3 "<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 28A.310
4 RCW to read as follows:

(1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this 5 specific purpose, each educational service district must work in 6 collaboration with the office of the superintendent of public 7 instruction to develop and maintain the capacity to offer training 8 9 and coaching for educators and other school district staff, including those designated under RCW 28A.225.026 to address 10 excessive 11 absenteeism and truancy, on the development of robust early warning 12 systems to identify and locate students who are chronically absent 13 and connect them with the necessary supports to reengage them in 14 academic learning. The training and coaching must include collecting, analyzing, and reporting early warning data, including attendance and 15 16 other relevant data.

(2) For the purposes of this section:

(a) "Necessary supports" may include engagement with families;
 academic, systemic, and economic supports; adequate and appropriate
 clothing; food and nutrition; transportation; connecting students to
 behavioral and physical health supports; and incentives and
 celebrations of students' attendance and engagement in the classroom.

(b) "Students who are chronically absent" means students who miss
 10 percent or more of their school days for any reason including
 excused and unexcused absences and suspensions.

26 Sec. 2. RCW 28A.175.025 and 2007 c 408 s 2 are each amended to 27 read as follows:

28 (1) Subject to the availability of funds appropriated for this 29 <u>specific</u> purpose, the office of the superintendent of public 30 instruction shall create a grant program and award grants to local 31 partnerships of schools, families, and communities ((to begin the))

1 phase in of)) for a statewide comprehensive dropout prevention, 2 intervention, and retrieval system <u>including supports for students</u> 3 <u>who are chronically absent</u>. This program shall be known as the 4 building bridges program.

5 (((1))) (2) For purposes of RCW 28A.175.025 through 28A.175.075, 6 a "building bridges program" means a local partnership of schools, 7 families, and communities that <u>either provides the supports under</u> 8 <u>subsection (3) of this section or provides all of the following</u> 9 programs or activities <u>under this subsection</u>, or both:

10 (a) A system that identifies individual students at risk of dropping out from middle through high school based on local 11 12 predictive data, including state assessment data starting in the fourth grade, and provides timely interventions for such students and 13 for dropouts ((, including a plan for educational success as already 14 required by the student learning plan as defined under RCW 15 28A.655.061)). Students identified shall include foster care youth, 16 17 youth involved in the juvenile justice system, and students receiving special education services under chapter 28A.155 RCW; 18

(b) Coaches or mentors for students as necessary;

(c) Staff responsible for coordination of community partners that provide a seamless continuum of academic and nonacademic support in schools and communities;

(d) Retrieval or reentry activities; and

(e) Alternative educational programming, including, but not

 preparatory programs and online learning opportunities.

(((2) One of the grants awarded under this section shall be for a two-year demonstration project focusing on providing fifth through twelfth grade students with a program that utilizes technology and is integrated with state standards, basic academics, cross-cultural exposures, and age-appropriate preemployment training. The project shall:

33 (a) Establish programs in two western Washington and one eastern 34 Washington urban areas;

35 (b) Identify at-risk students in each of the distinct communities 36 and populations and implement strategies to close the achievement 37 gap;

1 (d) Submit a report to the legislature by December 1, 2009)) (3) When community-based organizations, tribes, and community and 2 3 technical colleges are awarded grants to support students who are chronically absent under this section, grant funds may also be used 4 for the following strategies and supports: 5 6 (a) Proactive engagement with all families about the impact of 7 attendance on student outcomes; (b) Clear, supportive, and solution-oriented communication with 8 families and caregivers of students who are chronically absent; 9 (c) Visits to families of students who are chronically absent; 10 (d) Academic, systemic, and economic supports for the families of 11 students who are chronically absent, including removing barriers to 12 students attending school as well as tutoring and mentoring students 13 14 who are reengaging in the classroom; (e) Connecting students to behavioral and physical health 15 16 supports; and 17 (f) Incentives and celebrations of students' improved attendance and engagement in the classroom. 18 19 (4) For the purposes of this section, "students who are chronically absent" has the same meaning as in section 1 of this act. 20 **Sec. 3.** RCW 28A.175.035 and 2011 c 288 s 9 are each amended to 21 22 read as follows: (1) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall: 23 24 (a) Identify criteria for grants and evaluate proposals for funding in consultation with the workforce training and education 25 26 coordinating board; 27 (b) Develop and monitor requirements for grant recipients to: (i) Identify students who ((both fail the Washington assessment 28 of student learning)) score below basic on the statewide student 29 30 assessment as defined in RCW 28A.655.230 and drop out of school; 31 (ii) Identify their own strengths and gaps in services provided to youth; 32 (iii) Set their own local goals for program outcomes; 33 (iv) Use research-based and emerging best practices that lead to 34 35 positive outcomes in implementing the building bridges program; and (v) Coordinate an outreach campaign to bring public and private 36 organizations together and to provide information about the building 37 38 bridges program to the local community;

(c) In setting the requirements under (b) of this subsection,

30 (2) The office of the superintendent of public instruction may 31 require the recipient of grant funding under RCW 28A.175.025 to 32 report the impacts of the recipient's efforts in alignment with the 33 measures of the Washington school improvement framework.

