SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 2775

- AN ACT Relating to the practice of colon hydrotherapy; amending RCW 18.360.020, 18.360.030, 18.360.040, 18.360.050, 18.360.060, and 18.360.090; reenacting and amending RCW 18.360.010 and 18.130.040; adding a new section to chapter 18.36A RCW; providing an effective date; providing an expiration date; and declaring an emergency.
- 6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** A new section is added to chapter 18.36A RCW to read as follows:
- By October 1, 2020, the board shall submit to the department draft rules specifying the training and competency requirements necessary for a medical assistant-colon hydrotherapist certified under chapter 18.360 RCW to deliver colon hydrotherapy in a manner that is consistent with all current standards for public safety.
- Sec. 2. RCW 18.360.010 and 2017 c 336 s 14 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:
- The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter unless the context clearly requires otherwise.
- 18 (1) "Administer" means the retrieval of medication, and its 19 application to a patient, as authorized in RCW 18.360.050.

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- (2) "Delegation" means direct authorization granted by a licensed health care practitioner to a medical assistant to perform the functions authorized in this chapter which fall within the scope of practice of the health care provider and the training and experience of the medical assistant.
 - (3) "Department" means the department of health.
- (4) "Forensic phlebotomist" means a police officer, law enforcement officer, or employee of a correctional facility or detention facility, who is certified under this chapter and meets any additional training and proficiency standards of his or her employer to collect a venous blood sample for forensic testing pursuant to a search warrant, a waiver of the warrant requirement, or exigent circumstances.
 - (5) "Health care practitioner" means:

- (a) A physician licensed under chapter 18.71 RCW;
- 16 (b) An osteopathic physician and surgeon licensed under chapter 17 18.57 RCW; or
 - (c) Acting within the scope of their respective licensure, a podiatric physician and surgeon licensed under chapter 18.22 RCW, a registered nurse or advanced registered nurse practitioner licensed under chapter 18.79 RCW, a naturopath licensed under chapter 18.36A RCW, a physician assistant licensed under chapter 18.71A RCW, an osteopathic physician assistant licensed under chapter 18.57A RCW, or an optometrist licensed under chapter 18.53 RCW.
 - (6) "Medical assistant-certified" means a person certified under RCW 18.360.040 who assists a health care practitioner with patient care, executes administrative and clinical procedures, and performs functions as provided in RCW 18.360.050 under the supervision of the health care practitioner.
 - (7) "Medical assistant-hemodialysis technician" means a person certified under RCW 18.360.040 who performs hemodialysis and other functions pursuant to RCW 18.360.050 under the supervision of a health care practitioner.
 - (8) "Medical assistant-phlebotomist" means a person certified under RCW 18.360.040 who performs capillary, venous, and arterial invasive procedures for blood withdrawal and other functions pursuant to RCW 18.360.050 under the supervision of a health care practitioner.
- 39 (9) "Medical assistant-registered" means a person registered 40 under RCW 18.360.040 who, pursuant to an endorsement by a health care

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- practitioner, clinic, or group practice, assists a health care practitioner with patient care, executes administrative and clinical procedures, and performs functions as provided in RCW 18.360.050 under the supervision of the health care practitioner.
 - (10) "Secretary" means the secretary of the department of health.
 - (11) "Supervision" means supervision of procedures permitted pursuant to this chapter by a health care practitioner who is physically present and is immediately available in the facility. The health care practitioner does not need to be present during procedures to withdraw blood, but must be immediately available.
- 11 (12) "Medical assistant-colon hydrotherapist" means a person 12 certified under RCW 18.360.040 who performs colon hydrotherapy upon 13 delegation from and supervision by a naturopath.
- 14 <u>(13) "Colon hydrotherapy" means the performance of enemas or</u> 15 <u>colonic irrigation.</u>
- 16 **Sec. 3.** RCW 18.360.020 and 2017 c 336 s 15 are each amended to read as follows:

Except as provided in RCW 18.360.090:

