1 AN ACT Relating to requiring quick response codes on ballots;  
2 amending RCW 29A.36.111, 29A.40.091, and 29A.12.005; and reenacting  
3 and amending RCW 29A.40.110.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 **Sec. 1.** RCW 29A.36.111 and 2009 c 414 s 1 are each amended to  
6 read as follows:

7 (1) Every ballot for a single combination of issues, offices, and  
8 candidates shall be uniform within a precinct and shall identify the  
9 type of primary or election, the county, and the date of the primary  
10 or election, and the ballot or voting device shall contain  
11 instructions on the proper method of recording a vote, including  
12 write-in votes, and how to access the status and image of their voted  
13 ballot using the quick response code and access code provided in  
14 accordance with subsection (2) of this section. Each position,  
15 together with the names of the candidates for that office, shall be  
16 clearly separated from other offices or positions in the same  
17 jurisdiction. The offices in each jurisdiction shall be clearly  
18 separated from each other. No paper ballot or ballot card may be  
19 marked by or at the direction of an election official in any way that  
20 would permit the identification of the person who voted that ballot.

1       (2) Each ballot must contain two identical quick response codes,  
2 one located near the instructions required under subsection (1) of  
3 this section and one located on a portion of the ballot that can be  
4 physically separated without damaging or compromising the readability  
5 of the ballot and retained by the voter. The quick response code must  
6 be unique to the ballot and accompanied by an access code which the  
7 voter will use to access information about the voter's ballot. The  
8 quick response code must link to a website where the voter can, with  
9 the access code provided, view the image of their voted ballot and  
10 whether the ballot has been received and counted. The quick response  
11 code may not be linked to any personally identifiable information of  
12 a voter. A person who votes on a voting device must be provided with  
13 a quick response code and access code that allows the voter to access  
14 the image of their selections and whether their votes have been  
15 counted.

16       (3) An ((elections [election])) election official may not enter  
17 into or extend any contract with a vendor if such contract may allow  
18 the vendor to acquire an ownership interest in any data pertaining to  
19 any voter, any voter's address, registration number, or history, or  
20 any ballot.

21       **Sec. 2.** RCW 29A.40.091 and 2021 c 10 s 3 are each amended to  
22 read as follows:

23       (1) The county auditor shall send each voter a ballot, a security  
24 envelope in which to conceal the ballot after voting, a larger  
25 envelope in which to return the security envelope, a declaration that  
26 the voter must sign, and instructions on how to obtain information  
27 about the election, how to mark the ballot, ((and)) how to return the  
28 ballot to the county auditor, and how to access the status and image  
29 of their voted ballot using the quick response code and access code  
30 provided in accordance with section 1 of this act. The calendar date  
31 of the election must be prominently displayed in bold type, twenty-  
32 point font or larger, on the envelope sent to the voter containing  
33 the ballot and other materials listed in this subsection:

- 34       (a) For all general elections in 2020 and after;  
35       (b) For all primary elections in 2021 and after; and  
36       (c) For all elections in 2022 and after.

37       (2) The voter must swear under penalty of perjury that he or she  
38 meets the qualifications to vote, and has not voted in any other  
39 jurisdiction at this election. The declaration must clearly inform

1 the voter that it is illegal to vote if he or she is not a United  
2 States citizen; it is illegal to vote if he or she is serving a  
3 sentence of total confinement under the jurisdiction of the  
4 department of corrections for a felony conviction or is currently  
5 incarcerated for a federal or out-of-state felony conviction; and it  
6 is illegal to cast a ballot or sign a ballot declaration on behalf of  
7 another voter. The ballot materials must provide space for the voter  
8 to sign the declaration, indicate the date on which the ballot was  
9 voted, and include a telephone number.

10 (3) For overseas and service voters, the signed declaration  
11 constitutes the equivalent of a voter registration. Return envelopes  
12 for overseas and service voters must enable the ballot to be returned  
13 postage free if mailed through the United States postal service,  
14 United States armed forces postal service, or the postal service of a  
15 United States foreign embassy under 39 U.S.C. 3406.