34 <u>(3)</u> In performing its duties under this section, the office of 35 the superintendent of public instruction is encouraged to consult 36 with the ((work group identified)) graduation: a team effort 37 partnership advisory committee established in RCW 28A.175.075.

3 Sec. 4. RCW 28A.175.105 and 2021 c 164 s 7 are each amended to 4 read as follows:

5 The definitions in this section apply throughout RCW 28A.175.100 6 through 28A.175.110 unless the context clearly requires otherwise:

7 (1) "Dropout reengagement program" means an educational program 8 that offers at least the following instruction and services:

(a) Academic instruction, including but not limited to 9 10 preparation to earn a high school equivalency certificate as provided 11 in RCW 28B.50.536 in accordance with rules adopted under RCW 28A.305.190, academic skills instruction, and college and work 12 readiness preparation, that generates credits that can be applied to 13 a high school diploma from the student's school district or from a 14 15 community or technical college under RCW 28B.50.535 and has the goal 16 of enabling the student to obtain the academic and work readiness skills necessary for employment or postsecondary study. A dropout 17 reengagement program is not required to offer instruction in only 18 those subject areas where a student is deficient in accumulated 19 20 credits. Academic instruction must be provided by teachers certified by the Washington professional educator standards board or by 21 22 instructors employed by a community or technical college whose required credentials are established by the college; 23

(b) Case management, academic and career counseling, and assistance with accessing services and resources that support at-risk youth and reduce barriers to educational success, such as:

27 (i) Academic related supports, such as covering test fees,
 28 calculators, and laboratory and other school supplies;

29 (ii) Nonacademic supports, such as adequate and appropriate 30 clothing; adequate and reliable access to food and nutrition; and 31 transportation, including bus passes, gas vouchers, and subsidized 32 parking; and

33 <u>(iii) Connecting students to behavioral and physical health</u> 34 <u>supports</u>; and

35 (c) If the program provider is a community or technical college, 36 the opportunity for qualified students to enroll in college courses 37 that lead to a postsecondary degree or certificate. The college may 38 not charge an eligible student tuition for such enrollment.

39 (2) "Eligible student" means a student who:

(a) Is at least sixteen but less than twenty-one years of age at

12 (3) "Full-time equivalent eligible student" means an eligible 13 student whose enrollment and attendance meet criteria adopted by the 14 office of the superintendent of public instruction specifically for 15 dropout reengagement programs. The criteria shall be:

16 (a) Based on the community or technical college credits generated 17 by the student if the program provider is a community or technical 18 college; and

(b) Based on a minimum amount of planned programming or instruction and minimum attendance by the student rather than hours of seat time if the program provider is a community-based organization.

23 Sec. 5. RCW 28A.175.110 and 2010 c 20 s 4 are each amended to 24 read as follows:

(1) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall develop a model interlocal agreement and a model contract for the dropout reengagement system.

28 (2) The model interlocal agreement and contract shall, at a 29 minimum, address the following:

30 (a) Responsibilities for identification, referral, and enrollment31 of eligible students;

32 (b) Instruction and services to be provided by a dropout 33 reengagement program, as specified under RCW 28A.175.105;

34 (c) Responsibilities for data collection and reporting, including 35 student transcripts and data required for the statewide student 36 information system;

37 (d) Administration of the high school statewide student 38 assessments;

1 (e) Uniform financial reimbursement rates per full-time equivalent eligible student enrolled in a dropout reengagement 2 program, calculated and allocated as a statewide annual average of 3 the basic education allocations generated under RCW 28A.150.260 for 4 nonvocational students and including enhancements for vocational 5 6 students where eligible students are enrolled in vocational courses in a program((, and allowing for a uniform administrative fee to be 7 retained by the district)) to be shared between the parties to the 8 interlocal agreement or contract, as agreed upon by the parties; 9

10 (f) Responsibilities for provision of special education or 11 related services for eligible students with disabilities who have an 12 individualized education program;

13 (g) Responsibilities for necessary accommodations and plans for 14 students qualifying under section 504 of the rehabilitation act of 15 1973;

16 (h) Minimum instructional staffing ratios for dropout 17 reengagement programs offered by community-based organizations, which 18 are not required to be the same as for other basic education programs 19 in school districts; and

(i) Performance measures that must be reported to the office of the superintendent of public instruction in a common format for purposes of accountability, including longitudinal monitoring of student progress and postsecondary education and employment.

(3) Eligible students enrolled in a dropout reengagement program under RCW 28A.175.100, 28A.175.105, and this section are considered regularly enrolled students of the school district in which they are enrolled, except that the students shall not be included in the school district's enrollment for purposes of calculating compliance with RCW 28A.150.100."

<u>EFFECT:</u> Modifies the dropout reengagement program model interlocal agreement and model contract requirements by allowing reimbursement rates per full-time equivalent eligible student enrolled in a program to be shared between the parties to the interlocal agreement or contract, as agreed upon by the parties, rather than providing for a uniform administrative fee to be retained by the school district.