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- 19 (1) No person may practice as a medical assistant-certified,
 20 medical assistant-hemodialysis technician, medical assistant21 phlebotomist, ((or)) forensic phlebotomist, or medical assistant22 colon hydrotherapist, unless he or she is certified under RCW
 23 18.360.040.
- 24 (2) No person may practice as a medical assistant-registered unless he or she is registered under RCW 18.360.040.
- 26 **Sec. 4.** RCW 18.360.030 and 2019 c 55 s 8 are each amended to read as follows:
- (1) The secretary shall adopt rules specifying the minimum qualifications for a medical assistant-certified, medical assistant-hemodialysis technician, medical assistant-phlebotomist, ((and)) forensic phlebotomist, and medical assistant-colon hydrotherapist.
 - (a) The qualifications for a medical assistant-hemodialysis technician must be equivalent to the qualifications for hemodialysis technicians regulated pursuant to chapter 18.135 RCW as of January 1, 2012.
- 36 (b) The qualifications for a forensic phlebotomist must include 37 training consistent with the occupational safety and health 38 administration guidelines and must include between twenty and thirty

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- hours of work in a clinical setting with the completion of more than one hundred successful venipunctures. The secretary may not require more than forty hours of classroom training for initial training, which may include online preclass homework.
 - (c) The qualifications for a medical assistant-colon hydrotherapist must be identical to the draft rules adopted by the board of naturopathy under section 1 of this act.

- (2) The secretary shall adopt rules that establish the minimum requirements necessary for a health care practitioner, clinic, or group practice to endorse a medical assistant as qualified to perform the duties authorized by this chapter and be able to file an attestation of that endorsement with the department.
- (3) The Washington medical commission, the board of osteopathic medicine and surgery, the podiatric medical board, the nursing care quality assurance commission, the board of naturopathy, and the optometry board shall each review and identify other specialty assistive personnel not included in this chapter and the tasks they perform. The department of health shall compile the information from each disciplining authority listed in this subsection and submit the compiled information to the legislature no later than December 15, 2012.
- **Sec. 5.** RCW 18.360.040 and 2017 c 336 s 17 are each amended to 23 read as follows:
 - (1) (a) The secretary shall issue a certification as a medical assistant-certified to any person who has satisfactorily completed a medical assistant training program approved by the secretary, passed an examination approved by the secretary, and met any additional qualifications established under RCW 18.360.030.
 - (b) The secretary shall issue an interim certification to any person who has met all of the qualifications in (a) of this subsection, except for the passage of the examination. A person holding an interim permit possesses the full scope of practice of a medical assistant-certified. The interim permit expires upon passage of the examination or after one year, whichever occurs first, and may not be renewed.
 - (2) The secretary shall issue a certification as a medical assistant-hemodialysis technician to any person who meets the qualifications for a medical assistant-hemodialysis technician established under RCW 18.360.030.

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(3) The secretary shall issue a certification as a medical assistant-phlebotomist to any person who meets the qualifications for a medical assistant-phlebotomist established under RCW 18.360.030.

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- (4) The secretary shall issue a certification as a forensic phlebotomist to any person who meets the qualifications for a forensic phlebotomist established under RCW 18.360.030.
- The secretary shall issue a certification as a medical assistant-colon hydrotherapist to any person who meets the training and competency requirements established under RCW 18.360.030.
- (6) (a) The secretary shall issue a registration as a medical assistant-registered to any person who has a current endorsement from a health care practitioner, clinic, or group practice.
- (b) In order to be endorsed under this subsection $((\frac{5}{1}))$ person must:
- (i) Be endorsed by a health care practitioner, clinic, or group 15 practice that meets the qualifications established under RCW 17 18.360.030; and
 - (ii) Have a current attestation of his or her endorsement to perform specific medical tasks signed by a supervising health care practitioner filed with the department. A medical assistantregistered may only perform the medical tasks listed in his or her current attestation of endorsement.
 - (c) A registration based on an endorsement by a health care practitioner, clinic, or group practice is not transferable to another health care practitioner, clinic, or group practice.
 - (d) An applicant for registration as a medical assistantregistered who applies to the department within seven days of employment by the endorsing health care practitioner, clinic, group practice may work as a medical assistant-registered for up to sixty days while the application is processed. The applicant must stop working on the sixtieth day of employment if the registration has not been granted for any reason.
- 33 $((\frac{(6)}{(1)}))$ A certification issued under subsections (1) through (3) and (5) of this section is transferable between different 34 practice settings. A certification under subsection (4) of this 35 36 section is transferable between law enforcement agencies.
- Sec. 6. RCW 18.360.050 and 2014 c 138 s 1 are each amended to 37 38 read as follows:

