1 AN ACT Relating to outreach and completion initiatives to
2 increase postsecondary enrollment; amending RCW 28B.92.200,
3 74.04.060, and 28B.120.040; reenacting and amending RCW 43.79A.040;
4 adding a new section to chapter 28B.77 RCW; adding a new section to
5 chapter 28B.50 RCW; adding new sections to chapter 28B.92 RCW; adding
6 a new section to chapter 28B.120 RCW; creating new sections; and
7 repealing RCW 28B.120.005, 28B.120.010, 28B.120.020, 28B.120.025,
8 28B.120.030, and 28B.120.900.

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

10 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** The legislature recognizes that, in 2020,
11 Washington ranked 49th nationally for completion of the free
12 application for federal student aid among high school seniors. The
13 free application for federal student aid is the form that prospective
14 and current postsecondary education students use to receive federal
15 and state financial aid, such as the federal Pell grant, the
16 Washington college grant, the college bound scholarship, the
17 opportunity scholarship, federal student loans, and many other
18 financial resources for college. For students who cannot file a free
19 application for federal student aid, the state has an alternative
20 financial aid application called the Washington application for state
21 financial aid. The free application for federal student aid is a

1 strong indicator for college enrollment. Ninety-two percent of high
2 school seniors who completed the free application for federal student
3 aid enrolled in a postsecondary institution by the November following
4 graduation versus 51 percent of students who did not complete a free
5 application for federal student aid. In addition, the legislature
6 recognizes that the pandemic has exacerbated equity gaps in college
7 access as colleges and universities are experiencing decreases in
8 enrollments among low-income students, despite having one of the
9 largest and most generous need-based financial aid programs in the
10 country. The legislature recognizes that the Washington college grant
11 program established in chapter 28B.92 RCW, which education trust
12 called "the most equity-focused free college program in the country"
13 is a critical tool to address these equity gaps and help students
14 enter college and apprenticeships. Therefore, it is the legislature's
15 intent to establish an outreach initiative for the Washington college
16 grant and an outreach and completion initiative for the free
17 application for federal student aid and Washington application for
18 state financial aid to help students succeed.

19 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.77
20 RCW to read as follows:

21 Subject to availability of amounts appropriated for this specific
22 purpose, the student achievement council shall conduct a statewide
23 marketing campaign to increase awareness of the Washington college
24 grant program established in chapter 28B.92 RCW. The student
25 achievement council shall issue a request for proposal for hiring a
26 marketing firm that will produce high quality advertisements to
27 promote the state's largest financial aid program. Advertisements
28 should be marketed towards potential postsecondary students and their
29 parents with the goal of increasing awareness of the Washington
30 college grant program to further the state's educational attainment
31 goals. The advertisements may include television commercials,
32 billboards, advertisements on public transit, paid internet search
33 advertisements, and social media marketing.

34 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.50
35 RCW to read as follows:

36 Subject to availability of amounts appropriated for this specific
37 purpose, the college board shall administer a free application for

1 federal student aid and Washington application for state financial
2 aid outreach and completion initiative pilot program.

3 (1) The college board shall select community or technical
4 colleges to participate in the pilot program. The colleges selected
5 to participate must each be located within educational service
6 districts that are in the bottom two for free application for federal
7 student aid completion rates when combining their respective school
8 districts' free application for federal student aid completion rates
9 over the past three completed academic years prior to the effective
10 date of this section. Colleges selected to participate shall employ
11 outreach specialists to work directly with the high schools located
12 in the corresponding educational service district. It is the
13 legislature's intent that the outreach specialists be employed at a
14 ratio of one to 600 high school seniors within the corresponding
15 educational service district. The outreach specialists shall make
16 significant contact with high school students and their families for
17 the purpose of increasing free application for federal student aid
18 and Washington application for state financial aid completion rates.
19 The outreach specialists shall use the free application for federal
20 student aid and Washington application for state financial aid data
21 maintained by the student achievement council to conduct targeted
22 outreach and free application for federal student aid and Washington
23 application for state financial aid completion assistance to high
24 school seniors. The outreach specialists shall also provide
25 information on how to access private scholarships. The outreach
26 specialists shall conduct other outreach as appropriate, including
27 virtual or in-person presentations with students and families,
28 announcements on school intercoms and social media channels, outreach
29 to recent high school graduates as peer messengers, and events at
30 school college or career fairs.

