1 AN ACT Relating to early deployment of state fire service 2 resources; amending RCW 43.43.960; and creating a new section.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 Sec. 1. RCW 43.43.960 and 2019 c 259 s 1 are each amended to 5 read as follows:

6 Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in 7 this section apply throughout this subchapter.

8 (1) "All risk resources" means those resources regularly provided 9 by fire departments, fire districts, and regional fire protection 10 service authorities required to respond to natural or man-made 11 incidents, including but not limited to:

- 12 (a) Wild land fires;
- 13 (b) Landslides;
- 14 (c) Earthquakes;
- 15 (d) Floods; and
- 16 (e) Contagious diseases.

17 (2) "Chief" means the chief of the Washington state patrol.

(3) "Fire chief" includes the chief officer of a statutorily
 authorized fire agency, or the fire chief's authorized
 representative. Also included are the department of natural resources

1 fire control chief, and the department of natural resources regional 2 managers.

3 (4) "Jurisdiction" means state, county, city, fire district,
4 regional fire protection service authority, or port district units,
5 or other units covered by this chapter.

6 (5) "Mobilization" means that all risk resources regularly 7 provided by fire departments, fire districts, and regional fire protection service authorities beyond those available through 8 existing agreements will be requested and, when available, sent in 9 preparation of, or response to, an emergency or disaster situation 10 that has ((exceeded)) or is predicted to exceed the capabilities of 11 12 available local resources. During a large scale emergency, mobilization includes the redistribution of regional or statewide 13 risk resources to either direct emergency incident assignments or to 14 assignment in communities where resources are needed. All risk 15 16 resources may not be mobilized to assist law enforcement with police 17 activities during a civil protest or demonstration, or other exercise by the people of their constitutionally protected First Amendment 18 19 rights, or other protected concerted activity, however, fire departments, fire districts, and regional fire protection service 20 21 authorities are not restricted from providing medical care or aid and 22 firefighting when mobilized for any purpose.

23 When mobilization is declared and authorized as provided in this chapter, all risk resources regularly provided by fire departments, 24 25 fire districts, and regional fire protection service authorities including those of the host fire protection authorities, i.e. 26 incident jurisdiction, shall be deemed as mobilized under this 27 28 chapter, including those that responded earlier under existing mutual aid or other agreement. All nonhost fire protection authorities 29 providing resources in response to a mobilization declaration shall 30 31 be eligible for expense reimbursement as provided by this chapter 32 from the time of the mobilization declaration.

33 This chapter shall not reduce or suspend the authority or 34 responsibility of the department of natural resources under chapter 35 76.04 RCW.

36 (6) "Mutual aid" means emergency interagency assistance provided 37 without compensation under an agreement between jurisdictions under 38 chapter 39.34 RCW.

39 (7) "State fire marshal" means the director of fire protection in 40 the Washington state patrol. NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. If specific funding for the purposes of this act, referencing this act by bill or chapter number, is not provided by June 30, 2025, in the omnibus appropriations act, this act is null and void.

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