16 (4) The voter must be instructed to either return the ballot to  
17 the county auditor no later than 8:00 p.m. the day of the election or  
18 primary, or mail the ballot to the county auditor with a postmark no  
19 later than the day of the election or primary. Return envelopes for  
20 all election ballots must include prepaid postage. Service and  
21 overseas voters must be provided with instructions and a privacy  
22 sheet for returning the ballot and signed declaration by fax or  
23 email. A voted ballot and signed declaration returned by fax or email  
24 must be received by 8:00 p.m. on the day of the election or primary.

25 (5) The county auditor's name may not appear on the security  
26 envelope, the return envelope, or on any voting instructions or  
27 materials included with the ballot if he or she is a candidate for  
28 office during the same year.

29 (6) For purposes of this section, "prepaid postage" means any  
30 method of return postage paid by the county or state.

31 **Sec. 3.** RCW 29A.40.110 and 2011 c 349 s 18, 2011 c 348 s 4, and  
32 2011 c 10 s 41 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

33 (1) The opening and subsequent processing of return envelopes for  
34 any primary or election may begin upon receipt. The tabulation of  
35 absentee ballots must not commence until after 8:00 p.m. on the day  
36 of the primary or election.

37 (2) All received return envelopes must be placed in secure  
38 locations from the time of delivery to the county auditor until their  
39 subsequent opening. After opening the return envelopes, the county

1 canvassing board shall place all of the ballots in secure storage  
2 until processing. Ballots may be taken from the inner envelopes and  
3 all the normal procedural steps may be performed to prepare these  
4 ballots for tabulation. Upon receipt of the ballot and throughout the  
5 canvassing process, the quick response code on each ballot must be  
6 scanned to provide the voter with information about whether the  
7 voter's ballot has been received and counted and an image of the  
8 voter's voted ballot.

9 (3) The canvassing board, or its designated representatives,  
10 shall examine the postmark on the return envelope and signature on  
11 the declaration before processing the ballot. The ballot must either  
12 be received no later than 8:00 p.m. on the day of the primary or  
13 election, or must be postmarked no later than the day of the primary  
14 or election. All personnel assigned to verify signatures must receive  
15 training on statewide standards for signature verification. Personnel  
16 shall verify that the voter's signature on the ballot declaration is  
17 the same as the signature of that voter in the registration files of  
18 the county. Verification may be conducted by an automated  
19 verification system approved by the secretary of state. A variation  
20 between the signature of the voter on the ballot declaration and the  
21 signature of that voter in the registration files due to the  
22 substitution of initials or the use of common nicknames is permitted  
23 so long as the surname and handwriting are clearly the same.

24 (4) If the postmark is missing or illegible, the date on the  
25 ballot declaration to which the voter has attested determines the  
26 validity, as to the time of voting, for that ballot. For overseas  
27 voters and service voters, the date on the declaration to which the  
28 voter has attested determines the validity, as to the time of voting,  
29 for that ballot. Any overseas voter or service voter may return the  
30 signed declaration and voted ballot by fax or email by 8:00 p.m. on  
31 the day of the primary or election, and the county auditor must use  
32 established procedures to maintain the secrecy of the ballot.

33 **Sec. 4.** RCW 29A.12.005 and 2018 c 218 s 5 are each amended to  
34 read as follows:

35 As used in this chapter, "voting system" means:

36 (1) The total combination of mechanical, electromechanical, or  
37 electronic equipment including, but not limited to, the software,  
38 firmware, and documentation required to program, control, and support  
39 the equipment, that is used:

- 1 (a) To define ballots;
- 2 (b) To cast and count votes;
- 3 (c) To report or display election results from the voting system;
- 4 (d) To maintain and produce any audit trail information; (~~and~~)
- 5 (e) To perform an audit under RCW 29A.60.185; and
- 6 (f) By election officials to produce, program, or otherwise
- 7 provide for quick response codes required under section 1 of this
- 8 act, or to process quick response codes in accordance with RCW
- 9 29A.40.110(2); and
- 10 (2) The practices and associated documentation used:
- 11 (a) To identify system components and versions of such
- 12 components;
- 13 (b) To test the system during its development and maintenance;
- 14 (c) To maintain records of system errors and defects;
- 15 (d) To determine specific system changes to be made to a system
- 16 after the initial qualification of the system; and
- 17 (e) To make available any materials to the voter such as notices,
- 18 instructions, forms, or paper ballots.

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