31 (2) The college board shall report annually to the appropriate
32 committees of the legislature in accordance with RCW 43.01.036
33 beginning December 1, 2023, on the free application for federal
34 student aid and Washington application for state financial aid
35 outreach and completion initiative pilot program. The report must
36 include details on how the colleges selected used the funding and how
37 the initiatives worked to increase free application for federal
38 student aid and Washington application for state financial aid
39 completion rates. The report must also include before and after free
40 application for federal student aid and Washington application for

1 state financial aid completion data and specific details about the
2 number of high school students assisted in completing the free
3 application for federal student aid and Washington application for
4 state financial aid.

5 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 4.** (1) Subject to availability of amounts
6 appropriated for this specific purpose, the state library shall
7 administer a grant pilot program with the purpose of increasing free
8 application for federal student aid and Washington application for
9 state financial aid completion rates.

10 (2) The state library shall administer grants to local public
11 libraries located within educational service districts that are in
12 the bottom two for free application for federal student aid
13 completion rates when combining their respective school districts'
14 free application for federal student aid completion rates over the
15 past three completed academic years prior to the effective date of
16 this section. The state library shall, as a condition of the grant
17 pilot program, require local public libraries to partner with
18 community-based organizations including, where appropriate,
19 organizations with proven track records of working with historically
20 underrepresented populations, to increase free application for
21 federal student aid and Washington application for state financial
22 aid completion. The organization or organizations selected shall:

23 (a) Be embedded in their respective community and have a strong
24 foundation of trust among members of the community; and

25 (b) Be committed to working directly with individual members of
26 their community to assist with one-on-one free application for
27 federal student aid and Washington application for state financial
28 aid completion and to provide information on how to access private
29 scholarships.

30 (3) The state library shall report annually to the appropriate
31 committees of the legislature in accordance with RCW 43.01.036
32 beginning December 1, 2023, on the progress of the library outreach
33 pilot project to boost free application for federal student aid and
34 Washington application for state financial aid completion rates. The
35 report must include the specific number of students that were
36 assisted through the grant pilot program.

37 **Sec. 5.** RCW 28B.92.200 and 2019 c 406 s 19 are each amended to
38 read as follows:

1 (1) The Washington college grant program is created to provide a
2 statewide free college program for eligible participants and greater
3 access to postsecondary education for Washington residents. The
4 Washington college grant program is intended to increase the number
5 of high school graduates and adults that can attain a postsecondary
6 credential and provide them with the qualifications needed to compete
7 for job opportunities in Washington.

8 (2) The office shall implement and administer the Washington
9 college grant program and is authorized to establish rules necessary
10 for implementation of the program.

11 (3) The legislature shall appropriate funding for the Washington
12 college grant program. Allocations must be made on the basis of
13 estimated eligible participants enrolled in eligible institutions of
14 higher education or apprenticeship programs. All eligible students
15 are entitled to a Washington college grant beginning in academic year
16 2020-21.

17 (4) The office shall award Washington college grants to all
18 eligible students beginning in academic year 2020-21.

