a gem unique to the state of Washington. It is only
- 7 found near the basalt beds located around Ellensburg, Washington and
- 8 Kittitas Valley. Ellensburg blue agates were originally formed by
- 9 mineral-dense fluid in the small cavities of the Teanaway basalts,
- 10 which are more than forty million years old, and were carried by an
- 11 ancient river to the Ellensburg region where they are found today.
- 12 The Ellensburg blue agate is known for its rarity and color, which
- 13 ranges from a light sky-blue to an almost royal-blue, and is the only
- 14 agate to be considered a semiprecious gem.
- 15 **Sec. 2.** RCW 1.20.090 and 1975 c 8 s 1 are each amended to read
- 16 as follows:
- 17 ((Petrified wood)) The Ellensburg blue agate is hereby designated
- 18 as the official gem of the state of Washington.

- 1 Sec. 3. RCW 1.20.042 and 1998 c 129 s 2 are each amended to read as follows:
- The Columbian mammoth of North America, Mammuthus columbi, is 3
- hereby designated as the official <u>vertebrate</u> fossil of the state of 4
- Washington. 5

- 6 NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. A new section is added to chapter 1.20 RCW
- 7 to read as follows:
- Petrified wood is hereby designated as the official vegetative 8
- 9 fossil of the state of Washington.