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- 1 (1) A medical assistant-certified may perform the following 2 duties delegated by, and under the supervision of, a health care 3 practitioner:
 - (a) Fundamental procedures:
 - (i) Wrapping items for autoclaving;
- 6 (ii) Procedures for sterilizing equipment and instruments;
- 7 (iii) Disposing of biohazardous materials; and
- 8 (iv) Practicing standard precautions.
- 9 (b) Clinical procedures:

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- 10 (i) Performing aseptic procedures in a setting other than a 11 hospital licensed under chapter 70.41 RCW;

 - (d) Diagnostic testing:
 - (i) Electrocardiography;

- (iii) (A) Tests waived under the federal clinical laboratory improvement amendments program on July 1, 2013. The department shall periodically update the tests authorized under this subsection (1) (d) based on changes made by the federal clinical laboratory improvement amendments program; and
- 32 (B) Moderate complexity tests if the medical assistant-certified 33 meets standards for personnel qualifications and responsibilities in 34 compliance with federal regulation for nonwaived testing.
 - (e) Patient care:
- 36 (i) Telephone and in-person screening limited to intake and 37 gathering of information without requiring the exercise of judgment 38 based on clinical knowledge;
- 39 (ii) Obtaining vital signs;
- 40 (iii) Obtaining and recording patient history;

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(iv) Preparing and maintaining examination and treatment areas;

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- 2 (v) Preparing patients for, and assisting with, routine and 3 specialty examinations, procedures, treatments, and minor office 4 surgeries;
 - (vi) Maintaining medication and immunization records; and
- 6 (vii) Screening and following up on test results as directed by a 7 health care practitioner.
 - (f)(i) Administering medications. A medical assistant-certified may only administer medications if the drugs are:
 - (A) Administered only by unit or single dosage, or by a dosage calculated and verified by a health care practitioner. For purposes of this section, a combination or multidose vaccine shall be considered a unit dose;
 - (B) Limited to legend drugs, vaccines, and Schedule III-V controlled substances as authorized by a health care practitioner under the scope of his or her license and consistent with rules adopted by the secretary under (f)(ii) of this subsection; and
 - (C) Administered pursuant to a written order from a health care practitioner.
 - (ii) A medical assistant-certified may not administer experimental drugs or chemotherapy agents. The secretary may, by rule, further limit the drugs that may be administered under this subsection (1)(f). The rules adopted under this subsection must limit the drugs based on risk, class, or route.
 - (g) Intravenous injections. A medical assistant-certified may administer intravenous injections for diagnostic or therapeutic agents under the direct visual supervision of a health care practitioner if the medical assistant-certified meets minimum standards established by the secretary in rule. The minimum standards must be substantially similar to the qualifications for category D and F health care assistants as they exist on July 1, 2013.
 - (h) Urethral catheterization when appropriately trained.
 - (2) A medical assistant-hemodialysis technician may perform hemodialysis when delegated and supervised by a health care practitioner. A medical assistant-hemodialysis technician may also administer drugs and oxygen to a patient when delegated and supervised by a health care practitioner and pursuant to rules adopted by the secretary.
 - (3) A medical assistant-phlebotomist may perform:

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- 1 (a) Capillary, venous, or arterial invasive procedures for blood 2 withdrawal when delegated and supervised by a health care 3 practitioner and pursuant to rules adopted by the secretary;
 - (b) Tests waived under the federal clinical laboratory improvement amendments program on July 1, 2013. The department shall periodically update the tests authorized under this section based on changes made by the federal clinical laboratory improvement amendments program;
- 9 (c) Moderate and high complexity tests if the medical assistant-10 phlebotomist meets standards for personnel qualifications and 11 responsibilities in compliance with federal regulation for nonwaived 12 testing; and
 - (d) Electrocardiograms.

