AN ACT Relating to modifying the conditions for use of funds for 1 2 special license plates; and reenacting and amending RCW 46.68.420.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON: 3

Sec. 1. RCW 46.68.420 and 2022 c 239 s 3, 2022 c 117 s 3, and 4 2022 c 96 s 4 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows: 5 6

(1) The department shall:

(a) Collect special license plate fees established under RCW 7 46.17.220; 8

(b) Deduct an amount not to exceed ((twelve dollars)) \$12 for 9 initial issue and ((two dollars)) <u>\$</u>2 for renewal issue 10 for 11 administration and collection expenses incurred by it; and

12 (c) Remit the remaining proceeds to the custody of the state 13 treasurer with a proper identifying detailed report.

14 (2) The state treasurer shall credit the proceeds to the motor 15 vehicle fund until the department determines that the state has been 16 reimbursed for the cost of implementing the special license plate. 17 Upon determination by the department that the state has been 18 reimbursed, the state treasurer shall credit the remaining special 19 license plate fee amounts for each special license plate to the 20 following appropriate account as created in this section in the 21 custody of the state treasurer:

7 (3) Except as otherwise provided in this section, only the 8 director or the director's designee may authorize expenditures from 9 the accounts described in subsection (2) of this section. The 10 accounts are subject to allotment procedures under chapter 43.88 RCW, 11 but an appropriation is not required for expenditures.

12 (4) Except as otherwise provided in this section, funds in the 13 special license plate accounts described in subsection (2) of this 14 section must be disbursed subject to the conditions described in 15 subsection (2) of this section and under contract between the 16 department and qualified nonprofit organizations that provide the 17 services described in subsection (2) of this section.

(5) Funds from the Seattle Seahawks account may be provided to the Washington state leadership board solely for the purpose of administering the Washington world fellows program. Of the amounts received by the Washington state leadership board under this subsection, at least ((ninety)) <u>90</u> percent must be provided as fellowships under the program.

(6) Beginning January 1, 2019, funds from the Seattle Mariners
account may be provided to the Washington state leadership board
solely for the purpose of administering the sports mentoring program.
Of the amounts received by the Washington state leadership board, at
least ((ninety)) <u>90</u> percent must be applied towards services directly
provided to youth participants.

30 (7) For the purposes of this section, a "qualified nonprofit 31 organization" means a not-for-profit corporation operating in 32 Washington that has received a determination of tax exempt status 33 under 26 U.S.C. Sec. 501(c)(3). The qualified nonprofit organization 34 must meet all the requirements under RCW 46.18.100(1).