19 (5) To be eligible for the Washington college grant, students
20 must meet the following requirements:

21 (a) (i) Demonstrate financial need under RCW 28B.92.205;

22 (ii) Receive one of the following types of public assistance:

23 (A) Aged, blind, or disabled assistance benefits under chapter
24 74.62 RCW;

25 (B) Essential needs and housing support program benefits under
26 RCW 43.185C.220; or

27 (C) Pregnant women assistance program financial grants under RCW
28 74.62.030; or

29 (iii) Be a Washington high school student in the 10th, 11th, or
30 12th grade whose parent or legal guardian is receiving one of the
31 types of public assistance listed in (a)(ii) of this subsection and
32 have received a certificate confirming eligibility from the office in
33 accordance with section 6 of this act;

34 (b) (i) Be enrolled or accepted for enrollment for at least three
35 quarter credits or the equivalent semester credits at an institution
36 of higher education in Washington as defined in RCW 28B.92.030; or

37 (ii) Be enrolled in a registered apprenticeship program approved
38 under chapter 49.04 RCW;

39 (c) Be a resident student as defined in RCW 28B.15.012(2) (a)
40 through (e);

1 (d) File an annual application for financial aid as approved by
2 the office; and

3 (e) Must not have earned a baccalaureate degree or higher from a
4 postsecondary institution.

5 (6) Washington college grant eligibility may not extend beyond
6 five years or one hundred twenty-five percent of the published length
7 of the program in which the student is enrolled or the credit or
8 clock-hour equivalent.

9 (7) Institutional aid administrators shall determine whether a
10 student eligible for the Washington college grant in a given academic
11 year may remain eligible for the ensuing year if the student's family
12 income increases by no more than three percent.

13 (8) Qualifications for receipt and renewal include maintaining
14 satisfactory academic progress toward completion of an eligible
15 program as determined by the office and established in rule.

16 (9) Should a recipient terminate his or her enrollment for any
17 reason during the academic year, the unused portion of the grant
18 shall be returned to the state educational grant fund by the
19 institution of higher education according to the institution of
20 higher education's policy for issuing refunds, except as provided in
21 RCW 28B.92.070.

22 (10) An eligible student enrolled on a part-time basis shall
23 receive a prorated portion of the Washington college grant for any
24 academic period in which he or she is enrolled on a part-time basis.

25 (11) The Washington college grant is intended to be used to meet
26 the costs of postsecondary education for students with financial
27 need. The student shall be awarded all need-based financial aid for
28 which the student qualifies as determined by the institution.

29 (12) Students and participating institutions of higher education
30 shall comply with all the rules adopted by the council for the
31 administration of this chapter.

32 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 6.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.92
33 RCW to read as follows:

34 (1) The office shall enter into a data-sharing agreement with the
35 department of social and health services to facilitate the sharing of
36 individual-level data. The department of social and health services
37 shall send the office a list of all individuals receiving benefits
38 under the public assistance programs listed under RCW 28B.92.200(5)
39 on at least an annual basis. The office shall use the list to confirm

1 students' eligibility for the Washington college grant program,
2 without requiring the student to fill out a separate financial aid
3 form. The office may also use the information to conduct outreach
4 promoting the Washington college grant.

5 (2) For high school students in 10th, 11th, and 12th grades whose
6 families are receiving benefits under one of the public assistance
7 programs listed under RCW 28B.92.200(5), the office shall issue a
8 certificate to the student that validates the student's financial
9 need eligibility for the Washington college grant program. The
10 certificate is good for one year after high school graduation and may
11 be used upon enrollment in an eligible institution of higher
12 education, provided the student meets the other Washington college
13 grant eligibility requirements. The office shall track and maintain
14 records of students who were issued certificates under this section
15 in order to confirm a student's financial need eligibility with an
16 institution of higher education. A student does not need to produce
17 the certificate to receive the Washington college grant.

18 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.92
19 RCW to read as follows:

20 The office shall collaborate with the department of social and
21 health services to facilitate individual-level outreach to
22 individuals receiving benefits under the public assistance programs
23 listed under RCW 28B.92.200(5), temporary assistance for needy
24 families under chapter 74.08 RCW, the state family assistance program
25 provided for in rule, and the basic food program to inform these
26 individuals of their eligibility for the Washington college grant
27 program.