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- 14 (4) A medical assistant-colon hydrotherapist may perform colon 15 hydrotherapy upon delegation from and supervision by a naturopath 16 licensed under chapter 18.36A RCW.
- 17 <u>(5)</u> A medical assistant-registered may perform the following 18 duties delegated by, and under the supervision of, a health care 19 practitioner:
- 20 (a) Fundamental procedures:
- 21 (i) Wrapping items for autoclaving;
- (ii) Procedures for sterilizing equipment and instruments;
- 23 (iii) Disposing of biohazardous materials; and
- 24 (iv) Practicing standard precautions.
- 25 (b) Clinical procedures:
- 26 (i) Preparing for sterile procedures;
- 27 (ii) Taking vital signs;
- 28 (iii) Preparing patients for examination; and
- 29 (iv) Observing and reporting patients' signs or symptoms.
- 30 (c) Specimen collection:
- 31 (i) Obtaining specimens for microbiological testing; and
- 32 (ii) Instructing patients in proper technique to collect urine 33 and fecal specimens.
 - (d) Patient care:
- 35 (i) Telephone and in-person screening limited to intake and 36 gathering of information without requiring the exercise of judgment 37 based on clinical knowledge;

- 39 (iii) Obtaining and recording patient history;
- 40 (iv) Preparing and maintaining examination and treatment areas;

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(v) Preparing patients for, and assisting with, routine and specialty examinations, procedures, treatments, and minor office surgeries utilizing no more than local anesthetic. The department may, by rule, prohibit duties authorized under this subsection ((4+)) (5)(d)(v) if performance of those duties by a medical assistant-registered would pose an unreasonable risk to patient safety;

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- (vi) Maintaining medication and immunization records; and
- 9 (vii) Screening and following up on test results as directed by a 10 health care practitioner.
 - (e)(i) Tests waived under the federal clinical laboratory improvement amendments program on July 1, 2013. The department shall periodically update the tests authorized under subsection (1)(d) of this section based on changes made by the federal clinical laboratory improvement amendments program.
- 16 (ii) Moderate complexity tests if the medical assistant-17 registered meets standards for personnel qualifications and 18 responsibilities in compliance with federal regulation for nonwaived 19 testing.
- 20 (f) Administering eye drops, topical ointments, and vaccines, 21 including combination or multidose vaccines.
 - (g) Urethral catheterization when appropriately trained.
- 23 **Sec. 7.** RCW 18.360.060 and 2013 c 128 s 4 are each amended to 24 read as follows:
- 25 (1) (a) Prior to delegation of any of the functions in RCW
 26 18.360.050 other than the functions of a medical assistant-colon
 27 hydrotherapist, a health care practitioner shall determine to the
 28 best of his or her ability each of the following:
- 29 $((\frac{(a)}{a}))$ <u>(i)</u> That the task is within that health care 30 practitioner's scope of licensure or authority;

- (i) The supervising naturopath conducts a patient evaluation and diagnosis prior to referring a patient to the medical assistant-colon hydrotherapist for the application of colon hydrotherapy and adopts a plan for patient monitoring;

- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 10.** Section 8 of this act expires January 1, 6 2022.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 11. Sections 2, 3, 5 through 7, and 9 of this act take effect July 1, 2021.
- 9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 12.** Sections 1, 4, and 8 of this act are 10 necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, 11 or safety, or support of the state government and its existing public 12 institutions, and take effect immediately.

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