28 **Sec. 8.** RCW 74.04.060 and 2017 3rd sp.s. c 6 s 817 are each
29 amended to read as follows:

30 (1)(a) For the protection of applicants and recipients, the
31 department, the authority, and the county offices and their
32 respective officers and employees are prohibited, except as
33 hereinafter provided, from disclosing the contents of any records,
34 files, papers and communications, except for purposes directly
35 connected with the administration of the programs of this title. In
36 any judicial proceeding, except such proceeding as is directly
37 concerned with the administration of these programs, such records,
38 files, papers and communications, and their contents, shall be deemed

1 privileged communications and except for the right of any individual
2 to inquire of the office whether a named individual is a recipient of
3 welfare assistance and such person shall be entitled to an
4 affirmative or negative answer.

5 (b) Unless prohibited by federal law, for the purpose of
6 investigating and preventing child abuse and neglect and providing
7 for the health care coordination and well-being of children in foster
8 care, the department and the authority shall disclose to the
9 department of children, youth, and families the following
10 information: Developmental disabilities administration client
11 records; home and community services client records; long-term care
12 facility or certified community residential supports records; health
13 care information; child support information; food assistance
14 information; and public assistance information. Disclosure under this
15 subsection (1)(b) is mandatory for the purposes of the federal health
16 insurance portability and accountability act.

17 (c) Upon written request of a parent who has been awarded
18 visitation rights in an action for divorce or separation or any
19 parent with legal custody of the child, the department shall disclose
20 to him or her the last known address and location of his or her
21 natural or adopted children. The secretary shall adopt rules which
22 establish procedures for disclosing the address of the children and
23 providing, when appropriate, for prior notice to the custodian of the
24 children. The notice shall state that a request for disclosure has
25 been received and will be complied with by the department unless the
26 department receives a copy of a court order which enjoins the
27 disclosure of the information or restricts or limits the requesting
28 party's right to contact or visit the other party or the child.
29 Information supplied to a parent by the department shall be used only
30 for purposes directly related to the enforcement of the visitation
31 and custody provisions of the court order of separation or decree of
32 divorce. No parent shall disclose such information to any other
33 person except for the purpose of enforcing visitation provisions of
34 the said order or decree.

35 (d) Unless prohibited by federal law, the department is permitted
36 to release individual-level data of state-funded public assistance
37 programs listed under RCW 28B.92.200 to the student achievement
38 council under chapter 28B.77 RCW for the purposes of section 6 of
39 this act.

1 (e) The department shall review methods to improve the protection
2 and confidentiality of information for recipients of welfare
3 assistance who have disclosed to the department that they are past or
4 current victims of domestic violence or stalking.

5 (2) The county offices shall maintain monthly at their offices a
6 report showing the names and addresses of all recipients in the
7 county receiving public assistance under this title, together with
8 the amount paid to each during the preceding month.

9 (3) The provisions of this section shall not apply to duly
10 designated representatives of approved private welfare agencies,
11 public officials, members of legislative interim committees and
12 advisory committees when performing duties directly connected with
13 the administration of this title, such as regulation and
14 investigation directly connected therewith: PROVIDED, HOWEVER, That
15 any information so obtained by such persons or groups shall be
16 treated with such degree of confidentiality as is required by the
17 federal social security law.

18 (4) It shall be unlawful, except as provided in this section, for
19 any person, body, association, firm, corporation or other agency to
20 solicit, publish, disclose, receive, make use of, or to authorize,
21 knowingly permit, participate in or acquiesce in the use of any lists
22 or names for commercial or political purposes of any nature. The
23 violation of this section shall be a gross misdemeanor.

24 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 9.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.120
25 RCW to read as follows:

26 (1) The Washington career and college pathways innovation
27 challenge program is established. The purpose of the program is to
28 meet statewide educational attainment goals established in RCW
29 28B.77.020 by developing local and regional partnerships that foster
30 innovations to:

31 (a) Increase postsecondary enrollment and completion for students
32 enrolling directly from high school and adults returning to
33 education; and

34 (b) Eliminate educational opportunity gaps for students of color,
35 English language learners, students with disabilities, and foster and
36 homeless youth.

37 (2)(a) The student achievement council shall administer the
38 program and award grants, based on a competitive grant process, to
39 local and regional partnerships that represent cross-sector

1 collaborations among education and higher education agencies and
2 institutions, local education agencies, local government, community-
3 based organizations, employers, and other local entities.

4 (b) In awarding the grants, the student achievement council shall
5 consider applications that:

6 (i) Plan and pilot innovative initiatives to raise educational
7 attainment and decrease opportunity gaps;

8 (ii) Engage community-based organizations and resources;

9 (iii) Expand the use of integrated work-based learning;

10 (iv) Provide financial support to cover expenses beyond
11 educational tuition and fees, and other services and supports for
12 students to enroll and complete education and training; and

13 (v) Include local matching funds.

14 (c) In administering the program the student achievement council
15 may hire staff to support grant oversight and provide technical
16 assistance to grantees.

17 (d) The student achievement council may solicit and receive such
18 gifts, grants, and endowments from public or private sources as may
19 be made from time to time, in trust or otherwise, for the use and
20 benefit of the purposes of the program and may expend the same or any
21 income therefrom according to the terms of the gifts, grants, or
22 endowments.

23 (3) The student achievement council shall provide a report each
24 year beginning September 1, 2022, to the governor and the education
25 and higher education committees of the legislature in accordance with
26 RCW 43.01.036. The report shall:

27 (a) Describe grants awarded;

28 (b) Report the progress of each local and regional partnership by
29 reporting on high school graduation, postsecondary enrollment, and
30 completion for each of the regions that partnerships serve; and

31 (c) Disaggregate data by income, race, ethnicity, and other
32 demographic characteristics.

33 **Sec. 10.** RCW 28B.120.040 and 2012 c 229 s 575 are each amended
34 to read as follows:

35 The (~~student achievement council fund for innovation and~~
36 ~~quality~~)) Washington career and college pathways innovation challenge
37 program account is hereby established in the custody of the state
38 treasurer. The student achievement council shall deposit in the fund
39 all moneys received (~~under RCW 28B.120.030~~)) for the Washington

1 career and college pathways innovation challenge program. Moneys in
2 the fund may be spent only for the purposes of (~~RCW 28B.120.010 and~~
3 ~~28B.120.020~~) awarding grants under the Washington career and college
4 pathways innovation challenge program. Disbursements from the fund
5 shall be on the authorization of the student achievement council. The
6 fund is subject to the allotment procedure provided under chapter
7 43.88 RCW, but (~~no~~) an appropriation is not required for
8 disbursements.

9 **Sec. 11.** RCW 43.79A.040 and 2021 c 175 s 10 and 2021 c 108 s 5
10 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

11 (1) Money in the treasurer's trust fund may be deposited,
12 invested, and reinvested by the state treasurer in accordance with
13 RCW 43.84.080 in the same manner and to the same extent as if the
14 money were in the state treasury, and may be commingled with moneys
15 in the state treasury for cash management and cash balance purposes.

16 (2) All income received from investment of the treasurer's trust
17 fund must be set aside in an account in the treasury trust fund to be
18 known as the investment income account.

19 (3) The investment income account may be utilized for the payment
20 of purchased banking services on behalf of treasurer's trust funds
21 including, but not limited to, depository, safekeeping, and
22 disbursement functions for the state treasurer or affected state
23 agencies. The investment income account is subject in all respects to
24 chapter 43.88 RCW, but no appropriation is required for payments to
25 financial institutions. Payments must occur prior to distribution of
26 earnings set forth in subsection (4) of this section.

27 (4)(a) Monthly, the state treasurer must distribute the earnings
28 credited to the investment income account to the state general fund
29 except under (b), (c), and (d) of this subsection.

30 (b) The following accounts and funds must receive their
31 proportionate share of earnings based upon each account's or fund's
32 average daily balance for the period: The 24/7 sobriety account, the
33 Washington promise scholarship account, the Gina Grant Bull memorial
34 legislative page scholarship account, the Rosa Franklin legislative
35 internship program scholarship (~~account~~) account, the Washington
36 advanced college tuition payment program account, the Washington
37 college savings program account, the accessible communities account,
38 the Washington achieving a better life experience program account,
39 the Washington career and college pathways innovation challenge

1 program account, the community and technical college innovation
2 account, the agricultural local fund, the American Indian scholarship
3 endowment fund, the foster care scholarship endowment fund, the
4 foster care endowed scholarship trust fund, the contract harvesting
5 revolving account, the Washington state combined fund drive account,
6 the commemorative works account, the county enhanced 911 excise tax
7 account, the county road administration board emergency loan account,
8 the toll collection account, the developmental disabilities endowment
9 trust fund, the energy account, the fair fund, the family and medical
10 leave insurance account, the fish and wildlife federal lands
11 revolving account, the natural resources federal lands revolving
12 account, the food animal veterinarian conditional scholarship
13 account, the forest health revolving account, the fruit and vegetable
14 inspection account, the educator conditional scholarship account, the
15 game farm alternative account, the GET ready for math and science
16 scholarship account, the Washington global health technologies and
17 product development account, the grain inspection revolving fund, the
18 Washington history day account, the industrial insurance rainy day
19 fund, the juvenile accountability incentive account, the law
20 enforcement officers' and firefighters' plan 2 expense fund, the
21 local tourism promotion account, the low-income home rehabilitation
22 revolving loan program account, the multiagency permitting team
23 account, the northeast Washington wolf-livestock management account,
24 the produce railcar pool account, the public use general aviation
25 airport loan revolving account, the regional transportation
26 investment district account, the rural rehabilitation account, the
27 Washington sexual assault kit account, the stadium and exhibition
28 center account, the youth athletic facility account, the self-
29 insurance revolving fund, the children's trust fund, the Washington
30 horse racing commission Washington bred owners' bonus fund and
31 breeder awards account, the Washington horse racing commission class
32 C purse fund account, the individual development account program
33 account, the Washington horse racing commission operating account,
34 the life sciences discovery fund, the Washington state library-
35 archives building account, the reduced cigarette ignition propensity
36 account, the center for deaf and hard of hearing youth account, the
37 school for the blind account, the Millersylvania park trust fund, the
38 public employees' and retirees' insurance reserve fund, the school
39 employees' benefits board insurance reserve fund, the public
40 employees' and retirees' insurance account, the school employees'

1 insurance account, the long-term services and supports trust account,
2 the radiation perpetual maintenance fund, the Indian health
3 improvement reinvestment account, the department of licensing tuition
4 recovery trust fund, the student achievement council tuition recovery
5 trust fund, the tuition recovery trust fund, the industrial insurance
6 premium refund account, the mobile home park relocation fund, the
7 natural resources deposit fund, the Washington state health insurance
8 pool account, the federal forest revolving account, and the library
9 operations account.

10 (c) The following accounts and funds must receive eighty percent
11 of their proportionate share of earnings based upon each account's or
12 fund's average daily balance for the period: The advance right-of-way
13 revolving fund, the advanced environmental mitigation revolving
14 account, the federal narcotics asset forfeitures account, the high
15 occupancy vehicle account, the local rail service assistance account,
16 and the miscellaneous transportation programs account.

17 (d) Any state agency that has independent authority over accounts
18 or funds not statutorily required to be held in the custody of the
19 state treasurer that deposits funds into a fund or account in the
20 custody of the state treasurer pursuant to an agreement with the
21 office of the state treasurer shall receive its proportionate share
22 of earnings based upon each account's or fund's average daily balance
23 for the period.

24 (5) In conformance with Article II, section 37 of the state
25 Constitution, no trust accounts or funds shall be allocated earnings
26 without the specific affirmative directive of this section.

27 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 12.** The following acts or parts of acts are

4 (5) RCW 28B.120.030 (Receipt of gifts, grants, and endowments)
5 and 2012 c 229 s 574, 1999 c 169 s 6, & 1991 c 98 s 4; and
